The program was centered around classroom instruction for 30 beginning sailors in the morning. This group then split up on the dock in the afternoon with seven high school students sailing Sunfish led by Lynnae Biasca and the remainder sailing Holder Hawks with George Tinker. The 10 experienced advanced students were led by Brit and Jim Gastreich and assisted in strategy lessons by Tom Mills and George Cardas. The advanced group sailed the five newly acquired CBYC Lasers and some additional privately owned Lasers for a Laser class competition. CBYC is very fortunate to be able to provide boats and a program to so many young sailors. We hope they will become life time sailors.

Many parents and regular helpers were present to make the Sailing school a success. A special thanks to Thad and Bernadine Vincent for repair and upkeep of all the CBYC boats. 


