Rhame Jr. Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing a studentcentered and learning-focused environment that promotes academic and social excellence. Our students demonstrated growth and achievement across all subject areas. Kindergarten-first graders made significant progress in reading as measured by MAP for Primary Grades. Emphasis was placed on core reading word mastery to facilitate growth in reading. Response to Intervention (RtI) was used to address student academic support and enrichment needs. Twenty fifth grade students received the Gold and Silver Presidential Scholars Award. After-School Program activities provided academic support and assistance. Twenty-four students excelled in the Strings program and are ready for middle school orchestra. Our school's TEAMWORK music video received first place in the district's video production contest. A member of our student fitness team was named "Mr. Fitness" at the annual District Fitness Bowl. Students in K-5 excelled in Spanish and showcased their learning during an outstanding end-of-year performance.
Rhame's teachers are highly qualified with eight National Board Certified teachers. Two teachers received the Strong Schools Grant Award from Colonial Life to bring Readers on the Rise and Lego Education to our school. Parents and community stakeholders played a critical role in supporting the needs of our students. St. Andrews Baptist Church provided instructional resources and support for both students and teachers throughout the school year. Lunch buddy mentors from the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) and the Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) inspired our students to work hard and do their very best. The Upsilon Omega Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., provided monthly mentoring and cultural experiences for fifth graders in the Girls of Promise and the Boys of Purpose programs. Westminster Presbyterian Church and Colonial Life Insurance Company partnered with Harvest Hope Food Bank to provide weekly Snack Packs for some of our students. Golden State Foods donated backpacks filled with supplies to our first grade students. Books and Breakfast, Grandparents Day, and Parent University activities enhanced parent and community involvement. Our school, our parents and our community partners worked together to empower our students to achieve their potential and dreams.
