I am sure many of you have already received our Annual Fund solicitation letter. A number of our students enrolled in the International Baccalaureate Programme spent two weeks in China this past summer. Their experiences will be something that will color their perception of their own education, we believe in a very positive way. They will also have strong and wonderful memories for a lifetime!

As Catholic educators, we are committed not just to providing a strong academic foundation - and we definitely do that, as shown by the \$16.5 million in offered scholarships to the class of 2009. However, we also provide education that is grounded in morality and in the Catholic faith. Each year we hope to provide an atmosphere where our students can grow and develop into the young men and women that Christ calls them to be! To see the change that takes place in four years, for me at least, is proof that the presence of Jesus Christ is alive and well at Central Catholic High School!

Please continue to pray for the success of the work we do in the name of the Lord. Please also remember our Annual Fund if you are able to help us. As always, you, your family, and your intentions are in my prayers.

Congratulations to the

Class of 2009!

The Central Catholic High School Class of 2009 earned more than \$16.5 million in college scholarships. Graduates were accepted at 58 different colleges and universities, including the University of Notre Dame, Case Western, Northwestern, the Ohio State University, Clemson, the United States Naval Academy, University of Michigan, Michigan State, University of North Carolina, Purdue, Fordham, Xavier University, University of Iowa, University of Southern California, Vanderbilt, and Loyola University.

Individual academic and leadership awards were presented to members of the senior class at an honors assembly on May 19. The Class of 2009 valedictorian was **Samantha Lortz**, the salutatorian was **Amanda Ranazzi**, and the Heritage Speaker was **Aaron DeLong**.

Steve Billmaier and Kristen Murnen received the Bishop's Cross. This award is given to two members of the senior class who exhibit these gifts of the Holy Spirit: understanding, right judgment, courage, reverence, self discipline, a sense of social responsibility, and a high level of academic achievement in religious studies.

The Reverend James E. Steinle Senior Leadership Award is given in honor of a former principal at Central Catholic, and it recognizes two seniors who have demonstrated strong qualities of leadership and service without receiving formal recognition. This year's recipients were **Frederick Brown** and **Anne McCarthy**.

Three members of the class were recognized for their hours of community service during their four years at CCHS. **Ben Szymanski** served 347 hours, **Courtney Kornowa** served 370 hours, and **Lauren Eagle** donated 935 hours of her time to community service.

Several scholar-athlete awards carry academic requirements at Central Catholic. The Margaret Mary Volz Scholar Athlete Award and the Tom McHugh Award are presented to one female and one male student who have lettered in at least two sports during their senior year, have maintained at least a 2.0 grade point average after seven semesters, and are the top ranking student athletes. These awards were presented to **Ashley Sujkowski** and **Jordan Duckett**.

The OHSAA Scholar Athlete Awards are given to a senior male and a senior female with the highest grade point average who have received a minimum of four varsity letters in all sports combined. This year's recipients were **MacKenzie Jennings** and **Anne McCarthy**.

The Archie Griffin Sportsmanship Awards were presented to **Jeffery Balogh** and **Kaila Blanchard**.

Sullivan Center Court Features New Floor

The basketball court in the CCHS Sullivan Center now features a new floor. The floor had endured some water damage in the summer of 2007 and underwent a temporary fix at that time, but it needed a more permanent restoration. In May, Foster Specialty Floors out of Wixom, Michigan began the five-week process of putting in an entirely new floor. The company was the contractor that installed the original floor when the Sullivan Center opened in the fall of 1997.




1942 Graduate Donates Tile to Kranz S.P.A.C.E. Room

In June, **Ray Szymanski '42** donated a sample space tile to the Kranz S.P.A.C.E. room of the Central Catholic Kress Family Library. The room houses the Ambassador of Exploration Award's lunar sample that **Gene Kranz '51** dedicated to CCHS in December of 2007.

Szymanski earned an engineering degree with glass technology from the University of Toledo in 1949. He went to work for Johns Manville in Waterville, Ohio, a manufacturer of building insulation, commercial roofing and roof insulation, and other specialty products. For a time during his career, he and others worked with the manufacturing of fiber samples for Lockheed Missile and Space Company in California, now known as Lockheed Martin. The company used the fiber to develop the heat-resistant tiles on the space shuttle that allow the orbiter to re-enter the atmosphere.

"The fiber could withstand temperatures from minus 170 degrees to 2,500 degrees Fahrenheit without shrinking or cracking," said Szymanski. "There are about 27,000 tiles on a typical shuttle, and no two are exactly alike."

When Szymanski retired from Johns Manville in 1988, he was given three samples of space shuttle tiles that used the fibers he was involved in making. When he saw that Central Catholic was looking for more artifacts to include in the Kranz S.P.A.C.E. room, he decided to donate one of those tiles.

O'Shea is Living the Good Life



Dennis O'Shea '52 has a genuine joy for life. He is an outgoing, quick-witted gentleman, willing to discuss topics ranging from religion to sports to politics, and anything in between. While many people his age are retired and slowing down, O'Shea seems to be more energetic than ever.

