#### AN INTERVIEW WITH GOD

I asked God a question during an interview: "What's the one thing that surprises you most about mankind? He answered:

- ❖ "That they get bored of being children, are in a rush to grow up, and then long to be children again.
- ❖That they lose their health to make money and then lose their money to restore their health.
- ❖That by thinking anxiously about the future, they forget the present, such that they live neither for the present nor the future.
- That they live as if they will never die, and they die as if they never had lived..."

His hands took mine and we were silent. After a long period, I said, "May I ask you another question?" He replied with a smile. "As a Father, what would You ask Your children to do for the future?" He didn't need to think about this answer.

"I would like them to learn...

that what is most valuable is not what they have in their lives, but who they have in their lives.

- ❖That a rich person is not one who has the most, but one who needs the least.
- That they should control their attitudes, otherwise their attitudes will control them.
- To forgive by practicing forgiveness.
- That money can buy everything but happiness.
- ❖That while, at times, they may be entitled to be upset, that not does not give them the right to upset those around them.
- That true friends are scarce; he or she who has found one has found a true treasure.
- ❖That they are masters of what they keep to themselves and slaves to what they say.
- ❖That true happiness is not achieved by their goals but to learn to be satisfied with what they already achieved.
- ❖That happiness is a decision. They decide to be happy with what they are and have, or die from envy and jealousy of what they lack.

# Speaking of Stewardship...

The following is adapted from an article by Fr. Remus Grama of St. Mary Romanian Orthodox Cathedral in Cleveland.

## Are you of Christ or of Google?

Every now and then my phone rings: "Hello, Father, could you please give me the phone number of Mr. X?" I remember Mr. X, a very nice man. I visit him and he calls me when he needs the priest or the Church.

"Of course," I answer. "I will be glad to help you. Mr. X is one of our good members. I see him in church every week. Please wait a minute."

Feverishly, I check the Parish Directory. But his name is not there! Obviously, he must be an older or newest list, so I go there. Oh, no - not there either! I ask the person on hold to hang in there for another minute. I page the parish Secretary to clarify this situation, but she confidently tells me that "Mr. X. is not a paid member of the parish, therefore, his name, address and phone number cannot be easily located."

Disappointed, I reconnect with the caller and explain as best as I can that, "For the time being, we are not able to help, for we do not have the number. Please check the phone book or perhaps you could *Google* this name on whitepages.com. Sorry, he is not on our list, at this time." Without further comment, I wonder: What about last year? Maybe next year?

I ask myself how it is possible for a regular Orthodox Christian NOT to be a member of the Church from where he receives Holy Communion, and ultimately salvation. There are so many Orthodox Christians throughout our city and country. When they need the parish support for citizenship, work references, scholarship recommendations, or work promotions, the priest must be there for them. Like so many other times, when I need to contact members to enlist their support as volunteers for a Festival or other projects, I find myself once again let down. Wouldn't you feel the same if you were me?

The Priest is always one phone call away, but how about each of us? If you are of Christ, you should be on the Parish list, for this proves your love and allegiance to the Lord and His Church. If we are blessed by God to have a computer and to get on Google, we should be grateful and give back to the Lord and the community some sense of support, as we are able. At the Last Judgment, when the Lord will be looking for us, He will call His elect, or those sealed in Christ by the Holy Church. Her saints- not Google- will judge the world and testify for each of us.

Of course, the vibrancy of the Church is reflected in the relationship between members and the common good we are able to accomplish together. In fact, the living spirit of a parish community is defined by each one of us. Let each one decide for him or herself: Am I of Christ or of *Google? Google, Facebook, Twitter* or others can be great means of communication. But when it comes to the reality of your identity and salvation, each one of us needs the Church, where Christ incarnate comes to us. The local parish is our spiritual home, where our salvation "certificate" is being steadily written by our own actions of Faith. Just being, but not acting, in Christ may not do it, for "faith without deeds is dead!"

Let us then wake up and take up our Cross. Respond to Christ's call if you want Him to respond to your prayer in time of need. "Hello, are you there?" I hope that in the coming weeks many Mr. Xs and Ms. Ys will pledge their stewardship. Then, not only will the Lord find them easily, but when a friend looks for you, the priest can say: "Of course, here is the number of a great member and supporter of our Church." Ask yourself: Am I of Christ or of Google?

We are sorry to announce the loss of one of our community's most valuable families. Mr. and Mrs. Someone Else have moved away.

The vacancy left will be difficult to fill. The Elses have been with us for many years, and they have always done far more than their fair share of the community service. Whenever there was a job to do or a meeting to attend, their name was on everyone's lips: "Let Someone Else do it."

