How to Get Started Researching Your Family History

- **Start with yourself and work backwards one generation at a time.**
- **!** Interview family members to find out what they remember.
- Collect family documents. Look in all your files, boxes, scrapbooks, photo albums, safe-deposit boxes, and any other places that will give clues to family history. Look for marriage licenses, birth or death certificates, a family Bible, baby books, address books, autograph books, letters, newspaper clippings, Christmas cards and other items with names, dates or addresses.
- Visit cemeteries, courthouses, places your family lived, churches your family attended. Attend family reunions.
- **Research the migration path your family made. Read books about the social life and customs for the different generations.**
- ❖ Join Genealogy Societies in your home town and in the towns where your ancestors lived.
- **❖** Read books about the state and county your ancestor lived in.
- ❖ Visit your local Library and use the Genealogy books, periodicals, microfilm and databases such as Ancestry.com or Heritage Quest.
- ❖ Find out if the Library where your ancestors lived has a Genealogy Section or Local History Room. If you're planning a visit to the Library check their online catalog before you go.
- **❖** Look for newspapers from where your ancestors lived. If you're lucky you can find digitized newspapers online. If not, try to borrow microfilm.
- ❖ Use maps, atlases and gazetteers to learn about where your ancestors lived.
- **❖** Keep a paper "hardcopy" of genealogical records as a backup for the times when no computer is available, or to make scrapbooks to show other family members.
- **❖** Take Genealogy Forms for collecting data to family reunions and when you visit relatives.
- **Attend genealogy classes, seminars and programs.**

Forms for Recording Genealogical Information

- ***** Each piece of information concerning a pedigree ancestor and his/her family should be placed on a worksheet. Since the end result of your research efforts will be to compile complete, correct and connected families, the use of family group sheets and other forms from the beginning will make the compilation much easier.

- ***** There are great sites on the internet. However, it is important to verify what you find. You still need to do research in books, courthouses, churches and cemeteries.
- ❖ There are two genealogy databases available for use at the Bay County Public Library. Ancestry.com must be used inside the Library. Heritage Quest is available inside the Bay County Public Library and also available from home or work with an internet connection and your Library card number. When you type in your card number do not use spaces (26632000000001).
- ***** There are a number of good free sites on the internet.
- Family search.org http://www.familysearch.org/eng/default.asp. This is a service by the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints. Be sure to use the new Record Search Pilot portion of this site. New records are being indexed by volunteers daily. http://pilot.familysearch.org/recordsearch/start.html#start
- The USGenWeb Project is a group of volunteers working together to provide free genealogy websites for genealogical research in every county and every state of the United States http://usgenweb.org/
