The Summerfield Neighborhood Watch Program

The Summerfield Neighborhood Watch program began years ago with help from volunteers. Thank you to all the Captains, Coordinators and other individuals that continue to help.

The Neighborhood Watch program divides Summerfield into 6 areas, including all the Homes, Townhouses, Condominiums and Apartments.

The committee members are not the 'police' but are here to assist in watching over their designated areas. All persons living in Summerfield should assist watching over their neighborhood. Anyone seeing any criminal activity or other out-of-theordinary circumstances should immediately call the Tigard Police. If it is an emergency, call 911; if it is a non-emergency, call 503-629-0111. Then notify the block captain or chairperson.

When a new resident moves into Summerfield, the Neighborhood Watch files are updated. The Neighborhood Watch files are listed by areas and blocks, and identify name, address, and phone number of the residents. If you do not know who your Block Captain is, contact the Chairperson as listed in the directory or call the SCA office.

Additionally, the block captains have a simple form for new residents to complete. These forms list the emergency contact of the resident and are for emergency use only. They are NOT public information. The Tigard Fire and Police have praised the Summerfield Neighborhood Watch program because of the usefulness of this form.

Please remember to have someone get your mail and newspapers if you are away. The police suggest we keep our doors and windows locked and to not leave our garage doors up more than an inch or two. Summerfield is very safe and it will continue to be as long as everyone is alert.

If you would like to be a captain, coordinator or chairman, please tell a current member or the SCA office. None of these duties are very time consuming but are very important for our community.

Summerfield Civic Association PROJECT: AGE VERIFICATION

Per the Fair Housing Act for designated age 55+ communities, we are required to survey the age of our occupants on a regular basis. Yes, even if you've lived here for 30 years!

There are two options (choose the one you prefer):

OPTION #1: <u>Each person</u> in your household can provide the Summerfield office with a <u>legible</u> <u>photocopy</u> of their driver's license, passport, birth certificate or other reliable ID with their name and date of birth. Bring it in to the SCA office (put in mail slot if office is closed) or mail it in.

OPTION #2: Another acceptable method is a 'sworn statement', whereby each person in your household signs this document verifying their own date of birth.

SCA Board Meeting Report

This report is a recap of the meeting. For details, see the minutes on the Clubhouse bulletin board.

November 8, 2010

Present: Durgan, Pfeifer, Thiemann, Vogel, Barton, Kerns, Nottingham, Chamber, Froeber. Absent: Whitecotton. Minutes of Oct. Board Meeting approved.

Visitors: Luanne Thielke expressed concern about traffic on Alderbrook, suggested Durham Road and Sattler Road maintenance be performed as community service project by youth, concern about tile entryway for Clubhouse renovation and concern about recent house fire and rebuilding guidelines. Sharon Hughes thanked association for use of directional signs for Holiday Bazaar.

Treasurer's Report - Barton: Operating Account Oct. income \$22,363.63 (golf income totaled \$12,247); Expenditures of \$59,711.36. Cash on hand 10/31/10: \$41,013.03. General Reserve account balance 10/31/10: \$259,369.09. New Buyers Fee income for Oct.: \$6,000; total New Buyers Fee balance of \$147,498.87. Total General Reserves plus New Buyer Fund account: \$406,867.96. Check registers reviewed for October. Motion made and approved to accept the entire Treasurer's report.

Correspondence – Administrator:

Correspondence related to golf course abuse final warning letter, renting provision for heirs under age 55, property line assistance.

Administrator's Report:

- Food donation barrels for the Oregon Food Bank will be in the Clubhouse from 11/12 – 12/20.
- CPR / AED training was 10/27 with 9 employees and 5 residents.
- 55+ Communities Fall Summit was 11/5 hosted by Claremont with attorney presentation regarding

Board duties.

- Office will be conducting the required survey for resident age verification.
- Only 2 pending property sales right now, low number compared to trend.
- New managers at the Summerfield Estates, Len & Deborah Whitecotton.

Report from Darlene Young – City Liaison: City of Tigard determined that No Parking sign on Greens Way were impossible due to abundance of underground utilities, so back to painted curb. City is also removing large street safety buttons on Alderbrook. Discussion regarding walking safety.

New Business:

A. Draft 2011 Budget: Motion made and approved to accept draft 2011 budget as presented. Information will be posted in the Clubhouse lobby and final review at the December Board Meeting.

B. Oak Grove (SF Drive & Alderbrook) Tree Trimming Proposal: Motion made and approved for \$1,270 from reserves for the oak trimming.

C. Occupancy Age Variance Request: Motion made and approved to allow variance as written to allow new resident, age 53, to rent unit from owner while owner maintains for-sale status.

D. Golf Course Closure on Thanksgiving Day: Motion made and approved to approve request to have golf course closed on Thanksgiving Day each year.

Directors Round Table:

Pfeifer – Tennis Committee working with Social Club on considering adding pickleball stripes to courts.

Nottingham – Greens Committee adding signs to rental golf carts with info about appropriate areas to drive carts.

Chambers – Apartments owner has done extensive landscape and drainage improvements. Pads for community benches on their property installed. Occupancy holding at 97-98%.

Thiemann – Solar panel guidelines added to Architectural Manual soon. Swimming Pool Committee soliciting additional bids for monitoring system.

Vogel – Neighborhood Watch meeting had over 50 members. Marketing Committee assisted Realtor Open House on 11/7 and had 12 people through Clubhouse for tour and 24 properties open.

