Prescott National Forest Fire Restrictions

PRESCOTT, AZ (June 27, 2011) - Due to increased fire danger, the Prescott National Forest will implement additional fire restrictions that will go into effect Wednesday, June 29, 2011, at 8:00 am. These additional fire restrictions will remain in effect until forest officials determine that conditions have changed sufficiently to reduce the risk of human-caused wildfire. The following fire restrictions will be in effect for the entire Prescott National Forest:

- The use of campfires, charcoal grills, and stove fires (wood, charcoal, and coal burning) are prohibited on all Prescott National Forest lands. This now includes developed campsites and campgrounds.
- Use of explosives is prohibited.
- Smoking is prohibited, except within an enclosed vehicle or building.
- Possessing, discharging or using any kind of fireworks or other pyrotechnic devices is prohibited.
- Operating a chainsaw or other equipment powered by an internal combustion engine will not be allowed between the hours of 11:00 am to 8:00 pm. During acceptable hours, please have 5-10 ft. clearance around your generators and other internal combustible engines.
- Welding or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame is prohibited.

Discharging a firearm, air rifle, or gas gun is prohibited. The use of petroleum-fueled stoves, lanterns or heating devices is allowed, providing such devices meet the fire underwriter's specifications for safety.

The public is reminded that fireworks are always prohibited on all national forest lands. They are also reminded that all of the Prescott National Forest is closed to OHV use except for the two areas that will continue to remain open to OHV use - the Hayfield Draw and Alto Pit OHV areas.

Violation of these regulations is punishable as a Class B misdemeanor, by a fine of not more than \$5000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment for not more than six (6) months or both; 16 USC § 551, and 18 USC §§ 3559 and 3571.

The Lost Escalante

One of the most famous of all Southwest lost mines - the one with the iron door - has intrigued many serious students of Southwest history and legend. The John D. Mitchell account was part of the July, 1952, DESERT MAGAZINE. Donald Page also contributed an article on this subject (October, 1956).

The mine is actually the Lost Escalante, subject of Harold Bell Wright's book, "The Mine with the Iron Door." The story is that the Jesuits worked the Escalante in the Santa Catalina Mountains near Tucson, prior to their expulsion, in 1767, from Spanish territory.

A large number of friendly Papago Indians were employed in building a hiding place for the high-grade ore which, of course, the Jesuits would not be able to take with them. But, they had every intention of returning to the New World, with its rich treasures of heathen souls to be converted and gold to be separated from its matrix. Mitchell writes that "the treasure vault was near the south bank of the Canada del Oro - the ruins of the old camp and the foundations of the little chapel where the priests said mass may still be seen." The iron door seals the treasure chamber.

On San Juan's Day in June, 1796, Apaches raided the mine camp, killing and scattering the Papagos. The settlement was destroyed and forgotten. Mitchell says a clue to the Escalante is a ventana - a natural hole in the rock resembling a window. The mine is "one league northwest of the ventana."

Donald Page reports that the first known record of gold discovery in the Canada Del Oro was on June 29, 1843 - long after the Jesuit business. A Colonel Antonio Narbona, commanding a strong military expedition against the Apaches, camped here and found placer nuggets.

The years that followed saw much Apache trouble in Arizona, but by May, 1870, "most of the men and boys of Tucson were hard at work at the same spot, each panning between \$12 and \$30 a day."

The Apaches once again scattered the miners, chasing them out of the Santa Catalinas for a 10-year period.

Know Where You Are Placing Your Hands and Feet

RRPC members, Karl and Faye Weber, and their friend, Doug, and I were out prospecting for gold in the Wickenburg area when our guide and RRPC board member, Jack Engbrecht, stopped his truck on the side of the dirt road. We were curious as to why he pulled over, so we did as well. When we got out of our truck, we saw the animal that piqued Jack's interest,: a 3 foot patterned rattlesnake was scurrying across the dirt road to get out of harm's way.

We all were fascinated with the rattlesnake, so at a distance, we observed its movements into the nearby bushes. When it reached the bushes the snake coiled up and took what looked like a defensive posture. It stayed in that posture, patiently waiting for its gawkers to leave. I took a few pictures of it as it sat quietly, and almost invisibly, in the bush. Quietly is an understatement. Ever the mischievous person, I took a couple of small rocks and threw them at the bush. The rattlesnake neither flinched nor darted out. In fact, it didn't even rattle its tail. It sat there, quietly, perceiving that the small rocks were no immediate threat to it, but that the humans darting about it were.

"Wow, Pop," I said to Karl, my father-inlaw. "I threw small rocks at the snake and it didn't even move."

"That's something! I always thought you get a rattle warning before they strike" said Karl, as we headed back to our vehicles to drive off.

Ironically, earlier in the day, Jack advised Doug to be careful about walking into the bushes because they could potentially be home to some nasty critters, including rattlesnakes. Being an Arizona native, I already knew this, but now the point is more salient. If you're out and about, whether gold prospecting or just taking a nature walk, be careful, because a rattlesnake can be very hard to see, and it may not rattle its tail to let you know it is there.

WHAT EVERY MEMBER SHOULD KNOW----

We had a incident on the Red Basin claims that makes me believe that it's time to remind all our members to get out their Rules and Regulations and read them again.

A member was digging some rather deep holes, putting the dirt in large containers in the back of his pick -up and taking it home. From the size of the holes, it was evident that he had been doing this for some time. When he was asked when he planned on bringing the dirt back to fill his holes, his reply was "I don't - after I run it through my dry washer I just dump it behind my house." He was reminded that our club rules state that we are each responsible for filling our holes and making the area look as undisturbed as possible before we leave the area. His reply was that he had only been a member for a year, had not bothered to read all the "stuff" we had sent him, but if that was the type of club we were, he didn't want to belong and would not renew his membership. Needless to say he was unhappy to be told he would have to dump all the dirt he had already in the truck back into the holes and make the area look as close to 'natural' as he could, but he did comply.

This brought to mind the fact that maybe YOU, the members of RRPC, may not be aware of the fact that we now have almost \$118,000 of the clubs funds deposited in CD's as reclamation bonds in the names of the Bureau of Land Management and the various Forest services. These bonds are required by the various government agencies and CAN BE CLAIMED BY THOSE AGENCIES if they should happen to visit a claim and find the kind of holes and damage that this member had left. And we could also lose our use of that claim. If you should happen to see someone or know of someone who is doing damage to one of our claims, if they are a member, all we need is their member number, if they are NOT a member, invite then to become a member and learn our rules and regulations. If they are not interested in becoming a member, get a name if you can or just a vehicle license plate number. Then please let one of the board members know, so we can deal with the problem.

. The governmental agencies are looking for any excuse they can to restrict the use of our claims – so let's not give them anything to complain about! THE FUTURE OF THE RRPC DEPENDS ON EACH MEMBER LOOKING OUT FOR THE BEST INTEREST OF THE CLUB. So please help protect the environment and Club's funds and be sure that we fill our holes, and abide by our own rules.

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