Getting His Start

Dennis grew up on the east side of Toledo, attending Sacred Heart School. Although his brother went to Waite High School, Dennis was able to attend CCHS, where he played

football, basketball, and baseball, and was a class officer. He was also a member of the track team and he competed in hurdles against his brother. Basketball was his best sport, and he was named to the All-City team.

Dennis was offered a college scholarship to play basketball for the Alabama Crimson Tide. His roommate during his freshman year was Bart Starr, who went on to become a legendary Green Bay Packer quarterback. Dennis still keeps in touch with Starr, and when Dennis was inducted into the Central Catholic Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000, Starr sent along a taped introductory speech.

On his way to earning his Bachelor of Science in business administration at Alabama, Dennis found time to not only play basketball, but to participate in the male chorus and the glee club. "I don't know why I didn't try those at CCHS...maybe I just didn't have the time," he says now. "I did have to turn down the role of Jud in *Oklahoma* in college because of basketball. I loved to sing and dance. I actually learned to dance from my mother and her sisters. They used to get all dressed up and dance in a nightclub act at supper clubs when I was a kid. They would spend time in the afternoons teaching us and having us perform for them."

Dennis lettered all four years at Alabama, and at

one point his team was ranked second in the nation. Right after college, he was drafted into the Army and stationed in Germany. (If you ever meet Dennis, be sure to ask him about how he and a friend once spent an entire weekend in Germany speaking in German and pretending they did not speak English, all the while completely understanding everything their American dates were saying about them!)

During his two years of active duty with the Army, Dennis played basketball for the U.S. team, competing against other countries. The team played an exhibition game at the Brussels World Fair and had many games against Russian teams. Dennis also served eight years in the active reserves.

Playing With the Pros

Dennis was drafted by the NBA's Philadelphia Warriors after college, but was unable to play for them because of his Army service. The coach of

the Denver Truckers of the NIBL (National Industrial Basketball League) had seen Dennis play in college and looked him up after his Army stint. The NIBL was formed in 1947 to enable mill workers to compete in basketball, and it was made up of teams that did not join the newly formed NBA (National Basketball Association).

Dennis played for the Denver team from 1958 to 1962, and then decided he liked the area so much that he settled there after his playing days. The NIBL became the ABA (American Basketball Association) in 1967, and then merged with the NBA in 1976. The Denver Truckers became the Denver Rockets of the ABA, and the current Denver Nuggets of the NBA.

"Professional basketball players today are so much better than they were then," Dennis says. "There were no games to watch on television and emulate the great moves. There was no Internet, there were no skills camps. You emulated the moves you saw on the courts at your neighborhood park. Players today don't practice free throws like they used to, they don't concentrate on the fundamental skills as much. There is too much individual play in the NBA and not enough team play." That being said, Dennis says he still follows the Denver Nuggets today, and he enjoys watching Carmelo Anthony play.

Still Going Strong

Dennis has been a stock broker for over 30 years with several different companies, and has been with J.P. Turner & Company for the last 10 years. "It can be stressful, but it's a different ball game every day," he says. These days he works on commission and can set his own schedule. He has taken his business savvy from his experiences on the basketball court. "You need to have the knowledge, you have to learn how to come from behind and learn how to protect a lead," he explains.


> Dennis actually lives in Littleton, Colorado, about a mile from Columbine High School where the horrible shootings took place 10 years ago. He knew some of the coaches who worked there at the time, and a few of his grandchildren will attend school there next year. Like most residents, he still recalls the day vividly. "It affected the whole town, and it still does," Dennis says. "I was at work when I heard about it. I knew one of the police officers who went in when the incident began, and he said one of the most difficult things about it was not knowing what they were dealing with – who the good guys were and who the bad guys were."

Fortunately, Dennis has many happy memories of living in the area as well. He and his wife Audrey will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary on October 3. They

have a son who lives in Denver and a daughter who lives about 60 miles away, and each has two children, so they spend a lot of time with family. Dennis also remains active, playing tennis with Audrey, golfing, playing co-ed softball, and participating in a senior basketball league. In fact, his team won the Denver championships and competed in the National Senior Olympics in San Francisco in August. As he explains, "I don't like exercise, but I'll try to play anything. I may not be very good at it, but I'm willing to try it!"

Dennis encourages young athletes to perfect their skills and to take their knowledge of athletic principles into their everyday lives, just as he has. "Athletics can help you, but you can't rely on them entirely," he says. "Be adventurous, try everything, don't be a wallflower. In life, just like in athletics, you need to know the rules and carry them out, you need to practice and work hard, and you can't be a whiner. In other words, you need to have knowledge, skill, hustle, and class."





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Larry Fuller Living His Dream

When **Larry Fuller '83** began playing the piano at the age of 10, he never dreamed it would take him on a journey around the world. But the fact that he has played on countless stages with many of the jazz world's best musicians proves that sometimes dreams do come true.

Piano Man

Larry has been working since 2005 as the pianist for the famous guitarist and singer John Pizzarelli. The John Pizzarelli Quartet tours throughout the United States, Europe, and Japan, performing classic pop, jazz, and swing. But the road to his current gig is full of improvisation, much like the jazz music he so loves.

