

Reef Rovers - By Madison Chapman

This month, the Reef Rovers had two fantastic adventures. Our first fieldtrip was a kayaking expedition with retired marine biologist Jack Taylor. We explored the mangrove tunnels of South Lido Beach and saw tons of cool animals. When we stopped on a sandbar, we found ice cream cone worms, lightning whelks, baby stone crabs and other awesome animals. As we kayaked, we noticed the abundance of Cassiopeia jellyfish. They have become more and more common because the sea turtles, which are their natural predators, are being killed off by red tide. Also, Sarasota Bay is being filled with more and more nutrients from run-off, which the Cassiopeia eats.

What was our second project? Bat houses galore! We built, stained, caulked and installed five bat houses across Sarasota and Manatee counties. The project was funded by a grant from the Sarasota Bay Estuary Program. Bat houses are wooden boxes where bats can live, because their natural habitat is being destroyed. Bats are important because they eat tons of pesky insects, like mosquitoes. One bat can eat 3000 bugs per night! Our bat houses went up at Longwood Run Park, Crosley Mansion, Pine View School, Pocono Trail and Twin Lakes Park.
