## Reminder for Parents/Guardians of Rising $6^{\text {th }}$ Grade Students:

## Tdap Booster:

All students entering middle school must have received diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (Tdap) vaccine booster prior to entering school this Fall. Documentation of the Tdap booster should be turned in to the clinic at Horizon by June $13^{\text {th }}$. After that date, please submit documentation to your child's middle school this summer. Your child will not be allowed to start school without this immunization or a medical exemption. There will be no grace period for your child to begin middle school on September 2, 2014 without the vaccine.

## GIFTED EDUCATION IN LOUDOUN COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

For parents/guardians seeking information about gifted education in Loudoun County Public Schools, there is no better place to begin than on the LCPS Gifted Education website: http://cmswebl.Icps.org/Page/617

The first and most basic question is often, "Why does gifted education exist"? The website answers it this way: "All students need to be challenged to their utmost potential. For students who are rapid-paced learners, who have high intellectual aptitude, or who are very talented in a specific field, these programs help ensure that they are challenged academically and intellectually."

A British gifted education blog express it this way: "In reality, giftedness is a learning difference. Like any other learning difference, it is identified through careful testing and evaluation. Although guidelines for identification and standards for the provision of gifted services differ from state to state, there is widespread agreement that gifted children and adults are different. They learn at a faster pace, absorb information with greater depth and complexity, have exceptional abstract reasoning skills, and are creative and innovative in their thinking."
(http://giftedchallenges.blogspot.co.uk/2013/01/lets-not-call-them-gifted.html) To find out specifically about gifted identification in LCPS, look at the Eligibility section of the LCPS Gifted Education website.

If your child attends an LCPS elementary school in grades K-3, he/she has participated in SEARCH this year, the LCPS Gifted Education Department's early elementary program. The purpose of the SEARCH program is twofold: "to provide opportunities for students to use higher level thinking skills, and to identify students with exceptional ability." Through the SEARCH program, students are observed by both the classroom teacher and SEARCH teacher as they experience their first introduction to the LCPS SEARCH gifted curriculum.
Please take some time this summer and before beginning of the new school year in September to investigate the LCPS Gifted Education website. There will be announcements next fall about Gifted Information Night opportunities, as well as current information and news, FAQs, links to forms, and lists of school contacts.

It's been a pleasure working with your children this school year, and we all look forward to another wonderful year in SEARCH beginning in September!

## Dear Parents:

Summer is here! We are sure you have many fun activities, trips, and vacations planned for the summer. While these are important, we also want your child to continue to read regularly throughout the summer break.

In order to encourage summer reading, we are promoting Horizon's summer reading program. We are challenging students to read 1000 pages. Students are welcome to read books of their choice. Parents are encouraged to read to their children, as well. Enclosed with this letter is a log to record the titles of the books read and a place to record the number of pages read. On the reverse side is a form on which your child should illustrate and write (or dictate for younger students) five or move sentences about his/her favorite book. (Additional logs are available on the school's web page.) During the open house in August and the first two days of school, we will have a table in the lobby where students can drop off their reading logs. For those who met the challenge, the celebration will take place during the first month of school. Each child's name will also be entered into a drawing for a gift certificate from Books-A-Million.

NO SUBSTITUTES FOR THIS READING LOG WILL BE ACCEPTED, AND NO LOG WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE SECOND DAY OF SCHOOL. A PARENT SIGNATURE IS ALSO REQUIRED.

PARENTS: Reading aloud to your child is just as important as children reading independently. We encourage you to include read-aloud books on your child's log, as well as books read for the Loudoun County Library Summer Reading Program. Lists of books are available on the Horizon website. These lists are suggestions, not requirements, although we do encourage students to read grade appropriate books. Above all, the most important thing is to keep our children reading.
