## Lesson Plan

- I. Date July 10, 2009 Subject John Calvin Grade Level 9 Teacher L. Lapp
- II. Main Focus: Students will learn about John Calvin and the roots of Calvinism in Geneva.
- III. **Objectives**: Understand how Calvinism began and flourished in Geneva. See how Geneva was a place of refuge, Illustrate the importance of humanism and the vernacular word in the Reformation movement. See how the Protestant Reformation sparked the English Reformation, although it had political motives more than social.
- IV. **Prerequisite Skills:** Knowledge of navigating on the internet. Some prior knowledge necessary for think and explain questions.
- V. Lesson Mode: John Calvin Web Quest, Top Ten Closure activity & home work extension.
- VI. **Procedure**: Students will work independently to complete attached John Calvin webquest in class. Teacher will float around the room to assist students as needed. If students finish early, they can click "next" and read on for extra knowledge about the Counter Reformation.



\*\*Note- Questions 26-31 deal with the English Reformation. In my school curriculum map, King Henry VIII and the English Reformation immediately follows John Calvin. If you do not teach the English reformation following John Calvin, you will probably want to delete questions 26-31 and remove the choice of King Henry VIII from the Raft homework assignment.

In my classroom, I will use questions 26-31 as an introduction to the English Reformation, the topic I will teach in the class following this webquest.

- 1. RAFT- Write a three paragraph letter...
  - R- Assume the Role of John Calvin or King Henry VIII
  - A- Your audience is the Pope, the leader of the Roman Catholic Church
  - F- Your format will be a persuasive letter
  - T- Your topic will be reforms needed to be made by the Catholic Church