Kerns – Newcomers Welcome Reception on 10/20 had over 30 new residents. 2011 Directory in final stages. Craft Club's 22nd annual Holiday Bazaar had 2nd highest sales in history with a substantial donation to Loaves & Fishes.

Barton - Interior designer and contractor attended 10/25 Clubhouse Committee meeting. Pat Shute and Jerry Kerns in charge of displaying American flags in front of Clubhouse on 8 identified dates. Holiday decorating in Clubhouse on 11/29. Motion made and approved to appoint Barbara Lance as Clubhouse Committee Chair. Discussion regarding tile entryway and reminder that all comments can be submitted in writing to office.

Ask the Administrator by Cari Froeber

Before we get into these two great questions this month, I'd like to thank each of you for a wonderful and productive 2010. Wishing you joy and peace in 2011!

Q: Can you explain the tax status of Summerfield?

A: Yes, though I'm certainly not a CPA, here's my understanding of it. We fall under IRS Code Section §528 and file form 1120-H. This subsection exempts certain nonprofit homeowners associations that manage association property. At least 60% of our gross income must come from dues, fees or assessments and at least 90% of our expenditures must be for the association's property. We do not have to pay income tax on dues and assessments if they are used for maintenance or improvement. We do not have to pay income tax on any other taxable income as long as we maintain those percentages. For 2009, we had about 79% of our income from residents' dues, fees and assessments and we estimate that the 2010 amount will be about 73% (down due to the change in bulk cable), though still far from the minimum 60%.

Q: What happens if I buy an annual Golf Tag and I get injured or sick?

Well, it is somewhat of a risk A: (life is full of risks, isn't it?). Per the Assessments and Fees Policy & Procedure, "a refund for the annual golf fee may be prorated upon written request until March 1. After that date no refunds will be issued except in the case of death, when the request is made in writing." For the vast majority of residents, the annual golf tag is a steal of a deal. At the 2011 proposed rate of \$450, that breaks down to needing to play just 32-37 times (depending on the season) to break even. I see some of our resident golfers are out there every day, which essentially will equate to \$1.24 per round!

The Green Corner By Kathy Peper

CLEAN LIVING

The very products and processes used to keep indoor environments clean may also contribute to indoor pollution, or "sick building syndrome." Apart from poisoning through ingestion—mostly by small children-studies show that in certain conditions, many everyday household cleaners and air fresheners emit toxic contaminants at levels that pose risks to our health. Common symptoms include eye, nose, and throat irritation, as well as headaches, dizziness, and fatigue. Long-term or cumulative environmental consequences, contamination of surface and ground water, may also occur. Clean with a micro-fiber cleaning cloth, warm water, a dash of natural soap, and good, old-fashioned elbow grease. Ingredients like vinegar, borax, lemon juice and baking soda are effective on tougher stains.

🗚 Architectural Committee

Two new benches have been installed on the west end of Summerfield. Our neighbors who choose to walk to the shopping areas in King City, the Albertson complex or the Safeway complex will now be able to set their packages down and take a rest break at both ends of the Apartments along side of Summerfield Drive. The benches have a back to lean against and are secured to a concrete base for stability.

The old style "witches hat" type lamp posts are no longer available; however the Golf Pro Shop has a supply of replacement 'glass' inserts and light bulbs for only \$2.50 each. If it becomes necessary to replace the entire lamp post, information on a new approved unit is available at the Clubhouse office and will require an Architectural Change Request.

The Committee is in the process of preparing guidelines for the installation of solar panels. This would be a complex project requiring building permits and influenced by many direct, indirect and potential costs.

Landscape Committee 🛽





People in Profile: LIONEL DOMREIS By Darlene Durgan



Seven month old Lionel Domreis arrived in a very cold and snowy Portland in December, 1919, a month in which records show it snowed over 13 inches in one day—and Lionel and his family were living in a tent at 56th and Duke! Times were hard and didn't improve much over the years, as the depression started and Lionel found himself selling newspapers and magazines on a Broadway corner until 9:00 PM each night.

Anti-German feelings ran high between the wars and Lionel, whose full name was Lionel Adolph Wilhelm Domreis, found himself the brunt of teasing and bullying at Laurelhurst School. When the family moved briefly to San Francisco, Lionel unofficially changed his name to Lionel Allen William Domreis and when the family returned to Portland the name change had done the trick and the harassment stopped.

This name change caused a serious problem just recently, however, when Lionel was invited to join a cruise to Alaska but could not secure a passport. He is still in touch with Ron Wyden's office and pursuing the issue. At age 91, he is still in full possession of his intellect, obviously.

At the end of his junior year at the University of Oregon, Lionel was drafted and spent three years with the 41st Infantry Division overseas. After the war, he finished his degree and spent a very successful career in office machine sales, later switching to real estate. It was in that field that he met Ron Sorenson, president of Tualatin Development, and had the pleasure of having lunch with a very nervous Ron on the eve of launching the King City project. Ron later became seriously ill and died while his next project, Summerfield, was under construction. Tualatin Development later developed Summerplace and other successful senior communities.

Lionel's fervent wish is that a plaque in tribute to the forward thinking and daring Ron Sorenson be placed in both King City and Summerfield.

Lionel has not been all work and no play, however. He paints, plays bridge and has self-published four mystery novels which he calls "Decent Novels for Seniors Written Without Dirty Words." His last two books were directed to medical schools, urging them to check for adult abuse as they conduct exams.

Summerfield is proud to have as a resident this gifted and dedicated "almost native" Oregonian.
