Academic Achievement Tests for Middle & High School

ISTEP+ Testing

High school students and/or 8th graders in Algebra I must take the End-of-Course Assessment (ECA) in Algebra I and English 10 upon the completion of these courses and must pass both tests prior to high school graduation. Students also take the Biology I ECA upon completion of that course.

Tests for College Entrance

PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary SAT & National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is a sponsored program by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). This test measures the critical skills developed throughout life, provides firsthand practice for the SAT, and gives 11th grade students a chance to qualify for scholarships and recognition programs. Traders Point is an approved testing site and all 10th-11th grade students are encouraged to take the PSAT in October when it is given at Traders Point.

SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test)

The SAT is a three-hour, primarily multiple-choice test that measures verbal and mathematical reasoning and writing abilities that develop over time. Most colleges require SAT scores for admission. SAT prep is available at Traders Point.

AP TESTS

AP Examinations are administered each year in May and represent the culmination of college-level work in a given discipline in a secondary school setting. Rigorously developed by committees of college and AP high school faculty, the AP Exams test students' ability to perform at a college level.

ACT (AMERICAN COLLEGE TEST)

Not as widely used but still in demand by nearly a thousand colleges, universities and scholarship programs, the ACT battery of tests is required or recommended for select institutions. Students who need to take these tests should seek assistance from the Guidance Counselor. ACT prep is available at Traders Point.

What is Core 40?

Indiana's Core 40 is the academic foundation all students need to succeed in college, apprenticeship programs, military training and the workforce. Core 40 became Indiana's required high school curriculum in fall 2007. Students entering high school since 2007 have been expected to complete Core 40 as a graduation requirement.

By providing all Indiana students a balanced sequence of academically rigorous high school courses in the core subjects of English/language arts, mathematics, science and social studies; physical education/health and wellness; and electives including world languages, career/technical, and fine arts, the Core 40 requirement gives all our students the opportunity to compete with the best.

Challenging Courses = Big Rewards. Students who take strong academic courses in high school are more likely to enroll in college and earn a degree. That's important, because higher education pays: On average, college graduates earn more than a million dollars more over a lifetime than those with only a high school education. High school graduates earn 42 percent more than high school dropouts. Core 40 pays.

Preparation for College Success. It's not just about getting in — it's about finishing. To succeed in college-level work, students need to complete Core 40 in high school. Anything less may mean taking remedial (high school) coursework in college, which means it will take you longer to finish and will cost you more in college tuition. It also means you'll have a greater chance of dropping out before you get your degree. That's why Core 40 is a college admissions requirement: Since fall 2011 you won't be able to start at a four-year public Indiana college without Core 40 (or a documented equivalent). Most private colleges require students to have at least this level of high school academic preparation. Core 40 is your best preparation for success.

Money for College. The Core 40 diploma can help you earn money for college. Indiana students who complete a Core 40 diploma and meet other financial aid and grade requirements can receive up to 90 percent of approved tuition and fees at eligible colleges. Core 40 with Academic Honors graduates can receive up to 100 percent and some colleges also offer their own scholarships specifically for students who earn this diploma.

For the Core 40 with Academic Honors diploma, students must:

- Complete all requirements for Core 40.
- Earn 2 additional Core 40 math credits.
- Earn 6-8 Core 40 world language credits
 (6 credits in one language or 4 credits each in two languages).
- Earn 2 Core 40 fine arts credits.
- Earn a grade of a "C" or better in courses that will count toward the diploma.
- Have a grade point average of a "B" or better.
- Complete one of the following:
 - A. Earn 4 credits in 2 or more AP courses and take corresponding AP exams
 - B. Earn 6 verifiable transcripted college credits in dual credit courses from priority course list
 - C. Earn two of the following:
 - 1. A minimum of 3 verifiable transcripted college credits from the priority course list,
 - 2. 2 credits in AP courses and corresponding AP exams,
 - 3. 2 credits in IB standard level courses and corresponding IB exams.
 - D. Earn a combined score of 1750 or higher on the SAT critical reading, mathematics and writing sections and a minimum score of 530 on each
 - E. Earn an ACT composite score of 26 or higher and complete written section
 - F. Earn 4 credits in IB courses and take corresponding IB exams.

C•**RE40** with Technical Honors

(minimum 47 credits)

For the Core 40 with Technical Honors diploma, students must:

- Complete all requirements for Core 40.
- Earn 6 credits in the college and career preparation courses in a state-approved College & Career Pathway and one of the following:
 - 1. Pathway designated industry-based certification or credential, or
 - Pathway dual credits from the lists of priority courses resulting in 6 transcripted college credits
- Earn a grade of "C" or better in courses that will count toward the diploma.
- Have a grade point average of a "B" or better.
- · Complete one of the following,
 - A. Any one of the options (A F) of the Core 40 with Academic Honors
 - Earn the following scores or higher on WorkKeys; Reading for Information –
 Level 6, Applied Mathematics Level 6, and Locating Information-Level 5.
 - C. Earn the following minimum score(s) on Accuplacer: Writing 80, Reading 90, Math 75.
 - D. Earn the following minimum score(s) on Compass; Algebra 66 Writing 70, Reading 80.

Dual Credit Courses

Dual credit is the term given to courses in which high school students have the opportunity to earn both high school and college credits simultaneously. Dual credit courses are taught by high school faculty, adjunct college faculty or college faculty either at the high school, at the college or university, or sometimes through online courses or distance education. Dual credit is offered by both state and independent (private, regionally accredited) colleges and universities. Traders Point offers dual-credit through several colleges, such as Taylor, Indiana University and Indiana Wesleyan. Through all options students could earn 2 years of early college credit while at Traders Point for little or no cost. Advanced Placement—AP Courses

Advanced Placement (AP) is a research-backed method to facilitate student participation and success through delivery of college-level courses and corresponding exams in the high school setting to qualified high school students. INDIANA SCHOOL CHOICE SCHOLARSHIPS

Indiana's new voucher program (authorized under IC 20-51-1 and IC 20-51-4) gives Hoosier families the opportunity to send their children to a school that best meets their learning needs. A voucher, or "Choice Scholarship," is a state payment that qualifying families can use to offset tuition costs at participating schools. TPCA is approved by the Indiana Department of Education to receive Choice Scholarship funds. Voucher amounts are based on the funds the student's school district of residence would receive each year for that student. Amounts can range from \$2,200 – nearly \$5,000 per year depending on the students resident school district and grade level.

There are other options for students who do not meet the public school attendance requirement for vouchers that may allow them to receive a Choice Scholarship in the current or future years. These options involve receiving a scholarship from an Indiana approved Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO).

SAGAMORE INSTITUTE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR EDUCATION CHOICE (SGO)

Scholarships for Education Choice is an Indiana Department of Education certified scholarship granting organization (SGO), an initiative of the Sagamore Institute—an Indianapolis-based nonprofit, nonpartisan, public policy research organization, or "think tank." They offer scholarships to students in grades K-12 and families that qualify under the Indiana School Scholarship Tax Credit Program, which offers substantial tax incentives to donors to support state approved school choice scholarship programs like Scholarships for Education Choice through Sagamore.