Larry grew up in the old north end of Toledo, attending Stickney Elementary and Riverside Junior High. His introduction to music came when his older brother brought home an old upright piano from a garage sale. He began to play by ear, and then started piano lessons at a music store in East Toledo.

"I always loved music and was drawn to the piano because we had one in our house," recalls Larry. "I soon developed a love for jazz because I loved to improvise. My parents didn't have any jazz music at home, so my first access to jazz recordings was through the Toledo Public Library downtown where I discovered Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Oscar Peterson, and many of my other heroes." It was in junior high that Larry met his mentor, Floyd "Candy" Johnson, who used to lead a band in Detroit called the Peppermint Sticks. Johnson was a saxophonist who had a program in the Toledo Public Schools called the Toledo All-City Youth Jazz Ensemble. Larry joined the ensemble and learned about jazz from Johnson and began accompanying him to gigs. This led to his professional debut at the age of 14 at a New Year's Eve party.

At Central Catholic, Larry played in the jazz band that met before school, and he took music history and theory classes with Carolyn Seeman. He also landed a steady gig at Rusty's Jazz Café during his last two years of high school, playing every Sunday from 9:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. "I'm not really sure how many teachers knew about that, but I always made it to school on time!" he recalls. He practiced his craft for hours each day and was offered a music scholarship to the University of Miami (Florida), but he turned it down in favor of pursuing a career as a pianist on his own.

Seeing the World

After high school, Larry began performing around Toledo, Detroit, and Ann Arbor. In 1988, he got his first big break when he backed up Grammynominated vocalist Ernestine Anderson at Ann Arbor's Bird of Paradise Jazz Club. Anderson was apparently impressed by what she heard because she immediately hired Fuller as her full time accompanist. He relocated to Seattle where Anderson lived, and together they traveled extensively throughout the United States and Japan. He also recorded on her Grammynominated album, *Now and Then*.

Larry's impressive resume includes playing with Anderson from 1988 to 1993, then with jazz drummer Jeff Hamilton's trio from 1994 to 2000,



and then with the legendary bassist Ray Brown's trio from 2000 until 2002. "There were also many, many performances along the way with wonderful jazz musicians, some of the great names in jazz, including Stanley Turrentine, Phil Woods, Nicholas Payton, Regina Carter, and many others," he says.

With Jeff Hamilton, Larry toured and recorded several CD's in the U.S. and Europe. He traveled and performed with Ray Brown until Brown passed away in 2002. "The artist I am most proud to have worked with is Ray Brown, who is considered to be the greatest bassist in jazz," Larry says. "I grew up listening to him on recordings with Oscar Peterson, and to be hired by him as the pianist in his trio was a childhood dream realized. He was once married to Ella Fitzgerald and is thought by some audiophiles to be the most recorded musician of all time, having appeared on over 3,000 recordings."

Larry also recorded his own CD, *Easy Walker*, with Ray Brown on bass and Jeff Hamilton on drums. He has toured Europe extensively many times, as well as Japan and Brazil. He has appeared twice on *Late Night With Conan O'Brien* and also appeared on the *Tony Danza Show*. He has performed at the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center in New York City,

the Hollywood Bowl, and many prestigious concert halls in Europe and Japan, and he has performed on national television in Brazil, Japan, Germany, and Holland.

Although many of the jazz greats that Larry has played with may be lesser known to the general public, some of the better-known artists he has worked with include Bette Midler and Gladys Knight. With the John Pizzarelli Quartet, he has performed for the last two years at Midler's gala picnic for her foundation that revitalizes impoverished areas in New York City, and she has joined the group on stage for several songs.

His involvement with Gladys Knight was through John Clayton, a famous arranger from Los Angeles. Larry accompanied Clayton to Knight's home in Las Vegas so they could put all of Knight's songs into the appropriate keys before writing arrangements for a big band that was to play behind her. "She was very sweet and down to earth, and it was fascinating to be in her home with all the gold records on the walls," Larry remembers.

CCHS Connections

About two years ago, Larry had an interesting experience that proved how extensive the Central Catholic High School connection can be. He was performing as a headliner in the remote city of Nairn, Scotland at the Nairn Jazz Festival when he encountered fellow alumnus **Duke Heitger** '86. "Duke is a terrific musician and he used to come and hear me play at Rusty's," Larry recalls. "He plays a different style of jazz than I do - an older, more Dixieland style - whereas I play a more modern style. But here we were, two musicians who grew up in Toledo and we both went to Central Catholic, and we were performing at the same festival halfway around the world in a little town in Scotland near Loch Ness. I think we represented Toledo and CCHS well that day!"

Larry says he is grateful to Central Catholic for giving him a terrific education and for having a tuition assistance program that allowed him to attend. He is also glad that **Fr. Marty Donnelly '56**, who was the CCHS president at the time, was kind enough to allow him to continue

playing with his mentor, Candy Johnson, in the All-City Youth Jazz Ensemble even though it was a public school program.

Larry now lives in Manhattan and continues to tour with Pizzarelli, as well as appearing at festivals, clubs, and jazz parties around the world. He encourages any young musician to find a mentor as he did, to be persistent, and to practice, practice, practice in order to become successful. He says, "Even though I grew up very poor in the north end of Toledo, I found my passion in the piano, and it has taken me beyond my wildest dreams."

