Upstate research initiative supports children with cancer in the classroom

Researchers at SUNY Upstate Medical University and Syracuse University are developing a computer-delivered course for educators that will provide them with the skills necessary to better support children with cancer in the classroom. If successful, the course may become a national model for educators and others who directly work with children with cancer. The project is funded through a one-year, \$35,000 grant from Hope Street Kids, a children's initiative of the Cancer Research and Prevention Foundation.

According to the project's co-investitgator Ava Kleinmann, many children with cancer, or who have recovered from cancer, experience cognitive changes related to their treatment. These changes may be observed as difficulties in school, such as a decrease in mental stamina, possibly making the child appear inattentive or unable to complete class assignments. Neuropsychological changes may also occur, such as subtle changes in memory function or organizational skill.

"One role of hospitals" states Kleinmann, "is to provide comprehensive neuropsychological assessments of students with a history of cancer. However, consumers of these reports may not understand how to interpret these assessments in order to make the appropriate modifications in their classrooms. Our project aims at bridging the service delivery gap between hospitals and schools to ultimately benefit children with a history of cancer."

Course content and design is projected to be completed by the fall of 2004. Content will focus on increasing educators' knowledge of the cognitive effects of childhood cancer and its treatment; explaining neuropsychological reports, making educators better able to adapt their classrooms to accommodate the cognitive needs of the student; and in changing attitudes regarding educators' competency in working with children with cancer.

Approximately 50 teachers from elementary, middle and high schools in Onondaga County will be recruited to complete the course, projecteded to be five hours in length, and be tested on their knowledge of the neurocog-

Hyperbaric Medicine program receives accreditation

University Hospital's Hyperbaric Medicine Program has received its first accreditation from the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society (UMHS), making it the first accredited hyperbaric oxygen therapy program in New York State and one of only twenty-eight accredited programs in the United States.

In addition to treating decompression sickness, hyperbaric oxygen treatments are also used for 13 other conditions, including soft tissue radionecrosis, non-healing wounds and carbon monoxide toxicity.

Program staff includes Enrico Camporesi, MD, medical director; John McCabe, MD; Daniel Olsson, DO; and registered nurses Wendy Merritt, Victoria Wright, Kathy Heater and Eileen Zimmerman.



nitive effects of cancer and its treatment and on content of interest before and after completing the course. They will complete questionnaires regarding their attitudes toward working with children with cancer, their perceived competency in understanding the recommendations of neuropsychological reports and using them as the foundation for planning classroom modifications and strategies, and on their satisfaction with the computer modules.

If the course content and acceptability are successful, additional funding may be sought to modify the course for use by other school personnel, such as school nurses and psychologists, as well as by families of children with cancer.

Principal investigator of the project is Ronald Dubowy, MD, director of the Center for Children's Cancer and Blood Disorders at SUNY Upstate Medical University. Co-investigators are Brian Rieger, PhD, director of Rehabilitation Psychology in SUNY Upstate's Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (PM & R); Ava Kleinmann, PM & R clinical and research intern and a graduate student in Syracuse University's Psychology doctoral program; Nan Songer, an educational specialist for the Center for Children's Cancer and Blood Disorders and professor of education at Syracuse University; and Larry Lewandowski, PhD, professor of psychology at Syracuse University. Cynthia Rogers, a graduate student in psychology at Syracuse University, is the grant coordinator.

FluMist for Healthcare Workers?

The following information on the use by healthcare workers of the newly approved influenza vaccine, FluMist, is provided by SUNY Upstate's Infection Control Department:

FluMist is a live, attenuated influenza vaccine that is administered intranasally and was approved by the Food and Drug Administration last June. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recently published recommendations that this vaccine should not be used by persons who are unable to avoid close contact with immunocompromised hosts (e.g., household, healthcare workers) for at least 21 days after receiving this vaccine.

There is a theoretical risk of cross-contamination of influenza virus per infectious respiratory secretions to a susceptible individual. Others who are recommended to avoid the live vaccine (FluMist) include those with underlying medical conditions that may predispose them to severe reactions (asthma, reactive airway disease or other chronic disorders of pulmonary or cardiovascular system, diabetes, renal dysfunction and hemoglobinopathies or persons with known or suspected immunodeficiency diseases), egg allergies, pregnancy or being less than five years or greater than 50 years of age.

It also identifies duplicate references and organizes project folders.


