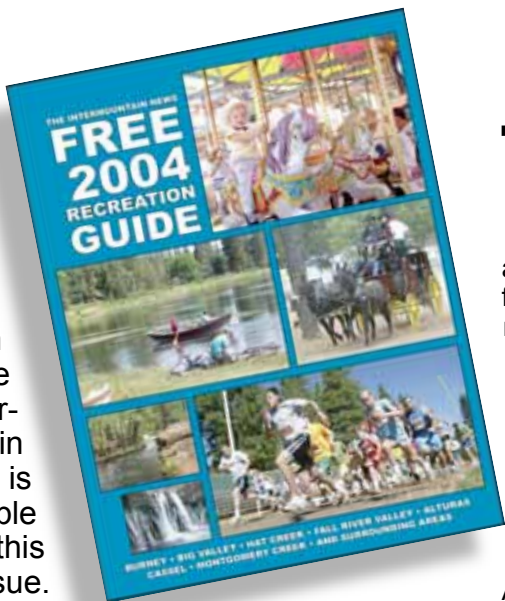

Surveys now show a drop in stored H₂O

What began this year as a better than average snow and water year has turned to a normal to below normal statistic in the Thousand Lakes Wilderness area.

"Looks like we are below average on the east side with at or just below normal on the west side," said snow survey coordinator Doug Young.

Snow surveys at Thousand Lakes Wilderness Jan. 29 showed better than average snow depths and water content equal to 10 year averages.

But this month's report showed a different trend.

The most recent snow depth measured 80.7 inches, compared to a 10-year average of 82.9 inches. Last year's measurement was 73 inches. The all-time recorded depth was 152.5 inches in 1983. The lowest recorded was 9.2 inches in 1963.

Water content measured 38.4 inches (48% density). The 10-year average is 36.5 inches (43% density). Last year measured 35 inches (48% density).

In 1952 the water content was 71.4 inches. In 1963 the water content was 2.9 inches (43% density).

The most recent measurements were similar to those recorded in 1967, 1978, 1983, and 2000.

The Blacks Mountain Course data shows a snow depth of 11.3 inches compared to a 10-year average of 19.64 inches. Last year at this time 12 inches was recorded. The record was recorded in 1983 with 61 inches. the lowest recorded in 2001 with no snow found.

For the Burney Springs course, no measurable snow was found this time. The 10-year average is 1.95 inches and the all-time high was 40.4 inches recorded in 1952. There have been multiple low years when no measurable snow was found.

All information is based on historical data which dates back to 1947.

The snow survey team is from the Lassen National Forest, Hat Creek Ranger District and includes Greg Mayer, Mark Steele, Jason Gritzner, Doug Young, Linda Wrenn, Jess Brunk, John Hubbard and Luke Strohmeier.

The Thousand Lakes Wilderness snow course is measured four times a year from January to May.

This information is compiled for the State of California and is used primarily for stream flow forecasting.

Nice opening day expected for beginning of trout season

With a twinge of anxiety about impending summer and fall water conditions, the Department of Fish and Game's Region 1 office has predicted excellent opportunities for anglers taking advantage of Saturday's opening weekend for stream trout fishing.

"The water levels are going to be great; nicely fishable," said Ray Nicholls of Shasta Angler. "It will be a great fishing

season with increased sizes of insects and larger fish."

DFG warden Lt. Ken Taylor, whose territory covers eastern Shasta County and beyond said "Stream opening should be good, but with some high water."

Steve Vaughn of Vaughn's Sporting Goods in Burney said Tuesday the conditions couldn't be better.

"All the waters are perfect,

including the Pit River," he said. "The Pit River is not going to spill."

Many streams have a daily limit of five trout and a possession limit of 10, with exceptions in the trophy trout areas of Fall River, Hat Creek and McCloud River where the limit is two fish or catch and release. Daily fishing hours for trout run from an hour before sunrise to an hour after sunset.

Wilson waits for this weekend pro football draft

Mark Wilson would just like it to be over.

The Fall River High School graduate and soon to be Cal alumni may become the first athlete from the Intermountain area to be selected in the NFL draft, which happens Saturday and Sunday.