Students and Administrators Travel from

Last February, Central Catholic High School announced its designation as an International Baccalaureate World School. We are the first school in Northwest Ohio and the first Catholic school in the entire state of Ohio to earn this distinction.

Chemistry teacher Ann Hajlbrahim said, "I'm very excited to work with students to expand their knowledge of chemistry and how it affects the world we live in. I hope the students will gain insight into how other schools, particularly in Europe and Asia, approach learning, and how the business community utilizes the skills our students will be acquiring."

Central Catholic is offering Chinese as its IB program language, and the class is being taught by Jessie Zhou, a teacher provided by the University of Toledo Confucius Institute.

Chinese Tour

In preparation for adding the study of Chinese to the Central Catholic curriculum, principal **Michael Kaucher** and director of curriculum **Marie**

Arter traveled to China in June. They were among 400 U.S. educators who participated in a one-week educational tour to learn about Chinese culture and language in an effort to build and expand Chinese language programs in U.S. schools. The event represented a rare opportunity for school decision-makers to experience China firsthand, learn about the culture, and see the dramatic pace of change under way in the world's most populated nation. The trip took place from June 22 through



The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme is a challenging two-year curriculum, primarily aimed at students aged 16 to 19. Completing the program leads to qualification that is widely recognized by the world's leading universities. The IB Diploma Programme is recognized around the world and ensures an increased adaptability and mobility for its students. Many colleges and universities offer credit for completion of the IB curriculum.

The IB program prepares students for college and encourages them to ask challenging questions, learn how to learn, develop a strong sense of their own identity and culture, and develop the ability to communicate with and understand people from other countries and cultures.

"Part of the mission of the International Baccalaureate Organization is to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect," said CCHS principal Michael Kaucher. "We too at Central Catholic feel very strongly about this. These are characteristics that we hope all Central Catholic graduates will possess in this 21st Century."

When classes began this fall, students in the IB Diploma Programme began their course of study. Teachers and administrators prepared at length to begin this

July 1 and was sponsored by Hanban/Confucius Institute Headquarters in partnership with the College Board. Established by the Chinese government in 1987, Hanban is the nation's official agency authorized to promote Chinese language and culture internationally.

Beyond the benefit of cultural enrichment, the tour was also expected to provide incentives and strategies for the educators to return to the United States better able to support the growth of Chinese programs in their own schools and districts.

During the trip, educators had an opportunity to meet with Chinese education leaders, build sister school and city ties, and network with other U.S. school leaders who are bringing Chinese language programs to their districts and schools. Delegates visited Beijing and traveled in small groups to other cities and provinces to meet with local education commissions.

"The trip helped me to focus on the similarities between the United States and China in this global community," Ms. Arter said.

Bridge Summer Camp

From July 15 to 31, six Central Catholic students, a CCHS teacher, and a student from Ottawa Hills High School also traveled to China to participate in the Chinese Bridge Summer Camp for U.S. High School Students. The Central Catholic students, who are all a part of the International Baccalaureate program, include **Danielle Barnes, Elizabeth Burnard, Connor Langenderfer, Jason Mossing, Zachary Sullivan**, and **Gabrielle Vasquez**. They were accompanied by CCHS French teacher, **Mary Sue Timar**, and Ottawa Hills student, Sean Stein.


The Chinese Bridge Summer Camp is designed to promote exchange between the youth of China and the United States and enhance the understanding of U.S. high school students of Chinese language and



culture, thus to stimulate their interest in Chinese learning. During their trip, the Central Catholic students studied in traditional classrooms, participated in various sports and cultural activities, and took in various Chinese historical points of interest. The students' trip was also sponsored by Hanban/Confucius Institute Headquarters.

Gabrielle Vasquez said she wanted to be a part of the Chinese Bridge program because it was a once in a lifetime opportunity to experience another country while being with friends. "It was exciting to make new friends and meet new people, and to see what our cultures have in common and how they are different," she explained. One of her favorite parts of the trip was visiting the Great Wall of China and seeing the landscape.

Vasquez is also looking forward to the challenges of the International Baccalaureate Programme and is proud to be a member of the first class at CCHS. She feels that the course of study may be difficult, but it also may be more balanced than AP classes because it involves the entire curriculum and not just a few classes. She is especially looking forward to psychology and theater arts.



Sharing Our Humanity

The IB program has a community theme that is intended to serve as a focus for the IB World Schools. Each theme lasts for three years. The current theme, "Sharing Our Humanity," aims to capture the excellent initiatives that are already underway in many schools. With this theme, the IB program hopes to encourage and inspire new activities in and out of the classroom around topics such as global poverty, education for all, peace and conflict, global infectious diseases, uneven access to information and communication technologies, and disasters and emergencies.

Central Catholic has introduced this theme to its IB teachers and it will be integrated into each subject area as opportunities arise. For example, Adele Dahlin's IB English students' summer assignment was to read some folk or fairy tales from other cultures. The students had to summarize each tale and identify the problem or conflict the protagonist faces and what resources he or she uses to solve that problem. In the follow-up assignment, they will write an essay about the similarities and differences in stories from different cultures, discussing themes and issues of humanity that seem to be universal, and analyzing how and why differences exist and how those can be valid too.