The Elses were wonderful people, but of course, they are only human, and they could only spread themselves so far and so thin. Many a night I sat up and talked with Someone and heard him wish aloud for more help. He and his wife did the best they could, but they knew it was impossible to accomplish all that was expected of them.

We have to face the fact that there were just not enough Someone Elses to go around. And now the Elses are gone. What are we going to do? They have left us a wonderful example to follow, but who will follow it? Who is going to do the things that Someone Else did?



## Fighting superstition in Uganda by Sharon & Peter Georges

We celebrated Christmas in Uganda this past year, far from our beloved family, far from our dear friends. As we reflect on the choices that brought us here, and on our work and ministry, we recall certain questions that are often asked and that sometimes arise unbidden in our own minds: "Why are we here?" "What do we hope to accomplish?" "Are we really making a difference?"

According to the latest census, 80% of Ugandans are Christians. Yet for the vast majority of these professing believers, Christianity is but a thin, brittle shell, barely disguising a persistent belief in the old religion, in the "small gods."

The prophet Isaiah talks about "the people who walked in darkness." He describes those who "inquire of mediums and necromancers; who whisper and mutter." He asks, "Should not a people inquire of their God? Why consult the dead on behalf of the living?"

Indigenous African religion is not based on love, or hope, or joy. It is based on fear. Fear that the dead will return and harm the living if the ancient rituals are not performed. Fear that a neighbor may be a witch and put a curse on you or your children. Fear that compels people to give what little they have to the witchdoctors in the vain hope of warding off a curse or to appease the arbitrary antagonism of a dead relative.

Colonialism, European philosophy, political independence, the importation of Western popular culture, and millions of dollars in aid money have done little to dispel these fears or to alleviate the grinding poverty that still afflicts most Ugandan families. To continue with Isaiah, "They will roam through the land greatly distressed and hungry. And when they are hungry, they will curse their king and their God. They will look up to the sky and down to the earth but will find only distress and darkness. They are in the darkness of fear, and wander lost in the darkness."

Can there be love when a child is just another mouth to feed?

Can there be hope when tomorrow offers no better than today, and maybe worse?

Can there be joy for those who dwell in a land of darkness?

Education can make a difference and education is what we do. The educated are more able to free themselves from the yoke of superstition and fear. The educated are more employable in sustainable and better paying jobs. The educated are less likely to engage in risky and potentially fatal behaviors. This is conventional wisdom, and to a great extent it's true. To quote the Uganda School Anthem:

We young women and men of Uganda are marching along the path of education;

Singing and dancing with joy together, uniting for a better Uganda.

Thanks to your concern, prayers, and financial support, together we are making it possible for more than 200 Ugandan children and teens to attend school. Not only are their school fees paid for, they are given everything they need to succeed academically: books, pens & pencils, daily lunch, uniforms, and comprehensive medical care. Most of these children are orphans, and all are living in an impoverished section of Kampala, Uganda's teeming capital. Without the support we provide, they have little hope of completing primary and secondary school and their opportunities for a better life are limited. The cycle of poverty will claim yet another generation.


But education alone cannot eliminate the pervasive corruption and discrimination that plague the poorest of the poor. The minds and hearts of this young generation must be shown that self-improvement alone will not lead to a "better Uganda." To this end, we are more than a bursary, more than an impersonal provider of school fees. Together with out Ugandan associates, Frank and Agnes, we demonstrate a personal interest in each and every child in our program. We advise, encourage, guide and admonish. We teach and promote honesty, integrity, responsibility, and concern for each other.

We confront them openly with society's moral failures, and direct them to be the generation that will ultimately make a difference- not only in their own futures, but for the sake of their neighbors, families, and the generations to come.

Most importantly, we love them. They come to know this love, and they also know that we are representatives of your love; that there is a great family around the world which cares about them. The knowledge of this love brings them joy, and this joy give them hope. Yes, together we are making a difference!



At the start of each New Year, Orthodox Christians commemorate St. Basil the Great, a major saint in our calendar (and also the figure of "Santa Claus" to children in Greece!) Although many saints we commemorate struggled for the faith alone, in secret or in martyrdom, St. Basil is an example of what can result when an entire family is strong in their faith.



## The Family that Prays Together

**Saint Basil the Great** was born in 329 in Caesarea of Cappadocia (now Turkey) to a family renowned for their learning and holiness. His parents' names were Basil and Emily. In addition to his feastday on January

1, the Church commemorates his grandmother St. Makrina the Elder on May 30, his mother Emily and sister St. Makrina on July 19, and his brothers St. Peter of Sebastia on Jan. 9, St. Gregory of Nyssa on Jan. 10, and Naucratius.

