VETERAN INTERVIEW QUESTIONS Wisconsin Veterans Museum Research Center

These sample questions have been designed for use as a question set for a particular veteran. Notes may be taken o the right hand side of the paper during the interview and space has been left for additional questions specific to the experience of each veteran. Notes would include information to pursue when the veteran pauses, and names and places for the veteran to spell at the end of the interview. Direction of the interview should be determined by the biographical information about the veteran. Additionally, interviews with women, ethnic minorities, officers, and career military personnel must include relevant questions.

1.	Tell me about your background and life circumstances before entering military service.

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Note. Questions 4 & 5 are quite dependent upon both the conversational style and experiences of the particular veteran being interviewed. At this point, many will just talk at quite some length and your job will be simply to clarify and get places, names, etc. Some will mention prisoner of war experiences, some injuries and war wounds; the point here is to "go with the flow," pursue in detail, and then follow-up with specific questions not addressed.

- how you got there – stories, feelings
- where – first impression, describe & stories
- your duties – explain
- if combat, how did you feel, what did you think
- memorable experiences
- memorable people
- any stories?
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Note: After the veteran finishes describing the core of their military experiences, now is the time to pick up the pieces by addressing the following information that may not have been discussed earlier.

=	What kept you going through all of this?
-	Was there something you did for good luck?
-	Describe a typical day.
-	How did you and your buddies entertain yourselves?
_	Any pranks?
-	Were there entertainers?
-	Describe your sleeping and eating facilities.
-	What was the food like?
_	What did you do on leave? Any good stories?
-	Any funny or unusual stories?
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′	Tell about your discharge from the military.
_	End of war: where, when, how did you think and feel?
_	End of tour – how did you feel?
_	What happened before you were actually discharged?
_	What was your homecoming like?
_	How did you feel when you arrived at home?
-	Any problems?
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8.	What did you do after you left the service?
