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## Orange County Collaborative Courts Annual Report for 2013

Accompanying this letter is the 2013 Annual Report of the Collaborative Courts, which sets forth the results of Orange County's Collaborative Court programs for the last calendar year.

These programs, which offer therapeutic, life-changing alternatives to the revolving door of incarceration and re-arrest, include adult and juvenile Drug Courts, DUI Court, mental health courts, Veterans Treatment Court, Homeless Outreach Court, Truancy Court, and supportive programs for youth in the dependency system.

The remarkable success of these programs, both economic and social, is reflected in many ways:

- 1. Providing therapeutic treatment instead of incarceration results in substantial savings in the costs of locally-served jail and prison bed days. In 2013, the stayed sentences of program graduates totaled **79,291** days, which translates to a savings of more than **\$12 million**.
  - Drug Court saved 30,346 jail bed days for a savings of \$4,124,628.
  - DUI Court saved 36,305 jail bed days for a savings of \$4,934,576.
  - The mental health court programs, including Veterans Treatment Court, saved 8,205 jail bed days for a savings of \$1,115,224.
  - Juvenile Drug Court saved 4,435 custody days for a savings of \$1,862,700.
- 2. Graduates of Collaborative Courts programs have low rates of recidivism:
  - Of the 1,657 Drug Court graduates who have been out of the program for three years, only 28.8% have been re-arrested for any crime far lower than the rate of 74% for comparable offenders who did not participate in Drug Court.
  - Of the 214 mental health court graduates, all of whom had severe mental illness and a co-occurring substance addiction, only 29% have been re-arrested.
  - Of the 1,030 graduates of DUI Court, all of whom were repeat-offense drunk drivers, only 7.7% have had a subsequent DUI conviction.

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- Of the 169 Juvenile Drug Court graduates who have been out of the program for two years, less than 12% had a subsequent referral to Probation within that time.
- Of the 53 graduates of Veterans Treatment Court, only 6 have been re-arrested.
- 3. The Collaborative Court programs also produce other significant benefits for the County:
  - While taking part in the programs, female participants have given birth to
     180 drug-free babies, saving the health care system millions of dollars.
  - Hardcore, repeat-offense drunk drivers have been turned into advocates of sobriety able to live longer, healthier lives, and sparing those innocent victims who will not be killed or injured in future automobile accidents.
  - Drug-addicted criminals have been changed into responsible, taxpaying members of the community – stopping the cycle of repeated costs to crime victims and the justice system.
  - Combat veterans, steeped in violence and stress, have been helped to overcome their deep psychological challenges and re-integrate into society.
  - Mentally ill offenders have been helped to lead stable, productive lives
  - o Homeless offenders have been given the tools to regain their self-sufficiency
- 4. Processing cases through Collaborative Court tracks yields cost savings when compared with processing them through "business as usual":
  - Researchers for the Administrative Office of the Courts found that every \$1.00 invested in the Drug Court at the Central Justice Center in Santa Ana resulted in a total cost savings of \$7.30.

The success of Orange County's Collaborative Court programs is a result of the steadfast support of the County and the dedication of the partner agencies.
