Special guests for this event include our speakers Dr. Ron Sider and Dr. Paul Chamberlain. Dr. Sider




Dr. Ron Sider

is professor of Theology, Holistic Ministry and Public Policy at Palmer Theological Seminary and the president of Evangelicals for Social Action. His numerous books include The Scandal of the Evangelical Conscience and Rich Christians in an Age of Hunger, which was recognized as one of the one hundred most influential religious books of the twentieth century. Dr. Paul Chamberlain (PBC'77) is the director of the Institute for Christian Apologetics at Trinity Western University where he teaches ethics and Christian apologetics. He has participated widely in public debates, made guest appearances on radio and TV, and served with Ravi Zacharias International Ministries. Both of these men are uniquely equipped to address the issues of a practical and effective faith.

Off the Ground—a successful launch for Prairie's new vocational college

and ahead to the next phase in its development:

What an amazing year this has been! PCAAT experienced a very successful launch with a full cohort of creative Early Childhood Education students, a double cohort of committed Practical Nurse students, and a keen group of Health Care Aide students who are taking the pilot program that allows them to bridge into the Practical Nurse

diploma.

The Early Childhood Education students have been active in preschools, daycares, and elementary schools since they began the Fall semester. The girls are being welcomed and embraced by local community programs as they prepare to be educators with a difference. "I wanted to work with children," says one student, "but I also wanted to go to Bible College. No other school offers both at the same time." Others who have the goal of teaching children using a Christian worldview are also finding that PCAAT is training them to do just that.

The Continuing Care Unit of the local Three Hills hospital is benefiting from the professional skills of our Health Care Aide students whose eager assistance is being appreciated by both patients and staff alike. The Practical Nurse students are achieving higher grades than Bow Valley College, our partnering institution, has ever seen. They are so excited to be moving into their first practicum in area hospitals as well as preparing for a student-initiated medical missions trip to Mozambique in May.

Several instructors will accompany about a dozen nursing students as they go to join Prairie alumni Dwight (PBC'90) and Lynn

Over the past four years there have been many new developments at Prairie. There are new buildings, new programs, new opportunities. But one thing that has not changed is our continuing commitment to enable the Body of Christ to reach the world with the Gospel of Christ.

To this end we have launched an aggressive vision for 2012 that will challenge us to have an annual graduating class consisting of 140 men and women who have expressed their intentions to serve God in specific capacities. The detailed breakdown of this vision looks like this:

- 7 youth pastors
- 5 domestic church planters
- 5 domestic corporate worship leaders
- 3 domestic camp ministry leaders
- 5 domestic health care
- 10 domestic natural resource specialists
- 10 domestic communication specialists
- 13 domestic educational specialists
- 2 domestic aviation specialists
- 5 seminary candidates
- 5 graduate school candidates

Accomplishing this goal will mean that we will double the annual number of graduates who will be specifically prepared and committed to serving the Body

Lagore, founders of Southern Africa Missions. Last year a small rural clinic was opened to address the overwhelming needs of the local people. Our team will help deliver medical services and promote health care education at the clinic and in surrounding villages. I'm so encouraged to see the passion these students have to use their professional skills for the glory of God at this early stage in their careers.

I understand why they chose to train at Prairie when I hear comments like this: "I have always wanted to be a nurse, but I wanted a good Christian college. When Prairie introduced the Practical Nurse program, I knew God wanted me here," or "I'm here because God has

called me to be a nurse and then a medical missionary."

This entire inaugural class of PCAAT brings excitement, joy, fun, professionalism and commitment to all they do both inside and outside of the classroom. It is such a delight to witness their spiritual, personal, and professional growth.

Much of that growth is due to the exceptional team of highly qualified instructors who are consistently modeling the integration of their faith into the fabric of their lives and their work. It never ceases to amaze me how God has led each one to Prairie and how committed and focused they are. Along with expressing how privileged they feel to be a part of this new venture, they tell me that "teaching is a joy when the students begin to see how theory matched with an attitude of love and caring can be practiced in their future careers and ministry endeavors."