"The Sharing Our Humanity theme was already at work during the CCHS students' recent trip to China," said Mary Sue Timar. "It was edifying to see our students' interaction with our Chinese hosts in the school, on the playground, and with their host families."

Honorary Diploma for Gerald Bollin

At the commencement ceremony for the Class of 2009, Gerald Bollin was posthumously presented with an honorary Central Catholic diploma. Bollin was attending CCHS just after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. Many young men who were in high school at the time wanted to defend their country.

During his sophomore year at Central Catholic when he was 17-years-old, Bollin enlisted in the U.S. Navy with his parents' consent. He served on the Aircraft Carrier Ommaney Bay, which sank on January 4, 1945 in the Sulu Sea after a Japanese kamikaze aircraft attack. Bollin survived that day, but 93 of his shipmates did not.

Since Mr. Bollin left Central Catholic to serve his country, he was not able to receive a diploma. Central Catholic chose to present an honorary diploma to his widow, **Bernadette (Holzer) Bollin '43**. Senior **Grant Bollin**, who is Gerald Bollin's grandson, escorted his grandmother to the altar to receive the honorary diploma from Fr. Dennis Hartigan at the ceremony.

Central Catholic High School and St. Vincent Mercy Medical Center have recently teamed up to offer mentoring opportunities for students who may be interested in medical careers.

Central Catholic students have been shadowing Dr. David Ledrick, Assistant Residency Director in the St. Vincent



Department of Emergency Medicine. According to Dr. Ledrick, he came up with the idea of a high school mentoring project as a way to give the students a better idea if they want to pursue medicine and to show them what interns and residents do.

"They see real people who are actually doing this," says Dr. Ledrick. "A kid may be interested in biology or chemistry and they may be directed toward medicine, but unless they actually see what goes on clinically, they may not realize if this is what they really want to do. Medicine is a big commitment. What a tragedy it would be to get there and then realize that's not what you want to be doing."

Although the students have shadowed emergency room residents, the experiences do not take place solely in the ER. Residents also rotate in other areas such as trauma, neurosurgery, and ICU, so the students have an opportunity to see what goes on in other departments as well. "This is valuable for the students, but there is also something of value for the residents here who do the mentoring," Dr. Ledrick says. "They can remember why it was exciting for them to get into this in the first place."

Senior **Kate LePla** had the opportunity to shadow Dr. Ledrick in the emergency room last spring. She saw a patient in cardiac arrest and helped when a child who was in a car accident

was having his vitals taken, and she witnessed an ultrasound. She decided to participate in the mentoring program because she is interested in a health care career, possibly as an OB/GYN. "Everything was very fast-paced and I learned a lot," said LePla. "I was always seeing something new. I was wearing scrubs, and at one point they thought I was a resident and they wanted me to get in there and be more active with the patients!"

Dr. Ledrick would like to see this mentoring program continue and become a routine part of the St. Vincent Mercy residency program.

Several students from Central Catholic also attended a research day at St. Vincent Mercy Medical Center in May. The students were paired up with medical students from the hospital's CORE program and they took a tour of the hospital and the LifeFlight area. They also listened to a speaker and had an opportunity to ask questions.

Benefit Concert is a BIG Hit

A group of Central Catholic High School students, parents, alumni, and the community are continuing efforts to see that the Brian Clark

family gets a home makeover "Irish Style." On May 1, a benefit concert featuring Grammy nominated *Sanctus Real* was held at Central Catholic's Sullivan Center. Proceeds from the concert have been used to provide a kitchen renovation for the Clark family. Approximately 1,000 people attended the benefit concert and \$20,000 was raised to help in the renovation efforts.

Mr. Clark had a chance to appear on stage at the concert to publicly thank

everyone involved in this undertaking for his family, and he also sent a heart-felt note to everyone on the faculty and staff at CCHS. "It has been humbling and even a little embarrassing for (my wife) Sue and I...but we are so very grateful for all that has been done for us," he said. "The concert was the culmination of things that have been going on for over a year here because of the parents, students, faculty, and staff of Central Catholic High School. You are the best! Thank

you, thank you, thank you!"

On July 24 and 25, several faculty and staff members from Central Catholic, as well as some students and other members of the community, began the kitchen renovations by cleaning and removing appliances, cabinets, counter tops, ceiling tiles, drywall, and flooring. Then a professional contractor took over and completed the renovation.

To date, the CCHS community has

successfully completed the roof replacement, the replacement of the main sewer line from the Clarks' home to the street, and upgrades to the electrical system throughout the home. The kitchen was finished in August, and painting of the home exterior was expected to be complete in September.

Central Catholic Club Honors Flag

Last fall, Central Catholic American History and Government teacher **Tony Katafiasz '93**

created the Old Glory Club with the goal of bringing more honor to the American flag. Club members care for the flag in front of the school building and learn proper procedures for handling the flag, as well as why certain things are done the way they are. Katafiasz is a Marine Corps veteran who served at Camp LeJeune, North Carolina from 1993 to 1997.

