

INTRODUCTION

More and more we know that all children learn from the moment they are born. While parents, with help from family and friends, are children's first and best teachers, many parents work or are in school during their children's early years. Others want help with their children's early learning. For this reason many parents look for individuals or programs to care for and support learning of their children.

WHAT DO YOU WANT/NEED FOR YOUR CHILD?

Families have different ideas about and needs for early learning for their children. Early learning can happen in many settings. Children are learning new things all the time – no matter where they are or what they are doing – with parents or with others.

These are the kinds of choices that parents need to make:

- **Cost**: Can I pay for the program or do I need a free program or a subsidy/ scholarship to help pay for it?
- **Hours:** Do I want a part day program or do I need my child to be in a program for the full day?
- **Program:** Do I want the program to provide a period of structured learning experiences (part day preschool, such as Head Start) or learning interspersed within the program (full day child care)?
- **Location:** Do I want my child in or near my home, near work or school? Do I want my child in a center, family child care home, the home of a family, friend or neighbor or in my home with a person coming in?


Part day preschools are programs for children who are at least 2 or 3 years of age that operate for four hours or fewer per day. Part day preschools are not licensed or regulated in any way by the State as long as the children are in the program for four hours or fewer per day. Examples of part day preschools are parent cooperative preschools, Head Start or ECEAP programs. Some Montessori programs are part day preschools. Costs of and financial help for these programs vary.

• Parent Cooperative Preschools

- Non-profit school organized and operated by parents with assistance of a community or technical college. The programs are exempt from licensing as long as the children are in the program for four hours or fewer per day.
- **Montessori** is a philosophy of education based on the child's innate ability to develop her own pace in a non-competitive environment. (Montessori programs may be in licensed child care or may be part day preschools).
- Head Start and Early Childhood Education Assistance Program (see descriptions on page 10)
- **Playgroups** are informal arrangements made by groups of families.

Licensed Child Care are programs that are licensed by the state and provide care/early learning for children. Most are open during the day, but some operate in the evenings, at night and on weekends. Most are open for a full day, although parents can arrange for part time care. Licensed child care is rarely free, but subsidies and scholarships may be used to pay for them. Licensed Child Care includes:

- Child care centers (including school-age care)
- Family child care homes



How Do I Find Child Care and Preschools?

Child Care Resources (CCR) can help you to find quality child care and preschool programs. Child Care Resources has a database with over 2,000 child care providers in King County, including licensed centers and family providers, preschool programs and before-and after-school care.



If you have concerns or observe licensing violations with your caregiver or in your child care search, it is important to follow-up on your concerns.

- It is suggested that you discuss your concerns with the provider or center director. If doing that does not resolve the situation, we encourage you to call CCR to assist you in determining whether the issue is a licensing violation or a non-licensing issue such as a business practice dispute.
- Call Washington State at (800) 562-5624 option "5" to report child abuse/neglect or licensing violations at a child care center or family child care home.

If you are considering enrolling your child in licensed care, you can find out if any complaints have been made about a licensed program by calling the appropriate licenser.

WHAT PROGRAMS AM I ELIGIBLE FOR?

Every early learning program serves a particular group in our community. Some serve a particular neighborhood. Others serve a particular ethnic group. Others serve only very low income families or only children age 3-5.

The only way to find out if you are eligible for a program is to apply and provide the program with all the information they need to see if you are eligible. In this guide, we have divided the services into categories based on area of the county and age of the child. Most of the programs outlined here limit eligibility based on income level.

Above all, you want to choose a program that works for your family - for your schedule, your budget, your lifestyle, your values. Carefully consider all your choices and pick a program that feels safe and appropriate to you.

ECEAP and Head Start give priority to children with special needs and to children in foster care. Due to a possible history of neglect, abuse or trauma all foster children should be screened for developmental disabilities.

INFORMATION ON HEAD START AND ECEAP

Head Start and ECEAP are comprehensive preschool programs serving low-income children and children with disabilities. Head Start is federally funded; ECEAP is state funded. Services include free preschool education, health and nutrition services and family support. The program is offered in many school districts and via community agencies, community colleges, child care centers and family child care homes.

Head Start

There are many program models available:

- Part Day
 - Usually offered four days per week, in the morning or afternoon. Preference is given to 4 year olds. Sometimes these take place at a day care center where parents can get extended day services. Transportation is often, but not always, provided.
- Full Day
 - This is a child care based model; families pay for child care with subsidy or other means, Head Start services are free. Transportation is usually not provided.
- · Family Child Care
 - Child care based model; families pay for child care with subsidy or other means, Head Start services are free. Transportation is not provided. This model may serve children aged one month to kindergarten age in licensed family child care homes.

