## A Note from the President

Spring is such a special time of year. It is a time for reflection, new beginnings and growth.

As many of you know, our Board President, Catherine Veronica (Ronnie) Grossi, passed away on January 5th, 2009. Ronnie was a very active member of the Board. Not only did she serve two non-consecutive terms as Board President, one term as Vice President, 8 ½ years as a board member, but she also tutored ESL students at Project F.L.O.W.E.R. one morning a week.

She cared for her students so much that when one asked for help for a family member with a difficult schedule, she immediately offered her 1-on-1 tutoring on Sunday afternoons. We often joked with her about her "little red schoolhouse" as that Sunday afternoon class grew from 1 to 5 students. Ronnie was a vital part of our organization and is missed by the Board, staff and students at The Literacy Council.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Burke County Literacy Council and our help is needed now more than ever. Unemployment rates in our county continue to climb impacting the lives of all those in our community. Our mission to teach adults and their families to read and/or to improve their literacy skills and to instill in all those served a commitment to life-long learning will enable us to have a better educated workforce. This is a crucial element in sustaining the jobs we currently have and in attracting new jobs to our area.

At a time when services are needed most, we are facing budget cuts from our major sources. This will challenge us to find ways to subsidize our budget to maintain our current program levels. The Board, with your help, will be looking for creative and innovative ways to face this challenge.

In light of these adversities, I am still excited about the future. I have had the privilege of being associated with The Literacy Council for the last three years. I began as the Family Literacy Coordinator after being a stay-at-home mom for eight years. This was a good fit for me since I worked with families, explaining to them the importance of literacy in the home while teaching them how to share books and experiences with their children. My time at home with my children was not only valuable to me as a parent but also allowed me to gain experiences and skills I was able to use when teaching new parents. I really enjoyed working with the students, staff and board so it was a difficult decision for me to leave when I was asked to join the family business. I was thrilled when asked to join the board and even more so when nominated for President. I am very excited to continue working with The Literacy Council in this new role.

#### **New Statistics Released**

Today, the National Center for Education Statistics psychedelic and blanquillo but they were unable to spell released a new report, Basic Reading Skills and the floccillation and bellwether correctly for the win. In the Literacy of America's Least Literate Adults: Results from

## Key Findings:

- Seven million adults, or about 3% of the adult population, could not complete even the most basic literacy tasks in the main assessment and were given the supplemental assessment.
- Nearly 1 in 5 adults in the nonliterate in English group had a high school diploma or GED. Among them, more than half (representing roughly 600,000 adults) had earned their high school degree in the US.
- For those for whom Spanish is a first language, a delay in learning English is associated with low basic reading skills. Those who learned English before age 11 had basic reading scores similar to average native English speakers (97 words read correctly per minute); however, for those who learned English after age 21, average scores were 35 points (or about one-third) lower. Due to the correlational nature of these data, it is impossible to make causal attributions, i.e., to say that a delay in learning English causes low basic reading skills.
- Adults who took the main literary assessment were able to read, on average, 98 words correctly per minute (wpm), in comparison to 34 wpm by those in the supplemental assessment.




## A Note from the Director