**St. Makrina the Elder**, grandmother of St. Basil and his siblings, was outstanding for her intellect and piety. She was a disciple of St. Gregory the Wonder-worker of Neocaesarea. During the persecutions in the reign of Diocletian, she and her husband (also named Basil,) abandoned their home and hid in the forests and deserts. Although their home was confiscated, they felt no regret. Stripped of everything except their love of God, they settled in an ancient forest and spent 7 years there. By God's providence, goats would come down from the mountains and provide them with food. They both died peacefully in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, after great suffering for the Christian faith.

Saint Makrina, the elder sister of Saint Basil (whose mother had had a vision of St. Thekla shortly before her birth) was sought after by many as a bride because of her beauty, wisdom, and illustrious birth. She was betrothed at a young age to a noble bridegroom. But when her betrothed died before the marriage could take place, the teenaged Makrina refused any other suitors, saying that since her betrothed was alive in Christ, it was not right to turn to another. Instead she devoted herself to a life of virginity, asceticism, and prayer. She established a monastery and, along with her mother Emily, became a nun.

In the meantime, Basil studied in Constantinople under the sophist Libanius, then in Athens, where he formed a friendship with the young Gregory, a fellow Cappadocian, later called "the Theologian." When he returned home, puffed up with much youthful pride, it was the good influence and holy example of his blessed sister Makrina that persuaded him to turn from seeking worldly glory to the service of God. He chose to embrace the ascetical life, abandoning his worldly career and visiting monks throughout the Middle East. Upon returning to Caesarea, he departed to a hermitage on the Iris River in Pontus, not far from Annesi, where his mother and his sister were already treading the path of the ascetical life; here he also wrote his ascetical homilies.

About the year 370, he was elected to succeed the bishop and tended the flock for eight years, living in voluntary poverty and strict asceticism. The Emperor Valens, influenced by the Arian heresy, threatened the Saint with exile and torments to get him to agree with them, because he was the bastion of Orthodoxy in all Cappadocia.

But St. Basil was willing to endure every suffering for the sake of the Faith, and showed himself to be a martyr by volition. The truly great Basil, spent with extreme ascetical practices and continual labors, at the helm of the church, reposed in the Lord on Jan. 1, 379, at the age of 49.

**St. Gregory, Bishop of Nyssa**, was born in 331, two years after Basil. While still a young man, their godly mother Emily implored Gregory to attend a service in honor of the 40 Martyrs at her retreat at Annesi, on the River Iris in Pontus . Gregory came, but weary from the journey and feeling little zeal, fell asleep during the service. The 40 Martyrs then appeared to him in a dream, reproaching him for his slothfulness. After that, he repented and became very diligent in the service of God. He became a bishop in 372, but because of his Orthodoxy, was exiled in 374 by Valens, who was an Arian. After Valens' death, Gregory was recalled by the Emperor Gratian. He attended the Local Council of Antioch, which sent him to visit the churches of Arabia and Palestine, which had been ravaged by Arianism. He also attended the 2<sup>nd</sup> Ecumenical Council in 381.

He reposed in 395, leaving many remarkable writings, including a work on the resurrection of the death which is cast in the form of a dialogue between himself and his sister Makrina. In it, he is the earnest but ignorant student and she the wise and patient teacher. St. Makrina had reposed in peace in 379 and was buried by her brother Gregory, who wrote a moving account of her last days and his grief at seeing such a light pass out of the world.

It is also through the writings of St. Gregory that we know of Naucratius, the second of the four brothers. St. Gregory wrote that he was very talented, with great physical beauty, strength, swiftness and facility for everything. In 352, at the age of 21, Naucratius spoke so well at a public recital that the whole audience was deeply moved. But prompted by some Divine Providence, he rejected all the opportunities of a career in the courts of law. Instead, he entered a life of solitude and poverty, settling in a remote spot by the Iris River. He took care of some destitute old men, who lived nearby, together in sickness and feebleness. He would go on fishing expeditions and since he was expert in every form of sport, he provided food to his grateful wards by this means for five years. St. Basil evidently followed his example when he went to the same area in search of solitude in 357. But Before Basil arrived, Naucratius was killed in a hunting accident.

**St. Peter II, Bishop of Sebastia** was the 10<sup>th</sup> and youngest child of the family. Their father died shortly after Peter's birth in 319 and he was raised mostly by his sister Makrina. He was ordained to the priesthood by his brother Basil in 370, and consecrated Bishop of Sebastia at the start of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Ecumenical Council in 381, in which he took an active part. He oversaw his flock wisely and reposed in peace.