Although other local athletes have signed as free agents — most recently Burney High graduate Robby Snelling who got a tryout with the Tennessee Titans — Wilson may be the first from the area to hear his name called out on national television.

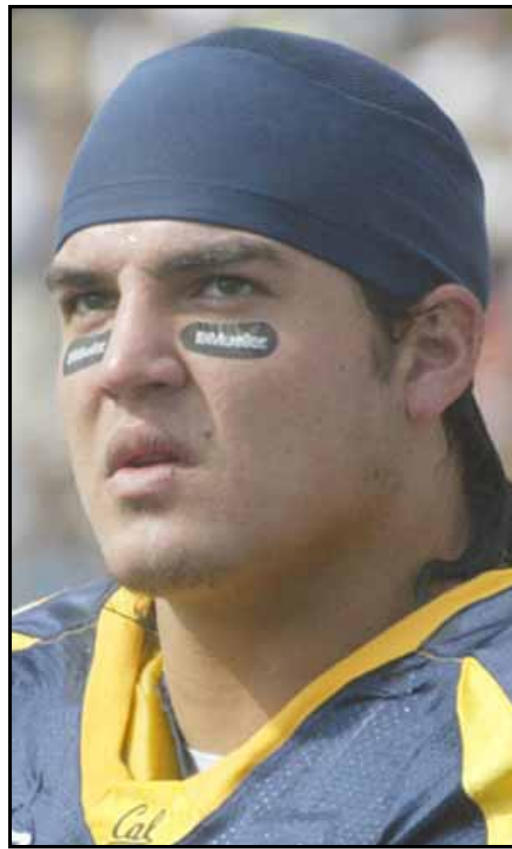
"Yea, I'm getting a little anxious," Wilson said in a phone call from Cal where he was watching this year's Bears team play a spring football game. "I wish it would be over."

What's making him most anxious is not knowing when he will be selected or where he might be headed.

After Cal's season ended, Wilson headed down to Arizona where he worked out with a trainer as he tried to increase his already large frame prior to the NFL combine.

It seemed to work.

Bailey Community Park in Burney needs to raise \$20,000 to pay the cost of an annual insurance premium while the park's amphitheater, walking trails, lawns and other landscaping are under construction.

"The park cannot exist without insurance, said Cindy Dodds, executive director of Tri County Community Network, the non-profit organization coordinating development of the park. TCCN is currently working with their insurance carrier to try and lower the annual cost.

The inflated insurance cost reflects a challenging insurance market and the non-traditional nature of the park - a community driven effort being sponsored by a non-profit organization, said Dodds.

"Customarily, parks are owned by city or county government or special districts," she said. "We expect costs to decrease when the community develops infrastructure to manage and maintain recreational facilities."

TCNN needs to raise the \$20,000 by July 31. To date, \$3,451 has been raised.

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Dedication slated for state-of-the-art fire center

Northeast California's fire-fighting agencies will unveil a new state of the art emergency dispatch center in a public dedication ceremony and open house Thursday.

Events begin at 10:30 a.m. at the new Susanville Inter-agency Fire Center Building, 1491 Fifth St., Susanville.

Comments from local dignitaries and agency officials will be followed by dispatch center tours and refreshments.

"Opening of this new center is a tribute to the hard work and cooperation of the fire center agencies," said Chuck Judd, one of three co-managers of the center.

"The new facility gives us the work space we need and the most current computerized radio dispatching equip-

ment available."

The 9,000 square-foot dispatch center has double the work space of the original SIFC dispatch center that began operation in 1974.

The heart of the center is a six-console dispatch "floor" where staff can direct responses to fires and other emergencies over a 6.5-million acre swath of Northeast California and Northwest Nevada.

There is office space for dispatchers, and living quarters and kitchen space for the dispatchers who keep the center operational 24 hours a day.

Additionally, the facility has space for "expanded dispatch" operations put into place to support major fires or other emergencies.

The interagency fire center was formed in 1974, when the Lassen National Forest and local Bureau of Land Management district combined emergency dispatching services.

Lassen Volcanic National Park was the third federal agency to join.

The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection joined the organization in 1984, and the center has continued to be a model of state-federal, interagency cooperation.

