THE PARTNERS

The Trauma Treatment Training Center (TTTC) is a collaboration of the Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children and The Childhood Trust at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center (CCHMC). The Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children is a child advocacy center dedicated to prevention, evaluation, treatment, and research about child abuse and neglect. The center includes physicians, psychologists, social workers, nurses, child protection workers, and law enforcement professionals. The Childhood Trust is a joint effort of CCHMC and the University of Cincinnati that offers training and consultation on the intervention and treatment of child abuse and family violence.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the TTTC is to develop expertise in transferring evidence-based and evidence-informed treatments for traumatized children and adolescents to community mental health providers. This is accomplished through a cycle-based dissemination method designed to transfer evidence-based treatments through training and follow-up consultation, while continually refining the treatments in real world settings through clinician feedback.

MULTI-LEVEL COLLABORATION

In addition to training and providing follow-up consultation to clinicians, the TTTC works with agency supervisors to implement the model, maintain fidelity to the model, and build training capacity within the agency. The TTTC collaborates with agency administrators around issues of fiscal management and sustainability, as well as with third party payers to authorize models as billable therapies to ensure agency reimbursement.

CARE training is applicable for nonclinical adults who interact with children of all ages in a large range of settings:

- residential treatment center staff
- day care providers
- medical care providers
- graduate practicum students
- foster parents
- staff working with foster parents
- foster care caseworkers and child protection workers
- partial hospitalization staff
- social service case managers
- community support providers
- home visitation providers
- child victim advocates
- receptionists and other administrative staff who come in contact with children as part of their duties



Child-Adult Relationship Enhancement (CARE)

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Child-Adult Relationship Enhancement (CARE) is a trauma-informed, field-initiated training developed by the Trauma Treatment Training Center for general usage by non-clinical adults who interact with traumatized children. CARE is not a therapy, but uses similar skills taught in Parent-Child Interaction Therapy. CARE utilizes the 3 P skills (Praise, Paraphrase and Point-Out Behavior) to connect with children, a set of techniques for giving children effective positive commands, and selective ignoring techniques to redirect problematic behaviors. CARE also contains a trauma education component to contextualize the use of these skills with the kinds of behaviors and problems exhibited by traumatized children.

TARGET POPULATION

CARE can be used with children of all ages and can be generalized to a wide variety of settings and implemented at different levels of intensity. CARE is supported by pragmatic evidence of its effectiveness.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

CARE training is offered in two forms based on agency setting, client population, and agency goals.

1) Basic CARE:

- 3 hour training
- Includes demonstrations and active skills-building practice

2) Expanded CARE:

- 6 hour training
- Includes demonstrations, active skills-building practice, live coaching and mastery testing

CEUs

Attendees receive 3 or 6 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board.

REGISTRATION

CARE is offered two ways 1) On an agency-by-agency basis and 2) after a PCIT training as a supplement to the training. Trainers can train CARE onsite at local agencies, or agencies can bring staff to The Trauma Treatment Training Center. According to a cost-benefit analysis conducted by the Washington State Institute for Public Policy, PCIT saves \$3.64 for every \$1 of social service cost. The net savings from PCIT is over \$3,400 of social service costs per family treated (Aos, Lieb, Mayfield, Miller & Pennucci, 2004).

Parent-Child Interaction Therapy

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT) is a short-term, specialized behavior management program designed for young children experiencing behavioral and/or emotional difficulties and their families. It is an evidence-based treatment supported by over 30 years of research and practice by PCIT providers throughout the United States and internationally (www.pcit.org). PCIT is an assessment driven, criteria-based therapy which focuses on improving positive child behaviors through a strong parent-child relationship. Research has found that successful completion of PCIT decreases parenting stress and reduces child behavior problems in the home, school, and public settings.

