# About IEF

The Inuvialuit Education Foundation (IEF), a registered charitable organization, was established in 1990. The goals of the program are to increase the number of Inuvialuit beneficiaries completing post-secondary education programs. They are in place to support the objective of the Inuvialuit Final Agreement of enabling beneficiaries to be equal and meaningful participants in the northern economy.

# Program Descriptions

## Post-Secondary Financial Assistance Program (PSFAP)

IEF provides financial support to Inuvialuit beneficiaries pursuing full-time post-secondary education in diploma or degree programs. Mature students who do not have transcripts available within the previous 5 years are eligible for one semester only, after which they must present a transcript. To receive funding, Inuvialuit students must have a 70% or better average. In 2011-2012, a total of 63 students participated in the program while in 2012-2013, a total of 53 students took part.

# Scholarship Program

IEF administers a variety of scholarships that promote and encourage students to further their education at the post-secondary level. The main focus of the scholarships is to offer encouragement and financial rewards to Inuvialuit students who achieve a 75% or higher average.

# **Tutor Program**

In the Inuvialuit Settlement Region, the Tutor Program is operated in partnership with the local District Education Authorities in each community. Its aim is to encourage students to achieve academic success and to stay in school. Although the highest level of involvement is with students from grades 5 to 12, post-secondary students are also eligible. Individual tutoring is available to those who will achieve more success on a one-to-one basis. It is not the mandate of IEF to replace existing educational programs or services, but to provide a parallel support system.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Directors of Inuvialuit Education Foundation

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Inuvialuit Education Foundation, which comprise the balance sheet as at March 31, 2013, March 31, 2012 and April 1, 2011 and the statements of revenue and expenditures, changes in equity and cash flows for the years ended March 31, 2013 and March 31, 2012, and the related notes, which comprise a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's responsibility


Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained in our audits is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Inuvialuit Education Foundation as at March 31, 2013, March 31, 2012 and April 1, 2011 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years ended March 31, 2013 and March 31, 2012 in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Notes to Financial Statements

#### March 31, 2013 and March 31, 2012

#### 1 General

The Inuvialuit Education Foundation (the Foundation or IEF) is a registered charitable organization incorporated without share capital under the Companies Act of the Province of Alberta. IEF was established to promote the recognition and furtherance of education among the Inuvialuit.

IEF is a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act (Canada) and is exempt from income taxes

Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC) is responsible for the delivery of social programs and benefits of the Inuvialuit Final Agreement to Inuvialuit beneficiaries.

#### 2 Significant accounting policies

Effective April 1, 2012, the Foundation elected to adopt Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO) as issued by the Canadian Accounting Standards Board. The accounting policies selected under this framework have been applied consistently and retrospectively as if these policies had always been in effect. The Foundation has not utilized any transitional exemptions on the adoptions of ASNPO. There were no adjustments to the statement of financial position or the statement of revenue and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows.

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with ASNPO requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### a) Revenue recognition

#### i) Donations

IEF follows the deferral method of accounting for donations. Unrestricted donations are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Restricted donations are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditures are incurred.

#### ii) Interest

Restricted interest income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditures are incurred. Unrestricted interest income is recognized as revenue when earned.

#### b) Cash

Cash consists of cash on deposit.

#### c) Endowment contributions

Endowment contributions are recognized as direct increases in net assets.

#### d) Financial instrument

IEF's financial assets include cash, accounts receivable and investments. Investments are recorded at fair value with realized and unrealized gains and losses reported in the statement of revenue and expenditures for the period in which they arise. Cash and accounts receivable are classified as loans and receivables and are accounted for at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

Financial assets are tested for impairment at the end of each reporting period when there are indications the asset may be impaired.

IEF's financial liabilities include accounts payable and accrued liabilities. All financial liabilities are accounted for at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

#### 3 Investments

Investments are recorded at market value. Investments of \$5,180,000 are externally restricted for endowment purposes (see note 5).

The Fixed Income Fund is an open-ended investment which is made up of contributions of funds in which participants receive a return based on a Universal DEX rate. The Inuvialuit Investment Corporation (IIC), a subsidiary of IRC, pays each Fixed Income Fund participant monthly interest on the funds invested on account. IEF re-invests this income within the fund.

IEF's participation in the Fixed Income Fund is approximately 15%.

#### 4 Deferred endowment income

Income earned on the three endowments identified below is restricted to fund educational awards for students from the Inuvialuit Settlement Region who wish to pursue a post-secondary education. Income not awarded during the year is deferred until such time as a qualified candidate is awarded the scholarship.

#### 5 Net assets restricted for endowment purposes

In 1999, BP Canada Energy Company (BP), formerly known as Amoco Canada Petroleum Company Ltd., endowed \$100,000 to IEF. Awards are paid from income earned from this endowment and are limited to 6% of the original capital value of the endowment fund. Any excess income earned over 6% will be used to recapitalize this endowment fund.

In 2000, the Joint Secretariat (JS) endowed \$30,000 to IEF.

In 2005, Aklak Air Ltd. (Aklak) endowed \$50,000 to IEF.

The purpose of the BP and JS endowment funds is to earn investment income, which will be used to fund educational awards for students from the Inuvialuit Settlement Region who wish to pursue a post-secondary education. Each endowment agreement identifies the minimum funding levels and establishes specific disbursement criteria.

The Aklak endowment funds also earn investment income which will be used to fund scholarships.

In 2001, Gyrfalcon Holdings Ltd. endowed \$5,000,000 to IEF. Investment income earned on this endowment is unrestricted.

#### 6 Financial risk management

#### Fair value

The fair values of IEF's financial instruments, excluding investments, approximate their carrying amounts to their short-term maturity.

#### Credit risk

IEF is potentially subject to concentrations of credit risk principally with respect to cash and investments. IEF's credit risk is the replacement cost at the then-estimated fair value of the instrument. Management believes that the risk of incurring losses with these financial instruments is remote and that such losses if any would not be material.

IEF is also exposed to credit risk with respect to accounts receivable. Management monitors this account regularly and does not believe that IEF is exposed to significant credit risk at the balance sheet date.

#### Interest risk

IEF is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to the fixed income investments. The investments pay a variable rate of interest to IEF, as calculated on a monthly basis. These rates fluctuate with market conditions.

IEF is not exposed to liquidity or market risk.

#### Auditor's responsibility


