To ensure that the design, academic standards and quality of learning opportunities of the existing programme, together with the proposed developments, as approved in principle on 12 October 2007 (PAF ref PARM/07/047 refers) and as outlined in 7 below, remain appropriate to the award to which the Programme leads and are informed by reference to institutional regulations and policies, national benchmarks and relevant professional and employment demands.

# A7 Outline of Proposal/Development(s)

The MRes was devised in 2002 by a team led by Professor Somekh in response to an ESRC initiative inviting bids for the selective recognition of postgraduate research training courses. The ESRC guidelines for the approval of such courses were framed within guidelines set out in 'Application for Status of recognised outlet/course for the receipt of ESRC studentships' 2002, 2005).

The basic aim of the ESRC was to ensure that ESRC studentships would in future only be allocated to such 'recognised outlets'. The development of the course, therefore, set out to achieve such recognition as part of the Institute's strategy to develop a national and international status for its research. The MRes application was successful in that it was recognised by the ESRC as a three-year course in January 2002, making it the only 'new university' research course in Education so validated. It received internal FRDC approval in October 2002. At the ESRC re-validation exercise in 2006, recognition was extended to '1+3' status. This meant that the first year course (i.e., the MRes taught component) now also had ESRC recognition, as well as the subsequent 3-year doctoral training recognised in 2002. The course is one of only two at MMU which has successfully bid for ESRC recognition.

The main changes to the Programme proposed under the Review are:

- 1. On completion of the MRes, students will be eligible for consideration, but not guaranteed entry, for the PhD Programme.
- 2. Assignments to be focussed clearly on the future doctoral work of the student, where this was intended, or identified.

- 3. Additions to be made to the curriculum, based on student feedback, to provide a more coherent student experience.
- 4. Collaboration with the EdD Programme to provide integrated methodological training and increase cost-effectiveness.

- the well qualified and dedicated staff, some of whom are well known internationally in their fields of expertise;
- the creative and innovative nature and delivery of many of the units;
- "the publication of the course materials, the involvement of course staff in presenting workshops at the QI conference, and the way in which teaching and publishing/dissemination have interacted, is special and should be commended" [Prof Pat Sikes, External Assessor].

# A11 | Conclusions on Quality and Standards

The Panel concluded that the intended learning outcomes of the Programme were being achieved by students, that the standards of the University's awards were being maintained and that the Programme as modified remained current and valid in the light of developing knowledge in the discipline, practice in its operation and developments in teaching and learning.

Continued approval with effect from September 2008 subject to fulfilment of the one condition in Section A13 below.
