

LEAVING CERTIFICATE RESULTS 2009

Once again our Leaving Certificate class has excelled and the class of 2009 are to be congratulated on the excellence of their results. The class average of 428 points per student is reflected in 100% of the students moving on to recognised third level courses.

St Gerard's was placed in the top ten schools in Ireland for the percentage of students who have gained places in higher level degree courses. This reflects positively on the educational ethos and programme of the school and the endeavours of so many to maintain high levels of academic excellence.

JUNIOR CERTIFICATE 2009

We are most proud of the achievements of our Junior Certificate class of 2009. 38% of the students achieved 9 Higher A's, B's or C's', 55% of the students achieving 8 or more, 77% 6 or more, with the average per student at 7 Higher A's, B,s or C,s.

The quality of teaching and learning in our educational environment and within our educational programme is highlighted by the results above. The broad holistic opportunities offered to the students by our academic programme only complement the richness of the experience the students gain here in the school.

TECHNICAL DRAWING/DESIGN & COMMUNICATION DES SUBJECT INSPECTION

The DES have completed a Design & Communication Graphics and Technical Drawing inspection and will present their report in the New Year. This is our sixth subject inspection in three years. We have already received excellent reports in History, Science, Irish, English and Physics.

OUTREACH PROGRAMME

Our current 6th Year students will have the wonderful opportunity to travel to Rwanda during the summer of 2010 to participate in our Outreach Programme. Once again Unicef are willing to facilitate the school in the coordination of this event.