ECEAP

Three and four-year old children and their families with income up to 110% of Federal Poverty Level (FPL) (for examples, see page 15) or who are otherwise at risk of school failure are potentially eligible for ECEAP. ECEAP prepares children for success in the public school system through comprehensive integrated services including early childhood education, health and dental screenings, nutrition, parent involvement in the child's education, and family support services and referrals. ECEAP contractors determine eligibility.

Early Head Start

Early Head Start (EHS) serves eligible pregnant women, infants and toddlers up to age three years. This comprehensive child development program offers health, education, and family support. Parents also participate and benefit from the program.

WHAT DO I NEED TO GET IN?

Head Start, ECEAP and Early Head Start require that all families provide proof of their income for the past year. This can include a completed tax form, W-2 forms, pay stubs, a letter from DSHS or other documents that show the family's income.

Families may also be asked to provide a copy of the child's birth certificate and proof of their address.

These programs will also need proof of immunizations before a child can attend.

Head Start, ECEAP and Early Head Start also encourage families to get a medical check up and a dental check up.

HELP PAYING FOR CHILD CARE OR PRESCHOOL

There are many sources of funding to help pay for child care. Most are called subsidy programs. This means the parent pays a part of the cost of child care and the program pays the rest. The most commonly used programs in King County are listed below.

They are:

- Working Connections Child Care Subsidy (WCCC) offered by DSHS
- City of Seattle Child Care Subsidy
- Child Care Financial Assistance Program (CCFAP)
- Scholarships and sliding fee scales

Working Connections DSHS Child Care Subsidy Program

Working Connection Child Care is a program that helps families with children pay for child care.

Who is Eligible?

Children who meet citizenship requirements (are documented residents or citizens) and whose parents:

- Have low incomes (at or below 200% of Federal poverty level see chart below and on page 15)
- Are working or participating in a DSHS approved work activity.

Kinds of Child Care DSHS can help pay for:

- Licensed or certified child care centers (including those with a Head Start or ECEAP program within child care program)
- Licensed or certified family child care homes (including those with a Head Start or ECEAP program within child care program)
- Relatives who provide care in their own homes
- Adults who come to your home to provide care.

Documents needed for processing of the Working Connections Application:

- 1. Pay Stubs
- 2. Social Security Cards for all children for whom you want child care subsidy
- 3. Verification for receiving following income if applies:
 - a) Public Assistance
 - b) Labor and industries
 - c) Unemployment compensation
 - d) Social Security Income (SSI)
 - e) Veteran's benefits
 - f) Military allotment
 - g) Income Tax Refund
 - h) Railroad Benefits
 - i) Money from roomers/boarders/renters
 - j) School grants or loans
 - k) Cash prizes
 - 1) Insurance benefits
 - m) Child Support/Alimony
 - n) Retirement/Pension
 - o) Trust or annuity
 - p) Other Loans
 - q) Voucher for housing

As with all DSHS programs, the only way to know for sure if you are eligible is to apply.

City of Seattle Comprehensive Child Care Program

The City of Seattle helps low and moderate income working families pay for their child care costs. Families can choose from 165 child care homes and centers in Seattle. These child care providers contract with the City of Seattle to provide high quality and affordable child care for our city's children.



You may be eligible when all of the following apply:

- You live within the Seattle city limits
- You are employed or in job training
- Your children are under 13 years of age
- You are within the "eligibility" income guidelines
- You are not eligible for any other subsidy program

Documentation required:

- 1. Pay stubs for the most recent full month, possibly as much as 6 months
- 2. Two pieces of address verification (utility, cable bill or lease agreement)
- 3. All other income documents such as: Social Security (SSI, SSA), Unemployment benefits, Child Support received/paid out, VA, Disability, L&I.

Student parents and Self-employed families are required to submit additional documents.

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Child Care Financial Assistance Program (CCFAP)

This program provides child care financial assistance for residents of certain cities outside the City of Seattle limits who:

- 1. are not qualified for any other child care subsidy programs and
- 2. are working and/or in school.
- 3. have a family income under 80% of Median income for HUD (go to page 15 for income guidelines).

The amount of financial assistance available depends on the family income. Parents pay the difference between the assistance and full price of child care. For example, your family may qualify for \$300 per month in assistance. If your child care costs \$1150 per month for two children, CCFAP would pay \$300 and your family would pay \$850.

Scholarships and sliding fee scales

Some organizations that sponsor early learning programs or child care providers offer scholarships or sliding fee scales. When you call a program, ask about availability of these lower cost options.

This program is a home visiting program and primarily serves families living in Seattle Housing Authority garden complexes (Yesler Terrace, New Holly, High Point, Rainier Vista). They can serve a limited number of other families who live within reasonable driving distance and want to be served by NH. Current families are 90% immigrants and refugees. Family services are provided in the families' languages and interpreters are available.

To view maps of the Seattle Head Start areas, see Appendix A at the end of this guide. Parents may choose a program not in their area if the program better meets family needs.
