# The Philbrook House A Piece of Old Bellevue

The Philbrook House at 10133 ½ Main Street is one of the oldest buildings in Bellevue. Built in the 1890's, this Victorian style home, was named for one of its first owners, civil war veteran Alphonse W. Philbrook, who also worked as a janitor for the Bellevue school district.

The building has housed many different businesses over the years. Originally built as a residence, during the 1920's and 30's it was a restaurant owned by Mrs. Florence Carter, selling 35 cent lunches to the whalers who wintered in Meydenbauer Bay. In the 1940's, it served as a plumbing supply store.

Afterward the building stood vacant for many years and was eventually used as a bakery, which later moved to

a building across the street. From the 1970's up until the 2000's it housed several antique shops, including both Munk's Old Main and Amazing Grace Antiques.

The Philbrook house blends well with the character of Old Bellevue's commercial district. Much of the original building remains intact. All of the exterior walls are covered with shiplap. The house also features double-

hung, single pane windows, a shed roof with original handcut supports, that are large turned posts. Additions have been made to the house over the years.

One of the few buildings in Bellevue built in the Victorian style, the Philbrook House site is planned for re-development and will likely be torn down soon.

#### **EXHIBITS**

Don't miss the exhibit Bellevue: A Beacon of *Diversity*, up now at the Winters House, until July 31st. This exhibit was researched, designed and installed by Marika Levidow, a senior at the International School. A version of this exhibit was also displayed at the Strawberry Festival in June. This fall Marika will be headed to Cornell University. Best of luck Marika!

Eastside Equestrians will be opening at the Winters House the first week of August. Western equestrian culture was a trend on the Eastside in the 1950's and 1960's. Bridle Trails and Diamond S Ranch are just two examples of the amenities that were available for horses and their admirers on the Eastside. This exhibit will take a look at how the equestrian lifestyle made an impact on Eastside communities.

#### ONGOING PROJECTS

#### Bellevue Botanical Gardens Oral History Project:

Eastside Heritage Center has collected 20 oral histories relating to the Bellevue Botanical Gardens. We are currently transcribing these interviews. Material from the interviews will be used to help design new interpretation elements at the Bellevue Botanical Gardens

This is a volunteer project that can be done off site and outside of normal business hours.

#### Storage Clean-up Project:

This summer we are excited to welcome two interns to EHC! Dani Jackson, a recent WSU graduate, and Anna Goss, a current UW Museology graduate student.

They will be working with our Collections Committee on an Off-Site Storage Cleanup project. The outcomes of this project will be updated room inventories, which will help make locating artifacts for research and exhibit easier, straightened and cleaned shelves, which helps prolong the life of artifacts in storage, and also improves access to materials, and the digitization (by way of digital photos) of oversized artifacts in storage.

This will also help with the exhibit planning process, and improve general record keeping. This is a BIG project, with over 1570 square feet of storage to inventory and organize.

#### **Collections Grants:**

Thanks to generous funding from the Bellevue Rotary, Eastside Heritage Center has been able to replace all of the old wooden shelving in our McDowell House storage areas with steel shelving. Assembled with help from our crew of collections volunteers, these shelves. which house over 180 linear feet of objects, are much sturdier and aligned with current museum best practices for artifact storage.

Wooden shelving off-gases (which can permanently damage artifacts) and can be prone to mold growth. Steel shelving will be resistant to both of those problems.

Earlier this year, additional funds from the Bellevue Rotary and 4Culture were used to purchase three new display cubes, which have been added to our fleet of cubes available for off-site exhibits.

## In Memoriam

#### Patricia (Groves) Sandbo

On April 13, 2014, longtime Eastside Heritage Center member and volunteer, Pat Sandbo, passed away peacefully at age 98.

Pat was born in Seattle in 1916 and lived most of her life in Bellevue. After graduating from Garfield High School in 1933, she earned a teaching degree from Seattle Pacific College in 1938. She taught elementary school until 1942, when she married James J. Bruce Jr, a USAF officer. They had three sons, James, Stephen & Michael. Pat and Jim lived where he was stationed until they divorced and she returned to Bellevue in 1957. While teaching at Bellevue Elementary, she met Robert S. Sandbo and his two sons. John and Eric. Pat and Bob married in 1962.

Starting in the 1960's, Pat was active in the League of Women Voters, PTA and later, with Bob, in the Bellevue Camera Club. She worked for many years at the Bellevue Public Library, where she also volunteered. Pat was instrumental in bringing Austrian artist Sepp Meyerhuber to do a mural and mosaic for the then new library.

Pat and Bob were founding members of Eastside Heritage Center and spent many years gathering



interviews, photos and historical data, giving local presentations throughout the community and working as docents at the Winters House. In 2008, Pat and Bob were jointly honored as Volunteers of the Year for EHC, and they also received a "First Citizen of Bellevue" award.

Pat was a treasure to everyone who knew her and will be deeply missed by all of her friends at Eastside Heritage Center.

During the past two months, we have presented a variety of programs, including field trips, activity events, and historical slide shows, to everyone from preschoolers to seniors. We make sure each EHC presentation is appropriate for each audience. All of this makes the job of Education Coordinator challenging, but a lot of fun!

Early in June, 115 third graders plus teachers and chaperones visited the Winters House and grounds as part of their historic Bellevue program. A big thanks to EHC volunteers Steve Williams, Katie Stacy, Lee Maxwell, and Joyce Bell for helping give all of the students a good look at the historic house.

Trips to two skilled nursing centers and an independent living facility were next, with slide shows as the focus. In addition, a very large audience saw *Bellevue: How It Grew* at the Friends of the Bellevue Library meeting.

Those who have helped at the Fraser Cabin at Kelsey Creek Farm Park, may remember that some of our visitors to the farm and cabin can be quite small. The chicken coop and wooden eggs, as well as the water pump, are particularly popular! Play dough bread,

churning butter, and grinding coffee are usually hits as well.

In July, a very enthusiastic group of 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> grade ELL (English Language Learners) took the Early Bellevue Walking Tour as part of their summer program. They visited the Downtown Park, Meydenbauer Beach Park, Whaling Cove, Wildwood Park, and Old Bellevue Main Street. It was interesting to see history through the eyes of students new to the area!

Later in the summer, we will be doing pioneer activities for four Bellevue Boys & Girls Club locations and another field trip for the ELL program. The latter will be at Lewis Creek Park and will focus on Early Salish Life in our area.

All of this certainly keeps Eastside Heritage Center busy! Thanks to all of the volunteers who help make all of these programs successful!!