In addition to supporting state and federal fire fighting organizations, SIFC dispatchers serve 20 local fire depart-

ments and one ambulance company throughout the region, dispatching fire crews and coordinating emergency 911 responses.

SIFC agencies respond to emergencies using the "clos-

est available resources" concept.

When an emergency arises, SIFC dispatchers send the closest crews or fire engines, regardless of agency jurisdiction.

The approach provides the quickest response and efficient use of tax dollars.

Community members planning to attend the dedication will find plenty of parking at the Lassen National Forest

vehicle yard just west of the dispatch center.

Resource topics on RAC list for talks

The Bureau of Land Management's Resource Advisory Councils (RAC) for Northeast California and Northwest Nevada will discuss a wide range of natural resource topics, when they meet in joint session and individually April 29 and 30 in the Conference Center of John Asquaga's Nugget, Sparks.

All sessions are open to the public. Time for public comment is reserved on April 29 at 4 p.m.

On April 29, the Northeast California and the Sierra Front/Northwest Great Basin RACs convene a joint session at 8 a.m.

Agenda items include an update on implementation of the management plan for the Black Rock Desert-High Rock Canyon-Emigrant Trails National Conservation Area.

Members of both advisory councils worked with the BLM to develop that plan.

The joint meeting also includes discussion of law enforcement issues and challenges, and a panel discussion titled, "Increasing Use, Decreasing Means on Public Lands in Nevada and California."

On April 30, the advisory councils convene separate meetings at 8 a.m.

Members of the Northeast California RAC will discuss development of land use plans for BLM-managed lands in Northeast California and Northwest Nevada.

They will also hear a status report on a juniper management strategy, review and comment on a BLM request for California off-highway vehicle grant funds, discuss sage grouse conservation planning, and discuss a draft policy for livestock grazing during drought.


The Sierra Front/Northwest Great Basin RAC members will discuss monitoring at the Sand Mountain Recreation Area, hear an update on sage grouse conservation planning and hold a voluntary session to discuss a project at Soldier Meadows.

Each advisory council is comprised of 15 members who advise BLM managers on the full range of the BLM's public lands management responsibilities.

The Northeast California group works with managers in Susanville, Alturas and Cedarville.

The Sierra Front/Northwest Great Basin RAC works with managers in the BLM Carson City and Winnemucca, Nev., districts.

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Wilson increases weight before draft

Although he weighed 305-pounds at December's Insight Bowl game, Wilson said he had put on "some bad weight."

By the time of the combine, he had increased his weight to 317 pounds on his 6-foot-7 frame, while also lowering his body fat.

"I think I had the lowest body fat of any tackles there," he said, saying it was at 14.23 percent.

Wilson said he thought he did well at the combine, which is where most of the athletes in the country converge in February to give all the NFL teams a chance to see the players work out prior to the draft.

In addition to regular workouts for all the teams, including running the 40-yard dash (he did it in 5.4 seconds), Wilson said he was also asked to perform at specific workouts for the Houston Texans, the Cleveland Browns, the San Francisco 49ers and the Oakland Raiders.

But he said he couldn't gage how any of them felt about his performance.

"They don't let on," he said. "They keep a real straight face."

He said he'd like to stay on the west coast, but really doesn't have a preference of a specific team he'd like to play for.

Wilson's agent is Ethan Lock, who also represented John Tait, a first-round draft choice in 1999, and Jordan Gross, a tackle who was selected with the eight pick overall last year.

So-called experts in draft analysis have graded the athletes on their strengths and weaknesses, including Scouts, Inc., whose analysis have been posted on ESPN.com's website.

They noted that: "Wilson has terrific height, frame, decent feet, quick set and good lateral movement." Also, they said, he was one of the most durable athletes in the country, not missing a game during his college career due to injury.

"And he was one of the most efficient pass blockers in the nation the last two seasons," they wrote.

But they also said he was undersized for a left tackle and slow and would be a risk to draft before the sixth round. They also suggested he might have to move inside to guard or center.

In a mock draft they had him going as the 177th pick overall in the sixth round to the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Wilson said he's never heard any of that, only that he might have to switch to right tackle. But generally, he said, he just ignores all that analysis, good or bad.

