Repetition Repeating questions and/or words Repeating stories Repeating activities			
Agitation • Restless • Pacing around the house			
Sexual Inappropriateness Inappropriate with self Inappropriate with others			
False Accusations • Becomes suspicious • Reaches illogical conclusions • Missing items are "stolen"
