Ms. Betty Hunt, 1125 SW Plass, Topeka, requested to speak to the Board; however, she was not at the meeting.

Mr. Howard Blackmon, 2615 SW Fillmore, Topeka, requested to speak to the Board regarding the school budget. Mr. Blackmon said he supports mandatory summer school and asked that the Board reconsider eliminating that program. He said he has also reviewed the MGT study dated February 14, 2003, and their recommendations and asked when the Board would take action on those recommendations. He said he has talked with Superintendent Sawyer regarding students who do not meet the requirements for promoting to the next grade level and he is not supportive of the District's policy of allowing parents to have the final decision.

Mr. Sawyer thanked Mr. Blackmon for his comments. He said the decision to eliminate mandatory summer school was not an easy one but the Board is faced with making tough decisions. He said the cost for this four-week program is approximately \$270,000 and the decision was made to use those funds during the school year for programs that would benefit students throughout the year. He asked Dr. Susan Rogers, associate superintendent, to address the audience regarding new programs being initiated in elementary schools.

Dr. Rogers said grant funds have recently become available through an Early Reading First grant to support a K-3 Summer Reading Program at six elementary schools. She said transportation would be available for this program.

Mrs. Windi Thomas, 3541 SW Wesparke Ct., Topeka, requested to speak to the Board regarding busing. Ms. Thomas said her children attend Bishop Elementary and distributed a map showing their home in proximity to the school. She asked that the Board reconsider providing transportation to students living more than one mile from school. She said she is concerned for her children's safety.

Ms. Jinaki Modupe`, 2421 SW Bradbury Ave., Topeka, requested to speak to the Board. Ms. Modupe` said students are being left behind despite the No Child Left Behind act. She said she is concerned that budget cuts might include increased class sizes, pay to participate in band and sports, increased textbook fees, and the elimination of mandatory summer school. She asked that the Board consider what is best for all students – not just a few.

Mrs. Stephanie Freeland, 1200 SW Clay St., Topeka, requested to speak to the Board. Mrs. Freeland spoke in support of former principal, Mrs. Sandy Lassiter. She asked when her name would be cleared.

Ms. Cindi O'Neal, 2537 SE Monroe, Topeka, requested to speak to the Board. Ms. O'Neal said parents of Quinton Heights Elementary School students support Mrs. Sandra Lassiter and have not forgotten her dismissal. She said there was no conflict between Mrs. Lassiter and the community, her students, and children.

Ms. Janel Johnson, 2844 SE Virginia Ave., Topeka, requested to speak to the Board. Ms. Johnson said she is still requesting a meeting with Ms. Barbara Davis, general director of elementary learning, regarding Mrs. Sandra Lassiter. She said tutoring had just recently begun at Quinton Heights Elementary and she wondered if this would have happened earlier if the school was located West of Burlingame Road.

Ms. Catherine Ellsworth, 1036 SW Sunset Ct., Topeka, requested to speak to the Board. She said her son is attending Landon Middle School this year and is fitting in well. She said the diversity and leadership at that school is great. She said in addition, her son qualified for accelerated classes at Topeka High School and it has been a good fit for him. She said the accelerated program offers her son intellectual peers and motivates him. She said she supports Topeka Public Schools and encouraged the Board to continue their good leadership.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Glenn asked how the Mathematics Partnership Program grant funds would be used to address the Board's math initiative. Dr. Rogers said the District would be partnering with the University of Kansas, Dr. Susan Gay. She said the program would focus on special education grades 4-8 or approximately 30 teachers.

Mr. Clothier commended Mr. Michael J. Wilson and sports park staff for attracting several tournaments to Hummer Sports Park. He commented this District is diverse in academics, as well as in sports.

VOTE: THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

ITEM S – LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Mr. W. L. Sawyer, superintendent, introduced Mr. Brad Stauffer, director of communications, to update Board Members on the legislative session. Mr. Stauffer distributed a legislative report from Ms. Denise Apt and noted she was unable to attend the meeting because the legislature was holding a late night session prior to their break.

He said the House Education Committee finished its discussion of House Bill 2940 and two plans were submitted to the House. He said the most favorable would bring \$5 million to this District and an additional \$1 million for bilingual education, special education students and students at-risk. He said the Senate Education Committee passed the bill out (HB 2940) and a new Republican plan (HB 2937) today but both failed on the Senate floor. He said the legislature is scheduled to adjourn on Friday or Saturday this week. He said after the adjournment they might bring back HB 2940 for a debate and a decision on that and the Omnibus legislation. He said the building-based budget bill was presented by the Senate with significant amendments, including exempting districts with less than 2,500 students and requiring the legislature to fund the cost of implementation.

Mr. Clothier asked how many school districts have less than 2,500 students. Mr. Stauffer said most districts do not have 2,500 students. Mr. Clothier asked if consolidation had been discussed. Mr. Stauffer

said it had been discussed in the past but because it would mean numerous school closures, it is not a popular option.

Mr. Glenn asked if HB 2940 had passed the House. Mr. Stauffer said it had, as well as the leadership bill. He said HB 2940 had been introduced in another bill but not voted on and it came back, amended, the next day.

