APPENDIX A EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Here is a sample summary:

This proposal requests 350,000 RMB to develop a measure of spirituality that is sensitive to cultural orientations to independence and interdependence. Our request is consistent with the priority of developing instrumentation. Most measures of religiousness have been developed in the West and most focus on individual spirituality (Shek, 2010; Hill, 2010). With more than 33% of the Chinese population reporting some form of spiritual belief or practice (Zhang, 2007), an instrument to assess particular forms of spirituality would assist ongoing research. The research question that motivates this study is: "What are the dimensions of indigenous religiousness in China that varies across age, education, and ethnicity?"

Popular religious books will serve to provided ideas for items. Items will be created from several sources. First, preliminary items will be generated from coding definitions obtained in Mainland Chinese understanding of spirituality via the internet. Second, individuals will be interviewed from several religious traditions. Third, using a standardized protocol, focus groups of ten individuals will respond to the question. From transcriptions of the focus group meetings, items will be generated. These questions will be rated for their appropriateness by well-qualified scholars and tested for item-total reliability. Participants (N=540) will complete the scale constructed plus the Traditionalism and Modernity subscale of the Chinese Personality Assessment Inventory (CPAI-2; Cheung, Kwong, & Zhang, 2003). CPAI-2 is an ideal personality inventory for validation of the pilot items because it was specifically designed for Chinese. The CPAI research team adopted a combined etic-emic approach to develop the CPAI; therefore, the scale includes both universal and culture-specific personality factors in the inventory (Cheung, Cheung, & Zhang, 2004). Past studies have shown that the CPAI-2 is a validated personality inventory that measure personality dimensions that is specific to Chinese culture and possibly collectivistic cultures (Cheung et al., 2004).

Exploratory and confirmatory factor analysis will be conducted on the participant's responses. Correlational analysis will reveal what items score highest and lowest with on the CPAI Interpersonal scales: Traditionalism vs. Modernity, Ren Qing, Social Sensitivity, Discipline, and Harmony. The final questionnaire will be given to individuals selected who are different age, education, income, ethnicities, and religions (and non-religious groups). Participants will be remunerated 75 RMB for their participation. We predict that there will items that correlate positively with traditionalism and other items that correlate positively modernization. We predict that there will be factors which are sensitive independence and interdependence cultural orientation. We expect that religiousness will be more independent among urban individuals and more interdependence spirituality in rural individuals.

APPENDIX B Importance of the Study

Poor examples describing the importance of the study:

- 1. This study will demonstrate that religion is helpful for persons who are physically ill. (too general)
- 2. Attachment and spirituality are connected. (What is the problem? What is new?)

Good examples describing the importance of the study:

- 1. Since past studies of spirituality have focused on Western individual spirituality, this study will develop an indigenous Chinese scale of spirituality that encompasses individual and communal dimensions.
- 2. Western studies on attachment have focused on caregiver sensitivity and attachment to a transcendent deity but what has been neglected is the role of culture which give meaning to secure attachment.

APPENDIX C Research questions

Sample research questions that are unacceptable:

- 1. Aspects of Chinese spirituality (This is not a question. What do you want to know?
- 2. What is the relationship between religion and healing? (Too general)
- 3. What resources do religious individuals use to cope with suffering? (Too general. What is the role of culture?)

Sample research questions that are more specific and acceptable:

- a. How do dimensions of spirituality differ in ethnic groups with many significant relationships compared with few significant relationships.
- b. How do ethnic differences (Uighur and Mongolian) influence one's practices of spirituality in Buddhists and Muslims?
- c. Is the quality of attachment to significant others related to the experience of God in Han and non-Han churches?

- b. Spirituality and adult attachment related (For what ethnic group? For what population?)

Examples of excellent predictions

- a. Older Mongolian Buddhists and Christians used more religious coping skills as measured by the Chinese Religious Coping Scale than new converts to the religion.
- b. Miao religious adults who had healthy relationships with others as measured by the Chinese Adult Attachment scale will score higher on warmth in relationship to transcendence than non religious adults.

- Does the applicant have the intellectual resources and academic background to complete the study program?
- How well is the applicant qualified to undertake proposed activities with

professionalism and excellence?

- Has the applicant been admitted to a study program or approved as a visiting scholar?
- Does the applicant have the requisite English comprehension and speaking skills?

Application:

Researcher who is interested in participating in the study abroad program should contact TRI/IPCAS Research Initiative staff for an application. In addition to the application, researcher also needs to submit their curriculum vitae and a letter of recommendation from their supervisor. E-mail notification will be sent out to inform the applicant whether they have been accepted into the program.

The TRI/IPCAS Research Initiative will work with both the researcher and western consultant to tailor the study abroad program to suit the researcher's needs.