"I've been told not to pay too much attention to that stuff," he said. "If they went by that, they wouldn't have to hold the draft."

One area he unquestionably shined at the combine is the infamous Wonderlic, a 12-minute, 50 question IQ test that most athletes don't even finish.

The average NFL prospect reportedly scores a 21, which is about the same as the average applicant for any other job, ESPN.com said on their website. A 20 indicates a test-taker has an IQ of 100, which is average.

"A score of 10 is literacy," Charlie Wonderlic Jr., president of Wonderlic Inc., reportedly told ESPN.com in 2002.

While three athletes scored in the 40s, Wilson was one of only about 25 athletes to score in the 30s.

By comparison, the Miami Hurricanes, who may have the best draft class in the nation with eight prospects, all scored between a high of 23 and a low of 7.

Wilson said he seemed to think that test was important to the NFL teams.

So maybe that Cal education will pay off.

Wilson said that whether the NFL works out or not, he eventually would like to live in a small town again.

"Before I came here, I thought it would be great to live (in a big city)," he said, noting he expected there would be a lot to do — and there is.

"But it costs a lot of money," he said.

Wilson, an American Studies major with an emphasis on Nature in America, said he thinks he'd like to be a park ranger some day.

Perhaps Burney Falls?

"That'd be great," he said.

Wilson is expected to return home today. His mom, Terese Hayes, says he's going to lay a brick patio for her and then the family will wait to see what happens at the draft.

The NFL draft, which is seven rounds long, is scheduled to be televised on ESPN and ESPN2 Saturday and Sunday.

Utility pays its franchise fees

Pacific Gas and Electric Company has announced it has made its 2003 franchise fee and franchise fee surcharge payments, totaling \$128 million, to the 292 California cities and counties in which it operates.

The 2003 payments are comprised of \$50.8 million for gas and \$77.6 million for electric service franchises and surcharges.

"As local governments face extremely tight budgets, Pacific Gas and Electric Company recognizes the importance of its franchise fee payments to cities and counties," said Kent Harvey, chief financial officer of Pacific Gas and Electric Company.

"These revenues, in part, support the many important services residents expect from their local government — police and fire protection, education, public health, and environmental services."

Franchise fee payments fluctuate depending on the costs utility customers pay for gas and electricity.

The 2003 franchise fee payments represent a 13 percent increase over the 2002 payments — which were \$34.4 million for gas and \$78.6 million for electric — due to increased natural gas prices.

A franchise fee is based on a percentage of gross customer receipts received by Pacific Gas and Electric

Company, and is paid to cities and counties for the right to use public streets to run gas and electric service.

A franchise fee surcharge is based on a percentage of the transportation and energy costs to customers choosing to buy their energy from third parties.

PG&E serves as the collection agent for the surcharges and passes the amounts on to cities and counties.

PG&E exits its bankruptcy status

In a filing with the U.S. Bankruptcy Court, Pacific Gas and Electric Company stated that all conditions to effectiveness of its plan of reorganization have been satisfied.

The company stated that the effective date of the plan occurred on April 12.

PG&E filed for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code on April 6, 2001.

Under the company's confirmed plan of reorganization, PG&E will pay in full or otherwise satisfy undisputed claims of creditors on the effective date or as soon as practicable thereafter.

Undisputed claims to be paid or otherwise satisfied include those relating to PG&E's medium-term notes, floating rate notes, senior notes, first and refunding mortgage bonds, Southern San Joaquin Power Authority Bonds, and commercial paper.

On the effective date or as soon as practicable thereafter holders of these claims were paid 100 percent of the principal amount of these obligations (plus any applicable premium), plus accrued and unpaid interest to April 12.

Separate first quarter interest payments for medium-term notes, floating rate notes, senior notes, Southern San Joaquin Power Authority Bonds, and commercial paper were made on April 1.

The various trustees' records as to holders of these obligations generally will be closed as of March 29, 2004, the distribution record date. Following payment on the effective date, these securities will be retired.

PG&E will pay the principal and all accrued and unpaid interest on all its 7.90 percent Deferrable Interest Subordinated Debentures, or QUIDS.

