Health and Safety/Risk Management

he steamy days of summer are upon us. Keep an eye out for heat related illness - dehydration, heat stroke, and heat exhaustion. These are of greatest concern with unusually high temperatures and humidity. Add vigorous exercise to these conditions and the body's natural cooling system may be gin to fail.

Dehydration is the earliest form of heat illness. Some of the first signs include dark colored urine, weakness, head and body aches. If these symptoms occur, listen to your body. Drink when you feel thirsty.

Heat exhaustion symptoms include intense thirst, fatigue, weakness, white clammy skin, headache, nausea, vo miting, hyperventilation and initability. If you see these symptoms, find shade or a cool place, loosen the individual's clothes and encourage fluid intake.

Heat stroke is the most severe form of heat related illness and represents a progression of heat exhaustion symptoms including change to hot dry red skin, potential loss of consciousness or seizure and body temperature >105 degrees F. This is a true medical emergency. Begin hydration and cool the individual with wet cloths or in a stream. Seek medical assistance immediately.

More importantly, avoid heat related illness by encouraging good water intake, frequent breaks from physical activity and getting to shade when possible.

A Hero Among Us...

Officer John Krahn Benefit slated for August 8, 2009

To the Explorers in Post 177 chartered through the Elm Grove Police Department and the rest of the Potawatomi Area Council, Officer John Krahn is not only their Exploring Advisor, but a local hero.

You may recall that less than an hour before the Elm Grove Memorial Day Parade was to kickoff, tragedy struck when a train collided with a minivan that was stuck on the train tracks. In that van was a mother and her two year old son; John Krahn had pulled the mother out, but the two year old was still inside when the train struck the van and knocked it into both John and the husband who had been traveling behind the van in another vehicle.

Tim We iner, a by stander reported that he saw a police officer come "out of nowhere to help out." After the officer helped the woman, he tried to save the boy, the man said. "He was reaching in the back when the train hit the car," he said. "He was trying to get the child out. It was unbelievable. This guy is a hero He didn't have to risk his life."

Weinerran overto the officer and thought he hurt his leg and shoulder.

"He just told me, "Go to the car, get the kid out of there," he said. "Here he was laying in pain and all he thought about was getting that kid out. Amazing."

We inergot the boy out of the car, the rest is history...all involved unbelievably survived.

Officer John Krahn continues to recuperate at home from the multiple orthopedic injuries he suffered from the accident. He is undergoing physical therapy twice a week and exercises on his own daily, as part of his rehabilitation.

John has a long road to a full recovery and truly appreciates all the support and well wishes he has received from the community as well as from people outside of Elm Grove.

A fund raiser for both Officer Krahn and Scott Partenfelder, to help offset expenses not otherwise covered by either insurance or Workman's Compensation (in Officer Krahn's case), is being organized through Town Bank of Elm Grove. 

The National Children's Study comes to Waukesha County

This spring the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the Medical College of Wisconsin joined forces to work on the National Children's Study, the largest and most comprehensive study of child health and development ever in the US. The National Children's Study is designed to answer the question: How does a child's environment - the airthey breathe, the water they drink, and the community they live in - affect the irhealth and well-being?

In May 2009, National Children's Study representatives began visiting eligible neighborhoods to encourage women who are pregnant or who may become pregnant to participate. Families living in eligible neighborhoods in Brookfield, Big Bend, Dousman, Hartland, Menomonee Falls, New Berlin, Oconomowoc, Pewaukee, Sussex, and Waukesha will receive a letter via U.S. Mail describing the Study and providing further details about the enrollment process.

Authorized by Congress in the Children's Health Act of 2000, the National Children's Study will follow 100,000 children across the US from before birth to a dulthood. This information may allow researchers to determine the root causes of many childhood and a dult diseases, including as thma and allergies, autism, obe sity and diabetes. Wauke sha County was selected as one of 105 communities across the country where the Study will take place.


