In 2002 Hofstra University established an unprecedented fellowship program for students engaged in advocacy on behalf of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) community. The program demonstrates Hofstra's commitment to equality and support for LGBT individuals.

Hofstra Law School Fellowship

The Law School's participation in the Hofstra University LGBT fellowship program includes the Fellowship for Advocacy for the Equality of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender People. Each year, the Law School awards fellowships to as many as three (3) incoming J.D. students with a history of advocacy on behalf of the LGBT community.

Fellowships are awarded to students who have demonstrated a commitment to advocacy on behalf of the LGBT community. The fellowship is open to persons of all sexual orientations in recognition of the diversity of individuals who may ally themselves with sexual equality, and underscores the importance of alliances between the LGBT community and the community at large.

Fellowship Program Overview

- A tuition fellowship of up to \$20,000 for each year of law school.
- Up to two \$5,000 summer stipends to cover living expenses during summer externships related to LGBT advocacy.
- A comprehensive course of study devoted to equality, including courses in Sexuality and the Law, Sex Discrimination and Jurisprudence, and an independent study and tutorial designed to address issues of particular concern to the LGBT community.
- Experience in legal advocacy for the LGBT community through the Law School's externship program, which places students with nonprofit organizations, including those devoted to legal advocacy on behalf of the LGBT community.
- Participation in a mentoring program with LeGal, the Lesbian and Gay Lawyers Association of Greater New York, representing one of the most diverse legal practice communities in the United States inclusive of LGBT individuals.

Selection Process

Fellowship recipients are selected on the basis of demonstrated academic ability and experience with advocacy on behalf of the LGBT community prior to law school, which may include political activity, aid to LGBT social support networks, participation in events that promote the visibility of LGBT people, and other forms of charitable or philanthropic activity. Consideration will also be given to an applicant's plans for advocacy on behalf of the LGBT community that make use of a law degree.

Applications received by Friday, February 2, 2007, will be given first consideration. Applications submitted after February 2 are encouraged and will be considered throughout the enrollment process. Application materials should be sent to:

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The need for law-trained advocates for the LGBT community is substantial:

- Massachusetts recognizes same sex marriage. The Federal Government does not require other states to honor same sex marriages performed in Massachusetts.
- Lesbian and gay families are taxed for health benefits provided to domestic partners, while married heterosexual families are not.
- Discrimination in employment and housing on the basis of sexuality is legal in 33 states and on the basis of gender identity in 42 states. The federal government provides no civil rights protections for LGBT people in employment and housing.
- Six states prohibit gay men, lesbians, or same-sex couples to adopt. Three states prohibit gay and lesbian individuals and/or same-sex couples from serving as foster parents. In many other states LGBT individuals are routinely denied custody and adoption rights.
- Since it began to track hate crimes motivated by sexual orientation bias in 1992, the FBI has consistently ranked anti-gay violence as the third most frequent form of bias-motivated crime.
- 40 states do not have hate crime legislation that include sexual orientation and gender identity.
- Between 1994 and 2005 the U.S. military discharged over 10,000 people as a result of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," a number that is more than two full brigades and one-third of the 30,000 new recruits the military claims it needs to fight the war on terrorism.