It takes many people to bring a new program to life. A generous donation of hospital beds and medical equipment helped create an 8-bed educational lab that has seen extensive use this year. There have been many other gifts and donations of equipment as well and we have seen excellent partnerships established with Bow Valley College, Olds College, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology and Lethbridge Community College. In the Fall of 2007 we anticipate the addition of five new programs including Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Land & Water Resources (Environmental Stewardship major), Special Needs Educational Assistant, Pharmacy Technician, and Emergency Management.

The vision for PCAAT was born when Prairie's president Dr. Jon Ohlhauser saw the need for Christian-based vocational training that would prepare young people for professional ministry at home and abroad and allow them to integrate their faith with their career calling. I'm thrilled to be a part of this new adventure as God leads us into a future of unlimited possibilities.


Ministry Trips

The following student groups will be heading overseas on short-term ministry trips this spring:

Open Air Campaigners April 24 – May 5 After a stop in Kiev, Ukraine, OAC will travel to Russia where they will be sharing the gospel through drama, sketch board, and visual presentations in schools, open-air plazas and other public areas.

Barnabas Players April 27 – May 17
Prairie's drama team will minister mainly to school children in the city of London and surrounding areas. They will be assisting local churches as they explain their faith and address moral and family issues in city schools, many of which are predominantly Muslim.

PCAAT Nursing Students May 13 – June 9
Our nursing students will serve in medical missions at a rural clinic in Mozambique, giving medical treatment on site, providing health education for the community, and trekking to outlying villages to care for those who cannot travel to the clinic.

Prairie appoints new director of development

Dr. Ron Berg was recently appointed as Prairie's Vice President for Organizational Development. His role will be to give leadership in strengthening Prairie's relationship with alumni and friends and raising the financial support needed for the ministries and operation of the school.

Dr. Berg (PHS '60, PBC '64) has been a pastor, church planter, regional minister, and most recently the Executive Director of the North American Baptist Conference. His connections with Prairie go back to grade school days when his father David Berg was a student and staff member. Ron and his sister and brother sang and traveled for the Prairie

Children's Hour radio broadcast, directed by his uncles who made up the well-known Janz Quartet.

The Organizational Development Department provides direction for events like Homecoming and local alumni gatherings with the intention of keeping Prairie's supporters informed, involved and connected with the school. Development staff members are also responsible for Prairie's publications, including Servant magazine, the Prairie Harvester and regular update letters from the president. The general ministry gifts, endowments, capital campaigns, annuities, planned estate giving and special projects that comprise Prairie's financial support are all managed by this

department, as is the enormous task of recording and receipting all giving to Prairie and the management of the data base that contains current addresses and information for all of our alumni and supporters.

Catching the bug-flying high at Aviation Camp

If you ask most pilots when they first caught the flying bug you will hear a variety of stories from countless places involving many different people. There is one common theme, however, and it usually starts with "when I was a kid..."

For me it was the day my grandpa took me flying in one of his helicopters. I can still recall crouching on my hands and knees, my face plastered against the bubble of a Bell helicopter as we swept over the city of Edmonton. Thirty-some years later, the experience of that flight is still vivid in my mind. Why?

There is something about being a child that will not allow us to say 'never'. It isn't until we grow up that we lay aside those dreams of adventure and start settling down, simply allowing life to happen to us.

But with flying the opposite seems to happen. We just can't forget and invariably the flying bug reemerges. I've also noticed that the older you get the harder it bites. For me the dream lay dormant for twenty years. But love on a full-time basis.

Three years ago Prairie began hosting flight camps where young people were afforded the

when the aviation bug showed up again, it was too persistent to be ignored. Now I'm a proud part of Prairie's School of Mission Aviation, doing what I opportunity to get 'bitten by the bug'. In that time close to 100 teens have had the chance to come and train under real flight instructors and to take to the skies themselves, hopefully rekindling the dream of "when I was a kid."

