The American Legion app is the fourth in a series of mobile platforms developed by National Media & Communications Division, which also produced The American Legion Claims Coach app for veterans filing benefits claims, as well as annual apps to promote and provide information about the national convention.

The new app, introduced to market last week, includes the following channels:

- Find a Post: Search either by ZIP code or by simply allowing your phone to find your current location. American Legion post addresses, maps and directions are presented, as well as phone numbers and websites.

My fundraising program: NEF

What will 50 cents get you these days? Maybe a small cup of coffee, perhaps a gumball for a grandchild or a stamp. Fifty cents, however, will go a long way toward helping members of The American Legion Family or posts that are struck by natural disasters such as tornadocs, hurricanes, flood strikes or wildfires.

During my national commander's acceptance speech last month in Houston for the 95th National Convention, 1 set a \$1 million fundraising goal for the Legion's National Emergency Fund (NEF) program. It's a lofty goal, but it comes down to just 50 cents per member.

We don't know when or where the next disaster will occur, nor do we know how severe it will be. We do know that Legionnaires, posts and family members will need assistance as they recover from a tragedy. NEF donations help Legion Family members pay bills, such as temporary housing, food and clothes, while they wait for insurance money to kick in. NEF has also helped posts refurbish or rebuild after a disaster.

In the past year, the NEF program has granted nearly \$750,000 in assistance for qualified veterans. Money has gone to victims of Superstorm Sandy in New York and New Jersey, as well as those recovering from tornadoes in Moore, Okla., and flooding in Marseilles, III.

Posts are encouraged to take an active role in raising funds for NEF and there are many easy ways to drive donations, such as a motorcycle rally, a fish fry or a golf outing. Posts should also consider partnering with an Auxiliary unit, Soos squadron or Riders chapter in order to receive greater participation and to promote the event more effectively.

And remember, as you hold fundraisers or ask for contributions, be sure to let prospective donors know that 100 percent of donations go toward grants for Legionnaires, posts and family members who are dealing with the after-effects of an emergency situation. All marketing and promotional costs are paid by National Headquarters.

Final touches are being put on a new series of NEF brochures that are aimed at assisting department and post leaders on best practices before, during and after an emergency. When the brochures are completed, review the documents and identify NEF coordinators who can familiarize themselves with what can be done ahead of time and how to respond during a disaster in your community. Part of those efforts include distributing the checks to those in need. Their payout is our organization's payoff for a successful fundraising campaign.

Editorial

There have been a lot of news stories about the computer security problems at Target and other stores. Have you heard much about the computer problems with the Veterans Administration? A software glitch allowed users to access one another's private information. The government wants veterans to file online but now there is a very real fear about security and identity theft. We put our faith in the government to keep our information and country secure. They need to do a better job!

Military retirees and active duty troops are concerned the pension cuts will be only the beginning of benefits erosion. There are a lot of efficiencies that can be made in the Defense Department, perhaps in the procurement arena. Balancing the budget on the backs of our veterans and active duty troops is not the way to go. As mentioned before, it just sends the wrong message.

Another area of concern is the level of unemployment among veterans. Government statistics show that 588 thousand veterans are unemployed. This number is expected to rise as personnel cuts begin in all the branches of military service. We must look to provide employment for our returning warriors. There is a push for companies to reach out to veterans and get them into the civilian workforce. If you are an employer, I urge you to hire a veteran. They have a work ethic that is not always found in the general population.

I recently came across some interesting information from the Bureau of Labor Statistics. There were approximately 21,250,000 veterans alive this last December. Down 26,000 from the month before. The veteran population is shrinking. The United States has lost over two-thirds of its veterans in the last fifty years. Not surprising given the large numbers that served during World War 2 and Korea. It also means that there are fewer veterans serving as elected officials at all levels. There is not always an appreciation of the sacrifices that are necessary to protect our freedoms.

In the elections held last November there was a low number of voters who turned out. As an example, the turnout in Haverhill was less than twenty-five per cent. This coming November will be another election where we will be voting for state and national officials. It is an important election. No matter which party you favor it is important to vote. I will continue this message from now until November. Too many complain about both parties but do not vote. Way too many have paid the ultimate sacrifice and here we are, taking it all for granted. Pay attention, plan to vote.

Tell Congress to Vote YES on In-State Tuition

(January 31, 2014) This Sunday, Feb. 2, 2014, many Americans will watch Super Bowl XLVIII, the largest sporting event in the United States. The National Football League takes pride in its relationship with the military. In past years it has featured Air Force flyovers, military color guards during half-time, and live video footage from an undisclosed Middle East location where service members watched the game via satellite. In 2009, General Petraeus, architect of the Iraq 'surge' strategy did the coin toss before kick-off.