On the effective date or as soon as practicable thereafter, QUIDS holders of record as of the distribution

record date will be paid principal of \$25 per debenture, or 100 percent of the principal amount totaling \$300 million, plus accrued and unpaid interest from April 1 to April 12 for a total of \$25.060347 per debenture.

A separate interest payment for the quarter ending March 31 was made on that date and the QUIDS were retired.

The transfer agent's books were closed as of the March 29 distribution record date, and trading was suspended. National City Bank of Indiana is the trustee for the QUIDS.

On the effective date or as soon as practicable thereafter, holders of preferred stock will be paid previously unpaid dividends for the period from November 1, 2000 through January 31, 2004.

PG&E has 11 series of preferred stock. The amount of accumulated, unpaid dividends is \$82.3 million.

The American Stock Exchange has advised the company that the ex-dividend date for these payments was April 13.

Also on that date, the company brought current its preferred stock sinking fund obligations.

Two of PG&E's preferred stock series, 6.57 percent and 6.30 percent, have past due sinking fund payments totaling \$10.6 million.

The sinking fund payments will be used to redeem, on a pro rata basis, 10 percent of the 6.57 percent series and 5 percent of the 6.30 percent series.

A redemption price of \$25 will be paid per redeemed share, plus unpaid dividends from Feb. 1 through April 12, 2004.

Holders of redeemed shares of the 6.57 percent series will receive a total of \$25.3285 per redeemed share and holders of redeemed shares of the 6.30 percent series will receive a total of \$25.315 per redeemed share.

Citizens wanted for Grand Jury

You have an opportunity to make a difference!
The Shasta County Superior Court is seeking qualified citizens interested in serving on the Grand Jury for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2004.
The Grand Jury is the only truly independent "watchdog" investigative body in Shasta County.
Composed of 19 citizens, it monitors the performance and activities of county, city, and special district governments, and elected officials and makes recommendations for improvement to ensure that the best interest of its citizens are being served.
While many people associate grand juries with indictments in criminal cases, in Shasta County, criminal cases usually are presented to the Court by the District Attorney.
On rare occasions, the Grand Jury may be asked to consider a criminal matter.
Although Grand Jury investigations often are initiated on the basis of citizen complaints, the Grand Jury also may act on its own initiative to investigate local governments.
Law prohibits Grand Jurors prohibited from disclosing the evidence obtained in their investigations or revealing the names of complainants or witnesses.
Similarly, witnesses are prohibited from disclosing any proceedings of the Grand Jury.
At the end of its term, the Grand Jury issues its report on watchdog investigations.
The report is printed in the Record Searchlight.
If you are interested in serving as a Grand Juror, I urge you to submit your application as soon as possible.
Superior Court Judges will review the applications of candidates and select 30 potential grand jurors.
From this group, a random drawing is held to select the 19 individuals who will serve at the County's Grand Jury for the new fiscal year beginning in July, with the remaining candidates available to serve as alternates should the need arise.
Of the 19 grand jurors selected, one person with leadership and organizational skills is designated as foreperson by the court to preside over meetings of the Grand Jury.
The qualities sought in an individual applying to serve on the Grand Jury include being a good listener, the willingness to cooperate with 18 others in pursuit of a common goal, and the ability to ask thoughtful questions, review documents and help to write lucid reports.
Candidates should have an interest in trying to increase the efficiency of local government and improve public services.
A time commitment of approximately 20 hours per week is necessary to perform this valuable public service.
Please contact Court Administration in Room 205 of the courthouse to obtain an application to serve on the 2004/2005 Grand Jury.
Completed applications will be accepted until May 21, 2004.

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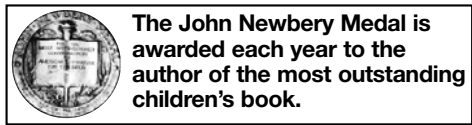

Her first book, "Because of Winn-Dixie" was a Newbery Honor winner. Her second book, "The Tiger Rising," was a National Book Award finalist.