When he originally formed the club, Katafiasz was also hoping to raise

money to build a memorial at the base of the flag listing deceased CCHS alumni who were veterans. Recently, a newspaper article has helped the club's cause.

On Memorial Day, the *Toledo Blade* ran a story about **Mary (Grey) Worden '57** who has been placing a flag on the grave of **Vito Bruno '60** at Calvary Cemetery in Toledo since she met Bruno's mother there more than 10 years ago. Worden happened to be placing a flag on the grave of her mother and father at the time, and Bruno's mother asked her where she had gotten the flag. Bruno was killed in Vietnam when he was only in his 20s. Worden gave her flag to Bruno's mother that day at the cemetery, and each year since then, she and her husband have placed a flag on his grave. They also sweep off the marker and trim the grass around it.

Worden says she never ran into Bruno's mother again, but she did see that she passed away several years after their meeting. So she and her husband, William, began caring for the mother's grave each year as well.

This year, it became difficult for Worden to follow through on her placement of the flag on Bruno's grave. She never learned to drive, and her husband is in hospice care. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on May 9. One of her husband's hospice caretakers offered to deliver the flag for her this year.

Worden has been communicating with many others serving in the military over the years, and she has scrapbooks of letters and photographs detailing their communications. As she told the *Blade*, "It is our duty to remember veterans and make sure they are recognized for what they do for our country. My belief is honor above all."

Although many volunteers place flags on the graves of veterans each Memorial Day, many

graves get missed because cemetery records are incomplete. Worden wants to make sure that a flag continues to be placed on Vito Bruno's grave each year, so she contacted Central Catholic to see if any students would be able to help out.

Students in the Old Glory Club were more than willing to take on the task. To honor all deceased alumni who have served our country, Katafiasz and members of the club are planning to drive to local cemeteries to place flags on the gravesites for Veteran's Day and Memorial Day.

"If anyone reading this has a deceased family member, classmate, or friend who graduated from Central Catholic and served in the military, I would appreciate having those names sent to me so I can verify them and get them on the list," Katafiasz says.

Since the *Blade* ran the article on Memorial Day, the Old Glory Club has received not only recognition, but also several donations to help with the costs of the flag placement and the planned memorial.


The CCHS Reads program began at Central Catholic during the 2006-07 school year to encourage students to read for fun. In the program, teachers and students read the same book and then study it as it is incorporated into classroom lessons. CCHS Reads is designed to promote lifelong reading by encouraging students to read and discuss an author's work before and after the author visits the school for an all-school assembly.

Coach Dungy is a former professional football player and NFL coach. He played for the Pittsburgh Steelers, San Francisco 49ers, and New York Giants. Dungy was head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996 to 2001 and the Indianapolis Colts from 2002 to 2008. He became the first African-American head coach to win the Super Bowl when the Colts defeated the Chicago Bears in 2007. He retired from coaching in January of 2009.

In his book, *Uncommon*, Dungy reveals lessons on achieving significance, particularly focusing on what it means to be a man of significance in a culture that is offering young men few positive

role models.

"I have been married to the wonderful Donald Hunter for 14 years this past July," Lisa says of her life outside of school. "He works at Fermi Nuclear Power Plant and is a Sergeant in the Army National Guard. When we have free time together you will find us working in the yard, doing home projects, or off in nature hiking and looking for turtles. In my solo spare time I enjoy running, cycling, yoga, reading, writing and wandering aimlessly outdoors. My husband and I also spend some of our time in the summer at our family trailer on the shores of Lake Erie. Meet Our Staff Denise Usher Pastoral Counselor



Denise (Guy) Usher is one of the many staff members at Central Catholic who are also alumni. She was born in Toledo and attended St. Francis de Sales grade

school downtown, and she graduated from CCHS in 1968. During high school, she earned a varsity letter for bowling and was a member of the National Honor Society. Denise went on to earn bachelor and master's degrees from Bowling Green State University. Her undergraduate degree is in speech pathology and audiology, and her graduate degree is in higher education with a concentration in counseling.

Denise has always worked with adolescents. Over the years she has worked at Children's Services, Juvenile Court, and as the lead counselor on the adolescent unit at the Toledo Hospital Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center. Before coming to CCHS, she worked for a short time in the schools office at the Catholic Diocese.

Denise started working at Central Catholic in 1994 as the dean of women, and then later was asked by Fr. Billian to take over the position of pastoral counselor. The position has evolved over the years, and Denise says each day is different. "Our youth today are faced with many issues and responsibilities," she explains. "Sometimes children get caught in the middle of so much emotional stress that school suffers. Between the Intervention Assistance Team (IAT)) and myself, a plan is developed to assist the student."

Some of the issues that Denise helps students with include divorce, family violence, drug and alcohol abuse, death, family illness, and returning to school after long illnesses. She visits hospitals, homes, funeral homes, treatment centers, etc. - whatever it takes to help get a student on track. Along with her other duties, Denise and school nurse Jan Florian facilitate grief support groups and a support group for students diagnosed with depression.

