School of Nursing PLANNING BEGINS

On Nov. 23, 2011, the nursing faculties and staffs from Bemidji State University and Northwest Technical College began the work of unifying as a School of Nursing. The School of Nursing is planned for a July, 2012, launch after two years of studying models of nursing education, gathering ideas from faculty, alumni, and the advisory group, and identifying the future for nursing in the region. The goal is to create a school that honors individuality in an empowering culture and delivers health care with quality above expectations.

Empowering Culture:

In an empowering culture:

- faculty members feel confident to be creative and to change based on best practices;
- students trust their educational experience to prepare them to be ethical, evidence-based care providers, and are instilled with the confidence to demand quality in their future work;

Faculty at both BSU and NTC were surveyed about their work. The faculty identified students as being at the center of their work, and their commitment to each other as extremely important. Empowered faculty, who in turn create empowered students, create graduates who will elevate the quality of healthcare delivery.

Honoring Individuality:

Bemidji State University and Northwest Technical College will come together as a school of nursing while retaining the unique educational missions of both institutions. BSU will continue to provide the baccalaureate nursing program while NTC will continue to provide nursing assistant, practical nursing, and associate registered nursing programs. Each student, faculty member, and support staff member brings a unique mix of talents, ideas, histories, and approaches to the school. We value the variety of programs currently offered and acknowledge that our separate histories will drive our shared future.

Faculty and staff at both institutions will retain their current contracts and seniority. Professional development will be grounded in individual strengths, measured with tools such as Strengthsfinder $^{\rm TM}$ and StrengthsQuest $^{\rm TM}$. Recognizing how these strengths support individual expertise creates an environment that honors individuality and ultimately creates a culture of empowerment.

Delivering Healthcare With Quality Above Expectations:

At the School of Nursing, quality will be central. This quality will be affirmed through national accreditation — by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education for BSU and by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission for NTC. By assessing each part of our program and ensuring that our educational practices are effective, we are able to obtain and maintain national accreditation.

BSU will be surveying our students, graduates, and those who employ our graduates during the summer of 2012 to gauge our effectiveness. We will be submitting our mid-term report during the summer of 2013. NTC will begin its first self-study process by submitting a candidacy letter in the next two to four months. NTC plans to complete a visit and achieve national accreditation by 2015.

These are exciting times for our programs. These benchmarks for our students will increase their employment flexibility and improve their transfer experience as they pursue higher-level degrees.

The Student Admissions Progressions and Concerns Committee has been busy this fall. The committee has:

- admitted 120 RN-BS students who began this fall;
- admitted 53 students to the Four-Year Track who will begin nursing programming in the spring of 2013;
- reviewed student program outcomes and was pleased with the 88-percent board pass rate for the 2011 Four-Year Track cohort;
- launched the federal and state background check programs in fall 2011. This was done to comply with upcoming Board of Nursing requirements that all students taking NCLEX-RN be required to submit a federal background check with results evaluated by the board prior to the license being issued;
- reviewed and updated bylaws.