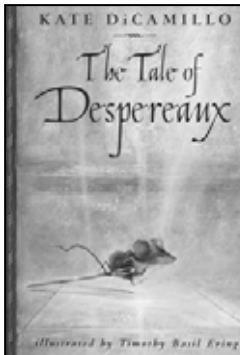
Background

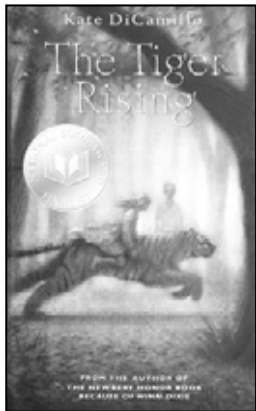

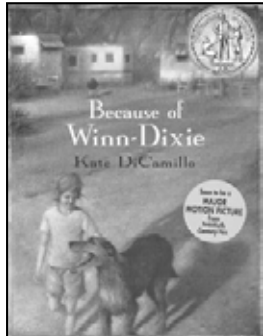

When she is not traveling, she writes two pages a day, and then spends the rest of the day working on other things.

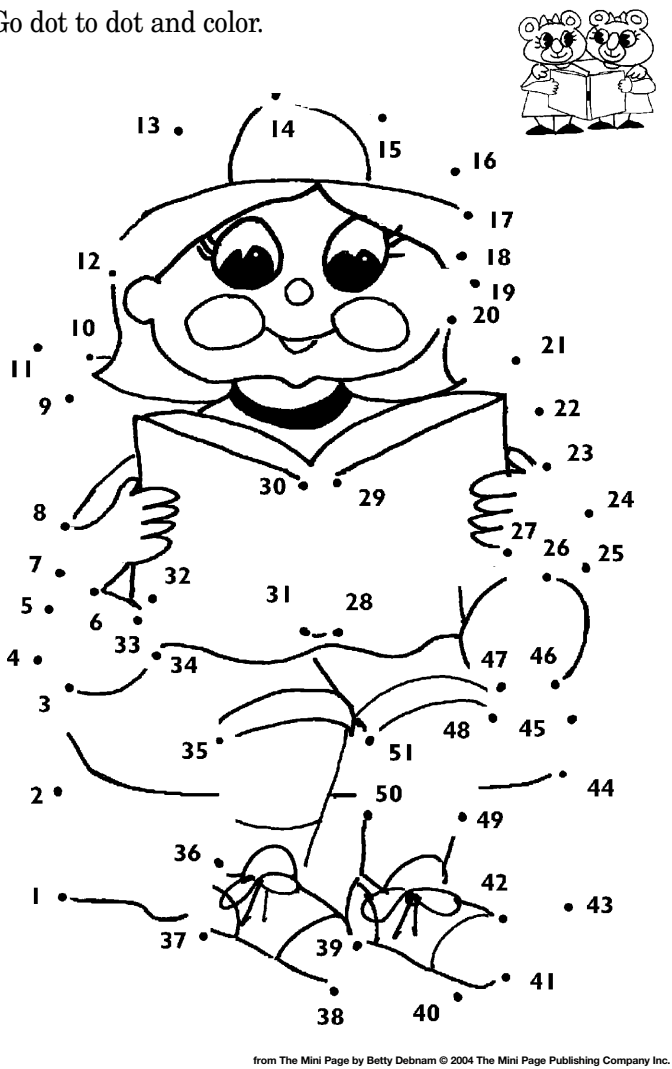
Her book "Because of Winn-Dixie" is being made into a movie scheduled to come out this August. Lately she has been going back and forth to Hollywood quite a bit.

Meet Illustrator Mordicai Gerstein

The Mini Page celebrates National Library Week, April 18-24, with a look at the Caldecott and Newbery medal winners. This year its theme is "@ your library."

The Caldecott Medal is presented each year to the illustrator of the most distinguished picture book for children.

This year's Caldecott winner was Mordicai Gerstein (MORE-duh-kie GER-stine) for "The Man Who Walked Between the Towers."

Background

Mordicai Gerstein said: "I have always drawn. As a kid I used to have shows of my work. I love all kinds of art, from comic books to Old Masters."

After art school, he got a job drawing cartoons in a small animation studio.

About 30 years ago, he began doing illustrations for Elizabeth Levy's children's mystery books. They are both still writing and illustrating books in that series.