The dates for Flight Camp this year are July 15-20, 22-27 and July 29 to August 3. Space for each week is limited so be sure to register early. Along with ground school sessions, each camper will receive 5 hours of flying time with additional ride-alongs. Our goal is that you will have a good introduction to the aviation industry and be encouraged in your walk with God. We hope you will experience the love of flying that has affected all of the staff here so deeply and have the opportunity to discover whether a career in aviation is for you.

One Ring

sk my eldest child which book on earth is his favorite and he won't skip a beat. Ask him about a moment when his prayers seemed silly and he just might smile widely.

Stephen's favorite book on earth is Lord of the Rings. To my utter amazement he had read all three of the thick tomes by the time he was ten. Before we celebrated his fifteenth birthday he had read them three times and was starting on the fourth. Crazy, I thought. He read them between playing basketball and ice hockey and table tennis. He read them in the evenings when he should have been studying. He read them late at night when he should have been snoring.

When he learned that Peter Jackson was bringing the stories to life on film, I had to peel him off the ceiling. From beginning to end, he can tell you more than you want to know about Middle Earth, about hobbits and goblins, about the "one ring to rule them all." The filmmakers should have used him as a consultant.

Shortly after we attended the first movie together, Stephen turned sixteen. It is a time in life when fathers and sons have whispered conversations about life and love and being grown up. One night during one of those discussions, I spoke to him of the importance of reaching this milestone. How, like his favorite hobbit Frodo, he would be faced with great temptations and great opportunities as he journeyed through the darkness of this earth. I said I would like to present him with a small gift as a covenant between us that he would walk the way Frodo had walked, choosing to do the right thing though it cost him everything. I talked of putting God first. Of faith. Of purity. He nodded his approval.

"What's the gift?" he asked.

When I told him, he smiled widely.

The next day I ordered it.

On the evening it arrived, we convened for a family ceremony. The children gathered around wide-eyed as I opened a wooden box. Inside was a genuine replica of The Ring—a rather expensive one, I might add. White gold, complete with Elvish engravings. "Where's ours?" said the other two "You children. wait," I told them.


Iread a short verse of Scripture: "So honor the Lord and serve him wholeheartedly" (Joshua 24:14). "For sixteen years that's been our prayer for you, Stephen. That you would honor God and serve Him." We prayed together, committing this child and his future to God. Then I took the ring, hung it from a gold chain, placed it about his neck, and kissed his forehead before he squirmed away.

There the ring stayed.

Until the night Stephen arrived home from high school carrying small pieces of the chain. He could scarcely bring himself to tell me.

It had broken, he knew not when.

The ring was gone, we knew not where. We searched everywhere. Along the sidewalks and hallways of Prairie Bible Institute. Through classrooms and cars. Nothing. It

was permanently gone, I knew. Hanging about someone else's neck. Adorning another's jewelry case.

But Stephen began to pray.

His younger sister and brother joined him too. At suppertime, they prayed that we would find the ring. At breakfast they prayed believing. I hated to doubt, but I am a grown-up. It's what I do best.

"There's more chance of the Chicago Cubs winning the World Series," I told my wife.

"They're not even in it,"

she said.

"Precisely."

Months passed. Winter came and went. The dazzling white snow that covered the field through which my son sometimes trudges to school began to melt.

And one evening as we sat down to eat together, I noticed a particularly wide grin stretching across his face. As we dived into some roasted chicken, he told us he'd been walking home from school when a glint of reflected sunlight caught his eye. He held his hand out and opened it. I couldn't believe my eyes. The ring. White gold with Elvish etchings. As good as new.

Oh me of little faith.

Do you know what my prayer had been all this time? That he wouldn't be too disappointed when his prayers weren't answered. Here I was, praying that his hopes wouldn't be dashed. Here he was, asking God to do the impossible, something He has delighted in doing since the dawn of time.

The ring hangs from a sturdier chain now. I hope it will remind my son to honor the Lord and serve Him wholeheartedly. I hope it will remind him that those who seek find, that those who ask receive. I hope it will remind me to never stop believing in the God of the impossible.