"I am not the authority on anything," Denise says of her CCHS position. "Sometimes people, parents, students need someone to give them hope until the crisis and pain lessen. Partnering with parents is essential. So there are lots of meetings and communication. I absolutely love what I do. The kids keep me feeling young, the parents show me their love for their children.

One Faith. One Community. One Mission.

I never judge parenting skills. We all do what we can do on any given day with the tools and resources we have available. Some have many tools, some have none. My ear is always willing to listen when a student or parent is in need."

Being able to work at Central Catholic is also very special to Denise. "Coming to CCHS felt like I came home," she says. "It is comforting to be able to work and practice my faith in the same place."

The support of the Central Catholic community also meant a lot to Denise when she went through a difficult time of her own. Her husband died unexpectedly three years ago. She was grateful that she could put her daughter, Elizabeth, in the CCHS grief support group, but she felt unable to facilitate the group herself. So another counselor took her place for the entire year. "That is the CCHS family," Denise says.

Denise has two children - John '00 and Elizabeth '08 - and a 17-month-old granddaughter. John went on to graduate from the University of Cincinnati and lives in Columbus, Ohio. Elizabeth is starting her second year at the University of Toledo.

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Meet Our Coach Joe Hoppe Boys' Soccer



Joe Hoppe has been coaching varsity soccer for the Fighting Irish since the 1991-1992 season. He grew up in Point Place and attended Ottawa River Elementary and Leverette

Junior High, and he graduated from Cardinal Stritch High School. He went on to earn a business degree specializing in marketing and industrial sales from the University of Toledo.

Joe says that he and the other soccer coaches at CCHS expect the players to continually put forth the necessary mental and physical effort that will help them improve and gain success individually and as a team. "The players need to prepare on their own so we can work with them on the details and on team strategies and actions," he explains. "The team program is first. We also look to improve within each season. Our success is based on these things, so if we do this, then most years we will see wins in our league and in tournament play."

Joe says that the two most memorable teams from his coaching years are from his first two years at CCHS. "The teams in 1991-92 and 1992-93 stand out because they were my first teams," he says. "The players had confidence, wanted to work, and wanted to be successful. We had a great bond. The second year's team won the most games in a season at CCHS – 13. It was very much team oriented play, and the players overall were good individually. But with those years and every one after, what stands out are the many players that affected me in some positive way and remain in my thoughts. Far too many to list - but I'm fortunate that I still get to see so many of them. There have also been some memorable wins throughout the years, a few league championships, and many, many team and individual awards, on the field and academically."

The Irish soccer team has received the All-Ohio Academic Award from the Ohio Scholastic Soccer Coaches Association (OSSCA) for the last eight years - since the award's inception. The award is given to varsity soccer teams in Ohio that are members of the OSSCA and have attained a cumulative team grade point average of at least a 3.0 while competing on the field. The team has also earned the district sportsmanship award twice, and Hoppe has been named league Coach of the Year three times and district Coach of the Year four times.

Joe is a soccer player himself. He started playing the game in fifth grade in the Point Place Soccer League. His high school did not have a team, so he played travel soccer for a Toledo team called the Rovers. Two of his teammates were CCHS government and economics teacher **Larry Nester '86** and vice president of institutional advancement **Pat Williams '87**. From 1986 through the late 1990s, Joe played for the Hungarian Soccer Club in the Toledo Men's League and has since played for the Bavarian Sports Club. He had to take a little time off about a year and a half ago for a partial knee replacement, but he was able to get back on the playing field.

Joe began coaching at CCHS right out of college. Prior to that, his coaching experiences included a Point Place house league, local soccer camps, and helping with basketball and girls' soccer at Maumee Valley Country Day School. At Central Catholic, Joe says he sees a strong environment for the students to learn and grow. "Not just academically, but socially, because CCHS has kids from so many different areas and experiences," he explains. "I've seen the kids 'get it.' They interact, they fall into this melting pot."

Although Joe coaches for Central Catholic, he actually has a "day job" with Dana Holding Corporation. His office is located at the technology building in Maumee, and he works in communication and marketing as a manager of web content and policies. He also works in business intelligence, helping to analyze markets, customers, and competitors globally.

A Holy War

When the Fighting Irish take on the Knights of St. Francis de Sales at Gallagher Stadium on Friday, October 9, it will mark the 50th anniversary of this highly anticipated yearly battle between the teams as they fight for the coveted Irish Knight trophy.

The first battle took place on November 8, 1959 at the University of Toledo Glass Bowl and was won by St. Francis 28-0. It marked the first football game between two Toledo Catholic high schools in over 20 years. The St. Francis team was coached by Bob Recker, who was a 1949 CCHS graduate, and the Fighting Irish were under the leadership of Tom McHugh '50.

The concept of the Irish Knight trophy came from then CCHS athletic director, Tim Dever, and Sr. Mary Genevieve of the Central Catholic art department who wanted to create some kind of prize to be presented to the winner of the regular season contest each year. The resulting knight with armor covered in shamrocks was dubbed the Irish Knight. The current trophy was designed in 1960, and each year the score of the contest and the name of the winning coach has been inscribed on its base.