TARGET POPULATION

Unfortunately, children rarely outgrow many difficult behaviors. Should negative behaviors continue or increase, these are likely to interfere with the children's learning abilities and development of appropriate social skills, preventing them from reaching their full potential. Originally, PCIT was developed for children aged 2 to 7 with disruptive behaviors, including ADHD, and their caregivers. PCIT has been successfully expanded for use with families of children who have a history of physical maltreatment, domestic violence, foster/adoptive care, parental substance abuse, developmental disabilities, and/or reunification or adjustment difficulties. Recent adaptations for children up to age 12 years are being examined.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Our training adheres to the National PCIT Training Guidelines. Please see www.pcit.org for more details. Training and follow-up consultation is conducted by 2 licensed psychologists: Robin Gurwitch, PhD and Erica Pearl, PsyD. PCIT training consists of 40 hours of classroom work delivered in 5 consecutive days with an additional 16 hours delivered approximately 3 months later. Training also includes mandatory weekly consultation calls for approximately one year. PCIT participants must be a licensed mental health provider (or working under a licensed provider) with a minimum of a Master's Degree. Training size is limited to 12 participants.

CEUs

Attendees receive 40 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board. Ohio psychologists receive 40 CE credits from the Ohio Psychological Association.

*Note: Costs have recently increased due to cut backs on grant-funding to underwrite much of the training costs as well as new national guidelines for PCIT training. These guidelines include increased training hours and mandatory consultation calls. Costs will cover all training materials and follow-up consultation following the training.



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TF-CBT Reduces:

- Intrusive memories, thoughts or dreams about the trauma
- Avoidance of trauma reminders
- Emotional numbing
- Physical and psychological hyperarousal
- Significant impairments in daily living



TF-CBT has been adapted to address the needs unique to certain cultural populations, including Latino families. It has also been adapted for hearing-impaired, deaf populations, and for children experiencing traumatic grief.



Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT)

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) is an evidence-based treatment developed and tested by Drs. Esther Deblinger, Judith Cohen, and Anthony Mannarino to help children and their caregivers overcome the negative effects of traumatic life events. TF-CBT is a clinic-based, short-term treatment that teaches children skills in stress management, cognitive processing, communication, problem solving, and safety. It is essential that the child's primary caregiver participates in the treatment in order to enhance parenting skills and manage caregivers' own reactions to the child's trauma.

TARGET POPULATION

TF-CBT is intended for caregivers and their children ages 3 to 18 who have experienced traumatic life events, such as sexual abuse, traumatic bereavement, natural disasters, or domestic violence. TF-CBT targets posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) symptoms, depression, behavioral problems, and other issues commonly experienced by traumatized children. Typically lasting 12-16 sessions, TF-CBT consists of two phases: 1) individual sessions with the child and caregiver; and 2) joint caregiver-child sessions.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Trainees should be Master's level clinicians in order to attend this training. TF-CBT training consists of 12 hours of classroom work over 2 days.



Child Forensic Interviewer Training

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

The Child Forensic Training Institute, founded in 1998, trains professionals in the forensic interviewing of children. It offers both Dr. Thomas Lyon's adaptation of the evidence-based, NICHD structured protocol and the Childhood Trust Flexible Guidelines for interviewing. Skills-building training on the use of interview aids such as the Cognitive Interview, the Touch Survey, anatomical drawings, and anatomical dolls are also presented and practiced.

TARGET POPULATION

Child Forensic Interviewer Training is intended for a wide range of professionals who interview children about suspected child abuse.

STAFF SELECTION AND TRAINING

Child Forensic Interviewer Training consists of 35 hours of classroom work over 5 days. The training includes lectures and practice interviews with non-abused children and role-play interviews with adults portraying allegedly abused children. These interviews are videotaped and reviewed by faculty and peers, and include mock trial practice. Small group discussions provide ample opportunity for interaction among trainees and nationally recognized peers and researchers. This training highlights cutting-edge, practical information and promotes interdisciplinary collaboration. Multidisciplinary teams are welcome.

CEUs

Attendees receive 30 Counselor or Social Worker CEUs through the Ohio Counselor, Social Worker and Marriage & Family Therapist Board.