Mr. Mallory asked what the legislature had accomplished this session. Mr. Stauffer said no major issues have been addressed. Mr. Mallory asked what the outcome might be for Judge Bullock's decision (illegal distribution and funding of public schools). Mr. Stauffer said Judge Bullock had announced two weeks ago that he would put together a remedy plan of his own and the legislature has said they would wait for that plan. He said the remedy plan should be a significant increase for next year and indications are it would happen during the legislature's recess. He said the Supreme Court would not hear the case until late August and any decision would not affect funding for next year. He said any new funding would have to come during the legislature's wrap-up session.

Mrs. Campbell asked if there has been talk of a special session. Mr. Stauffer said there has been no recent discussion of a special session.

Mr. Braun asked if the legislature is considering revival of HB 2940. Mr. Stauffer said Ms. Apt is not certain, but it could be brought back to the Senate prior to Saturday. He referred Board Members to her report for additional information. Mr. Braun thanked Mr. Stauffer for his report.

ITEM V – UPDATE ON THE TERMS PROJECT

Mr. Mark S. Braun, Board president, said he had requested this update and introduced Mr. Bill Hall, technical services manager. Mr. Hall introduced representatives from Crosspointe, the company that developed TERMS, President and CEO Joan Keebler, Vice President of Product Development Ray Glueck, and Chief Operating Officer Gene Burkett.

Mr. Hall reviewed the process for implementing TERMS and the timelines for implementation. He addressed the problem of high school transcripts and said the conversion of academic history was unsuccessful because of so many data exceptions and non-standardization in Topeka Public Schools. He said staff was faced with this same issue when converting the business side to TERMS. He said this is a unique industry and explained the exceptions. He said transcripts were available on February 1st.

Mr. Clothier said he is frustrated because the Board had told Mr. Hall they would provide him with resources to accomplish the conversion and Board Members were not made aware of the problems with providing transcripts to students until parents and students contacted them. Mr. Hall said this Board should feel good about the accomplishments.

Ms. Keebler, Mr. Glueck and Mr. Burkett spoke briefly to Board Members. Ms. Keebler provided a brief history of Crosspointe and indicated their firm is expanding to the Midwest, from Florida. Mr. Burkett assured Board Members he is on-call 24 hours a day for consultation and would assist staff with solutions to their problems.

Mr. Mallory said the District seemed to focus on exceptions and were naïve and optimistic to a fault. He expressed appreciation to Crosspointe representatives for meeting with staff and two Board Members (Mr. Braun and him) prior to the Board meeting.

Mr. Braun apologized to students who did not receive their transcripts in a timely manner. He thanked Crosspointe representatives for their time, saying he feels Board Members now have a better perception of the conversion problems.

Mr. Clothier thanked representatives from Crosspointe for coming to Topeka and expressed his appreciation for their commitment.

Mr. Hall thanked Board Members for their support through this process.

Mr. Jones introduced bond counsel Greg Vahrenberg, Piper, Jaffray, Inc. to address the Board on refinancing bond issues. Mr. Vahrenberg explained two District bond issues could be refinanced and it would save taxpayers approximately \$245,040. He said there are some unspent proceeds from the 1999 issue and now would be an excellent time to apply these funds towards the refinancing. Mr. Vahrenberg explained that Piper, Jaffray, Inc. received 0.75% of the principal amount of the bond issue but there are additional fees associated with refinancing. He said the detailed charges are available to them. Board Members expressed their appreciation to Mr. Vahrenberg for his services.

ITEM AA – SPORTS PARK UPDATE

Mr. Mark S. Braun, Board president, introduced Mr. Chris Albert, general director of central services and facilities planning, for an update on sports park projects.

Mr. Albert said there are some additional recommended projects at the sports park and asked the Board's approval to bid those projects. He said there were 603 items needing repaired by various contractors and just a few projects not completed at this time. He said once the substantial work is completed, there is a twelve-month warranty in effect. He said one prime contractor, SRI Sports, has filed bankruptcy; however, a payment bond would cover those sub-contractors not paid. He said a lien could be made on the property, but the insurance company is confident payment would be made. He said the bonding company would be responsible for the warranty as well.

Mr. Albert presented a list of projects totaling \$150,043 and asked the Board's permission to accept bids. He said the funds available at this time are \$194,647. He said the District's portion of the Capitol Federal Natatorium signage cost is pending as well.

Mr. Browning asked about fencing on the soccer fields. Mr. Albert said that has been completed.

Mr. Clothier said there is some concern on the height of the backstop on the ball diamonds. He suggested they be raised in order to prevent injuries.

Mr. Braun asked if all the projects for the schools, which is part of that same bond issue, have been completed. Mr. Albert said they have been completed and that he has not received any calls from schools this past year.

Mr. Braun said after he had written his letter to her, he found out she does not live in this school district.

Mr. Mark S. Braun said the Topeka High School band just returned from a performance at Disney World in Orlando, Florida. He said he has heard several good comments concerning their performance.