Then on Monday, Members of Congress return to Washington with an opportunity to show their support as well. That evening, the House of Representatives will vote on important legislation for veterans, **H.R. 357**, the *GI Bill Tuition Fairness Act*. With lawmakers scrambling to show their support for military veterans in light of their "fumbling the ball' by the recent passage of the December budget deal that included a \$6 billion cut to veterans benefits, they need a win and this legislation offers them an opportunity to get back in the game with veterans. For student-veterans who attend public higher-education institutions the post 9/11 GI Bill only pays in-state tuition and eligible fees. Veterans who settle in states other than their state of residence upon separating from the service are initially charged "out-of-state" tuition, which means they must pay the difference between the resident and non-resident charges.

H.R. 357 would expand education opportunities for veterans by allowing them to attend the state-run higher-education institution of their choice at the in-state tuition rate. It would do this by requiring public schools to charge in-state tuition rates to all veterans in order for the school to be eligible to receive G.I. Bill education payments.

Daniel M. Dellinger, national commander of The American Legion, expressed support for this legislation saying:

"It is only right, proper and fitting that student veterans be afforded the in-state tuition rate at institutions of higher learning, regardless of their official residency status. These men and women seeking to better themselves educationally have given great service to our entire nation and should, therefore, be considered honorary citizens of all states."

So let your U.S. representative know you expect them to vote "YES" on **H.R. 357** and encourage states to offer in-state tuition rates for college-bound veterans.

Legion strongly opposes threat to military commissaries

WASHINGTON (Jan. 24, 2014) – The leader of the nation's largest veterans service organization says he is incensed by a threat to the survival of military commissaries – the U.S. military's grocery stores. The Department of Defense reportedly is discussing a \$1 billion cut over the next three years to the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA) budget. As a consequence, all but a handful of servicemembers' and military retirees' grocery stores could be closed.

"This is yet another undeserved blow to our men and women in service – and their families – in the name of 'necessary cutbacks' to reduce an ungainly national deficit," said Daniel M. Dellinger, national commander of the 2.4-million member American Legion. "Like the trimming of expenses to be made by reducing military retirees' pensions, this is an inexcusable way of attempting to fix a fault by penalizing the blameless."

The DeCA currently operates nearly 250 stores worldwide with a \$1.4 billion annual budget. With the proposed budget cut to \$400 million annually by fiscal 2017, all but 24 stores would close. Those remaining would be overseas and in rural areas stateside.

"Commissaries are extremely important to young military families who are just trying to make ends meet," Dellinger said. "By using commissaries, financially challenged military families can save an average of more than 30 percent on their purchases compared with commercial supermarkets.

"This important benefit helps compensate for the significant difference between military pay and comparable civilian salaries. In addition to improving the quality of life for the troops and their families, commissary privileges help recruit and retain the best and brightest men and women to serve our country."

The American Legion leader's comments echo the points made in a resolution adopted by Legion leadership in 2012, which stated, "The value of commissaries in the quality of life equation for junior enlisted families and military retirees and others is indisputable. Military commissary usage has ranked second only to medical health care in the non-pay compensation package... Any effort to reduce or dismantle the integrity of the military commissary system would be seen as a serious breach of faith with a bene-fit system that currently serves as a mainstay for the active and reserve components, military retirees and military survivors, military personnel involuntarily discharged or released from active duty, and 100 percent service connected disabled veterans and others."

Dellinger encouraged DoD to reconsider the proposal, saying, "The costs in both fiscal and human terms would be far higher than the temporary savings realized. It's a bad idea, plain and simple."

Pentagon Supports Cuts just not now!

Pentagon leaders support dramatic changes in military retirement. Just not now. And not for existing retirees, And maybe not the plan Congress has already passed. In testimony before the Senate Armed Services Committee on January 28th defense official pushed for a repeal of the military retirements changes passed by congress last month as part of a comprehensive budget deal. They called the move unexpected and unfair, saying that any large change in military compensation should not include current troops and retirees, who have been promised specific benefits and retirement payouts already, But Christine Fox, acting deputy secretary of defense also noted that changes to compensation such as troops pay, health care benefits and retirement payouts will be needed soon, to keep personnel costs from overwhelming the rest of the military budget. We cannot afford to sustain the rate of growth in military compensation that we've experienced over the last decade," she said. "We must find ways to slow it down if we are going to maintain our current force.

Officials want to wait until later this year when military compensation and retirement modernization commission will issue its report before making changes. But she stopped short of demanding repeal of the retirement change - 1% reduction in COLA for working retirees.

Congress has already passed one large correction, restoring the COLA cuts for most medically retired veterans. SASC Chairman Carl Levin argued a repeal is needed "because the change targets a single group - Military Retirees - to help address the budget problems of the federal government as a whole." Veterans groups (including the American Legion) have offered similar complaints, and say the move breaks promises made to troops who have made many sacrifices on behalf of their country.

The Senate is expected to take up a measure this week repealing the retirement change, as part of a veterans legislative package dealing with dozens of benefits and health care changes. But the measure faces an uncertain future in the house. Stay tuned for updates on COLA and other military benefits over the upcoming months.