A special commemorative program about the 50-year battle for the Irish Knight is available at home football games for \$10 and 100% of the proceeds goes to the football program. It includes the history of the battle, individual game summaries, and rivalry records.

The annual Central Catholic Athletic Hall of Fame dinner and induction took place September 10 at the CCHS Sullivan Center.

The following inductees are being honored this year...

Jeff Seemann '72 – Seemann earned three varsity letters with the Fighting Irish basketball team. Seemann was awarded a full-ride basketball scholarship to Furman University.

Bob Calabrese '77 – Calabrese was one of the top sprinters in the area as a member of the CCHS track team. He also played football and was named First Team All-City twice. He was named All-District as a senior, and the team won its first Red Division title in eight years that season. Calabrese broke the school's all time receptions record, both for a season and for a career.

Gretchen Weiher '94 – Weiher was a member of the All-City track team during her junior and senior seasons, but her biggest accomplishments occurred with the Lady Irish cross country team. She was First Team All-City and First Team All-District as a sophomore, junior, and senior, and was named Second Team All-State as a junior. Her senior team placed second in the state meet and was ranked 24th in the nation.

Josh Lenix '99 – Lenix was a two-time letter winner with the Fighting Irish football team and a two-time City League wrestling champion. Lenix finished with just one loss en route to the state heavyweight wrestling title as a senior. He is the only individual state wrestling champion in Central Catholic history.

1997-1998 Girls' Basketball Team – The Lady Irish finished with a record of 25-2 and won City League, sectional, district, and regional titles to advance to the state championships. They lost by just one point to Dayton Chaminade in the title game.

Tim Dever '77 - Citizen's Award

Dever earned four varsity letters in tennis at Central Catholic and was named First Team All-City as a senior. Dever has been a valuable asset to the Central Catholic athletic department for many years, serving as the chairman of the athletic committee from 1999 to 2005. He was the Fighting Irish boys' varsity tennis coach from 1982 to 1983 and again from 2004 to 2008, compiling an overall record of 66-34.

Sports Shorts

Congratulations to all of our student athletes who participated on sports teams during the spring. Here are some highlights from their seasons...

BASEBALL – The defending City League champions once again played in the title game, but lost to the Clay Eagles 8-6. Kyle Burkhardt '10 was named First Team All-State. He was also named First Team All-City along with teammates Jeff Balogh '09, Cody Carr '09, and Jason Comte '09. Seven senior players were named to the Toledo City League All Academic Team – Tyler Ankenbrandt, Jeff Balogh, Jason Comte, Jordan Duckett, Phil Dysard, Josh Felix, and Kenny Heban. Balogh, Comte, Dysard, and Felix were also included in the Ohio High School Baseball Coaches Association All Academic State Team. Only six players from the Toledo City League received this honor, and four were from Central Catholic. The Fighting Irish "On Deck Circle" is now up and running. SOFTBALL - The Lady Irish had their best season in many years, compiling a record of 19-9, which is tied for the third most wins in a season in school history. The team lost to Clay in the City League championship game, but won sectional and district championships for the second time in school history. All seniors were selected to the All Academic team – Alex Davis, Emily Grau, Fallon Matuszewski, Emily Sifuentes, Maggie Stein, Ashley Sujkowski, and Ashleigh Whitacre. Sujkowski joined freshman pitcher Erin Seiler on the All-City team. Seiler won 16 games, striking out 255 batters in 170 innings and had an ERA of 0.74.

BOYS' TENNIS – The 2009 team finished fourth in the City League. **Andrew Troy '11** finished third in the City League at the number two singles position and was sectional runner-up with **Chris Barrow '11** in doubles, which qualified them for district play. **Spencer Toral '10** finished third in the City League at the number three singles position.

BOYS' TRACK AND FIELD – The Irish team finished seventh in the City League and ninth at the district meet.

GIRLS' TRACK AND FIELD - The girls' 4x800 relay team broke the City League record, running 9:36 in the rain. Team members were **Kaitlyn Krizman, Arika Knannlein, Kelly Karcher,** and **Anne McCarthy**. The old record was held by the CCHS girls' squad from 1994. Congratulations to the other City League champions: Anne McCarthy - 800 meters in 2:19 and **Alexxis Knannlein** - high jump at 5'2". The 3200-meter school record was broken by Kelly Karcher with a time of 11:30. The girls' 4x400 relay team qualified for the state meet, running 3:58. Team members included Kaitlyn Krizman, Arika Knannlein, Anne McCarthy, and **Kaila Blanchard**. Seniors Anne McCarthy and Kelly Karcher will continue their running careers at Notre Dame and Mississippi State, respectively.

BOYS' LACROSSE – This was the inaugural season for lacrosse at Central Catholic. The team of 32 competed in the Ohio High School Lacrosse Association, Division 2. The team's overall record was 7-15, including two varsity wins over Bedford and Anthony Wayne. The Irish also participated in the state tournament and represented the school well in a 13-7 loss to Bay Village, a fourth year team. **Kane Anderson** (defense) and **Brandon Troup** (goalie) received City Honorable Mention awards for their efforts this season. Coach Marty Ratcliffe and the team are thankful to the school administration, parents, and student volunteers for their tremendous support this season.


