Bumpy road for Nyirripi!

ouncillors at the Central ■Desert Regional Council are counting their pennies as the cost of repairs to the Council's road network becomes known. The heavy rains during January caused extensive damage to the Council's 1,700 km of connecting roads.

'Most of our primary access roads have been heavily impacted,' President Adrian Dixon noted. 'Council's existing budget for road upgrades and repairs will not come close to covering what is needed to reinstate these roads.'

The road to Nyirripi, a community 150 km south-west of Yuendumu, only just re-opened in early February after the January rains. Council grading crews have been working hard to grade a track along the road so the store truck can resume deliveries.

'The Nyirripi Road has been extremely badly damaged,' reported Glenn Marshall, Director Works. 'Our engineers have assessed the road conditions and expect to be facing repair costs in excess of \$3 million on the Nyirripi Road alone.'

Although the Nyirripi Road is now open, people wishing to use the road are warned to exercise extreme caution. The Council was also advised of damage to the main access roads to Engawala and Nturiya and to nearly all secondary roads.

The Council is in negotiation with the NT Government in an attempt to fund the estimated \$5 million repair bill.

With so much rain happening over the holiday period, it is really good to begin to see communities becoming accessible again, the roads are drying out and how green has the country been! I'm sure many plants and animals in our region, and other regions, were happy for such a big drink!

Unfortunately the rain has also damaged a lot of roads around the region, so please be extra careful driving at the moment. Staff are working hard to ensure that all roads are open and useable, however, the repair bill is very large (about 15 years' worth of Roads to Recovery funding). So, the Council's priority will be repair of the main access roads. We know that travel on back roads is going to be difficult for a while but please be patient and understand the huge job it is to fix the damage.

I am once again pleased to be able to present such good stories on the efforts that Council puts in to make community life better. At the last Council meeting we reviewed our six-monthly progress and I am very pleased to report that the Council is well on track to delivering on all our major objectives. I would like to thank the Councillors and staff who work so hard to ensure the Council continues to deliver and help our communities prosper.

Yuendumu Childcare started the year in the new Yuendumu Child and Family Centre on 3 February and since then, a large number of families and stakeholders have checked out the new service. We are all looking forward to a busy year at Yuendumu Early Childhood.









Wilora: What flood?'

In the midst of the stories of water damage and destruction as a result of the extreme weather events in Central Australia over Christmas it is nice to hear a good news story once in a while. Certainly for the community members of Wilora this year's heavy rains were almost a non-event. Thanks to work undertaken by the Central Desert Regional Council works team, flooding of houses in Wilora is a thing of the past.

Regional Works Manager at Anmatjere Rodney Baird explains: 'In 2011 several Territory Housing dwellings flooded two-feet deep after stormwater surged into the community from the north-east.' Council subsequently surveyed the area and identified that a drain installed on the east of the community would divert

stormwater south into Stirling Swamp, 60 km north of Ti Tree.

Council's local Indigenous works team used Council graders, loaders and tipper trucks to construct the drain, working closely with community members and traditional owners to ensure no sacred sites or other valued areas were disturbed.

The big rains this January saw water try to sweep into the community again, but it was captured and diverted by the new drain. All houses remained high and dry. Council President Adrian Dixon said, 'This is a great example of a local fix for a local problem. Council proudly supports its local Indigenous employees to improve the lives of local residents.'

Local residents David Mbitjana and Denise Dinnie said, 'It was so good that no water flooded into our houses this time.' Senior Elder Rebecca Numina remarked, 'We could hear the water coming down but we didn't worry because the drain took it all away'.

The Volunteer program provides the Council with the capacity to expand the activity choices for remote children, providing a greater variety of ageappropriate activities that keep young people occupied, healthy and out of trouble. It also forms an important part of the Council's workforce development program, creating invaluable opportunities for young people from across Australia to learn about remote Indigenous people, land and culture. It provides a great training ground and opens up employment opportunities for these Volunteers to return to Central Australia and into paid employment.

Despite this great track record and the obvious need for remote kids to have access to well supervised sport and recreation activities, continued funding constraints threaten this tried and tested program .

John Gaynor, Director of Community

Services, was thrilled to provide a warm welcome to the Volunteers, 'You can't underestimate how much value the Council places on the commitment of these Volunteers. The rate of aerosol inhalant abuse in Alice Springs demonstrates how important sport, recreation and other diversional activities are in keeping young kids healthy, happy and engaged in the community. As soon

as the young people on communities see the flame-orange t-shirts they automatically get excited, they can't wait for new fun activities to start, there's no time for mischief,' Mr Gaynor said.

'The Volunteers also play a valuable

role in supporting local Indigenous youth workers, so they learn from each other. This provides an ideal opportunity to form strong working relationships and it brings people back to the Centre to pursue their careers,' Mr Gaynor also said.

Great job guys!








Central Desert reviews electoral representation

Central Desert recently completed an Electoral Representation Review through the four Wards of the Central Desert Region, consulting with Local Authorities and Community Members. Some of the major issues under consideration that were put forward:

- Continuing as four Wards or moving to a nine Ward option;
- Changing the name of the Council, its members, or its Wards or;
- Changing the existing boundaries.

After discussing the outcomes of the consultation process within community, the Council recommended not to change the current electoral structure.

'The Electoral Review provides an opportunity for Council to consider how it best represents its various ratepayers, residents and businesses,' explained CEO Cathryn Hutton. 'The decision not to change is a good



indication that Council has the mix right and Council is confident in its role and representation obligations.'

Councils are required to undertake a


review at least once during each term. The next electoral representation will be conducted in approximately four years' time.