He began writing his own children's books, but, he says, "Writing was a challenge. I never dreamed of becoming an author. I didn't know any stories."

After about 10 years, he sold one of his own books, "Arnold of the Ducks," a make-believe story about a child raised by ducks.

From then on, he has mainly illustrated his own stories.

"The Man Who Walked Between the Towers" tells the true story of a tightrope walker who once performed high above the ground between the Twin Towers.

Mordicai Gerstein, 68, has written and illustrated more than 30 books. He has also illustrated many books written by other authors.

His work

Mordicai Gerstein gets up at about 5:30 a.m., then rides his bike 6 to 12 miles to his studio. He takes the longer journey whenever the weather is good.

If he has a book deadline, he might illustrate all day, five days a week. Otherwise, he writes in the morning, then illustrates in the afternoon.

He started writing "The Man Who Walked Between the Towers" right after the Sept. 11 tragedy. He wanted to show kids the magic the World Trade Center towers had for people.

At first no publishers wanted to buy it because they thought it would be too upsetting. So he put it aside until more time had passed since the tragedy.

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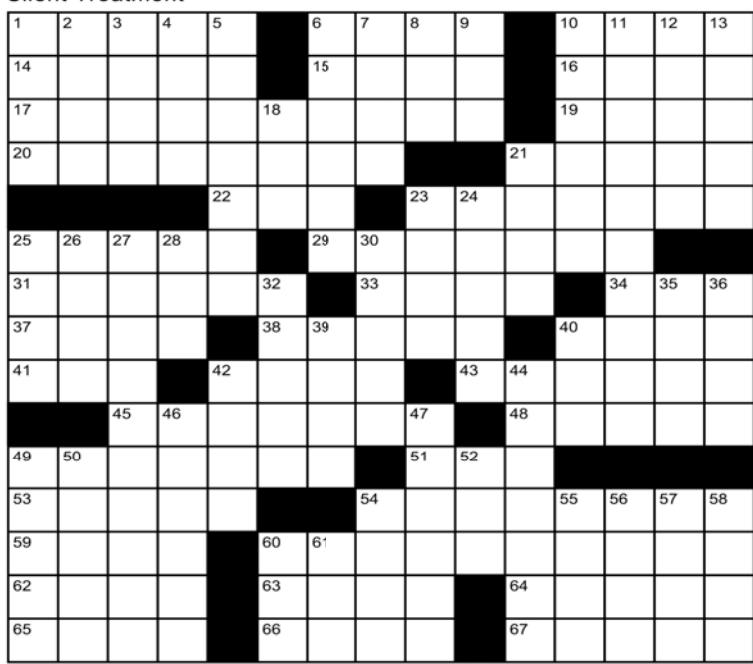

