The Lincoln Sky Knights (LSK) is Lincoln's premier model aircraft Radio Control (RC) flying club. Members and visitors enjoy one of the best model airplane flying sites you'll find anywhere, located just outside of Lincoln, near Waverly, Nebraska. The site features a 40'x400' paved runway, a 80'x400' grass runway, and a pond for float planes. For pilot comfort, we boast a clubhouse, sun shelters, paved pits, on site pop machines and plenty of parking.

The July 11 LARC Club meeting will be held at their site North of Waverly at 134 and Waverly Road and will start at 7:00 pm to allow more time for flying demonstrations and visiting before dark. Bring the whole family and your own lawn chairs and refreshments.

Lincoln Sky Knights is one of Nebraska's first RC clubs, and has been a chartered Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) club since the 1950's. They have over 100 members, both gentlemen and ladies, of all ages and all walks of life. LSK is a private club and the flying site is private property. Visitors are welcome any time members are present. Visitors with valid AMA may fly without LSK club membership on three days thru out a calendar year, not including sanctioned events.

CORNHUSKER STATE GAMES JULY 21 THROUGH THE 29

The 23rd annual Cornhusker State Games is fast approaching, July 21 through the 29. This year, the Games are expecting nearly 12,000 amateur athletes from nearly all 93 counties in Nebraska covering 70 venues. You can imagine the communications needs that they have.

For 22 of those 23 years, the Lincoln Amateur Radio Club has provided 450 communicators to fill those communications needs. This year is no exception.

We will be communicating for a variety of fun and exciting amateur sports, including:

July 21:

The Adventure Race at Branched Oak Lake: An anything goes running, biking, wading, swimming, kayaking, canoeing, hiking, direction finding, and anything else the director can dream up kind of race.

The Cycle tour: A bicycle tour of 25, 50, and 100 miles starting at the Abbott sports complex. The tour this year will go north to the Fremont State Lakes with turnarounds at Ceresco and Ithica.

Cycling Road bikes: This one is a time trial type of event that begins and ends at the Yutan Veterans Country club located about a quarter mile south of Yutan all on paved county roads with several turns that need to be watched.

Baseball: You all know about baseball. This year, it will be youngsters playing ball at various Lincoln baseball diamonds.

Softball: Softball is a familiar sport too. It will involve male, female and coed divisions at various Lincoln softball fields

Soccer: Soccer will include both adult and youth divisions and will be played at both Wright park, at Folsom and Pioneers, and Spirit park, at 84th and "O" street.

July 22:

Baseball, Soccer and Softball will be played again on Sunday July 22nd.

Mountain Bike Races: These are bicycle races that take place in the woods at Branched Oak Lake. There are frequent arguments with trees, and you can guess who wins!

July 28:

Footstock: This is a 5k running race and a 1 mile kid's fun run. It also included a big party with music, food and beer. (The beer and food are not free!). It will be held at Haymarket Park this year. It should prove to be a fun time.

July 29:

The Triathlon: This is a swimming, biking and running race that will start and end at Holmes Lake Park. It involves several of the streets around the park including 70th street, Pioneers Blvd, and Normal Blvd. Traffic safety can be a major consideration.

In years past we have assisted with numerous situations, including logistics, such as where are the referees and umpires, to where are the lunches. We have also in summoning medical assistance for things like broken legs, heat problems, dehydration, heart

attacks, and even lightning strikes. We also keep an eye on the weather for the athletes and their families.

You can see the kind of communications needs there will be, but as a bonus, you can watch some really great amateur sports and still get to play radio.

In addition, we are planning a thank you party for those who participated, on Sunday July 29 at 3:00 pm. The location is yet to be determined.