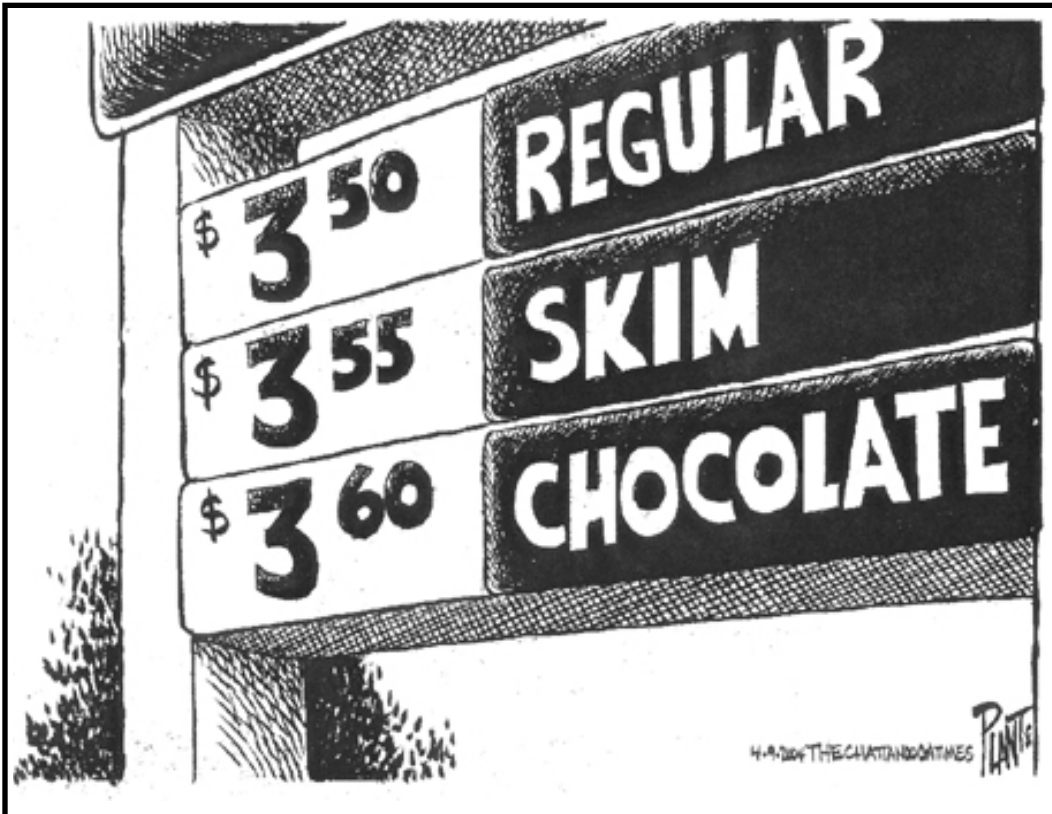

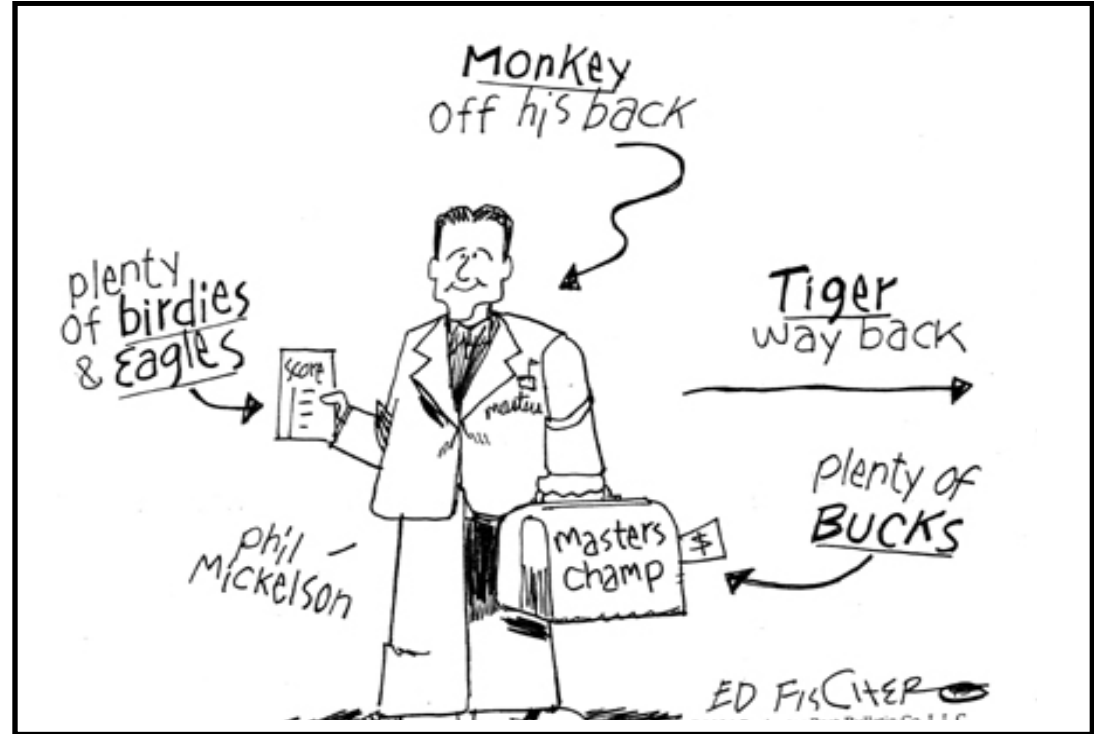
