Legislature Passes Minimum Wage TRENTON - The Assembly passed a bill championed by Democrats to raise New Jersey's hourly minimum wage to \$8.50 and require the rate to then be

adjusted annually based on the Consumer Price Index by a vote of 44-31-1 on Monday.

With final legislative approval in hand, the bill now goes to the governor, who could sign it, veto it or attempt to modify it through a conditional veto. Gov.

Chris Christie opposes the provision for automatic increases, so some form of veto is likely.

Under this legislation, and based on projected trends in the CPI by nonpartisan legislative staff, the minimum wage would rise to \$9.49 in 2017.

During the Assembly reorganization ceremony in January, Speaker Sheila Y. Oliver

that increasing the minimum wage – which is now \$7.25 per hour – would be a Democratic priority this legislative session.

Measure Awaits Action By Christie

The bill (A-2162) specifically increases New Jersey's hourly minimum wage rate to \$8.50 on and then requires it be adjusted annually based on any increase in the Consumer Price Index, with the adjustment taking effect on July 1 of each year.

"This is great progress for hard-working New Jersey fami-

(D-Essex/Passaic) announced lies struggling to make ends meet," said Oliver.

Deputy Republican Leader Bucco (R-Anthony M. Morris/Somerset) said the bill would "have a negative effect on a large segment of wage earners," suggesting that employers would reduce their workforce. "At a time when a number of small businesses are trying to recover from October's superstorm, this bill will not help them in that effort," he said.

If someone making the current minimum wage of \$7.25 per

hour works 40 hours a week, every week, they earn only \$15,080 per year before taxes.

Republicans and other opponents of the minimum wage increase typically characterize minimum wage workers as teens making money to pay for gas or cell phone bills, but New Jersey Policy Perspective points out that 80.1% of those who would receive an immediate raise from the proposed bill are adults and 24.1% have children.

STATE - Dec. 7 marks 71 years since anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii that drew the United States into World War II. More than 2,400 Americans were killed and more than 1,100 were injured in the surprise attack. Four U.S. Navy battleships, as well as several other smaller vessels were sunk.

President Franklin Roosevelt said that Dec. 7, 1941 "is a date which will live in infamy."

In 1994, Congress designated Dec. 7 as National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day and the U.S. flag is traditionally flown at half-staff, but it is not a federal holiday.

Sheriff's Officers Seek "Tree Of Hope" **Donations For Kids In Need**

UNION COUNTY — Every holiday season for 15 years, Union County Sheriff's Officers have set up their "Tree of Hope" in the courthouse seeking donations of toys and clothing for needy children throughout the county. Each year the response has been overwhelming.

The "Tree of Hope" was first planted in 1997 when officers approached Sheriff Ralph

Froehlich and related troubling stories of children who were going to experience a less than happy holiday season. The children the officers encountered were homeless or living in shelters, were victims of domestic violence or medically fragile. Their parents or guardians did not have the financial ability to provide holiday gifts. Every year since the Sheriff

Officials Urge Sandy Survivors: Ask Questions About Letters From FEMA

TRENTON - Survivors who received letters from the Federal Emergency Management Agency after contacting FEMA for assistance should ask for help if they have questions, agency officials say.

FEMA sends every applicant a letter explaining the status of their application.

Sometimes a letter from FEMA indicates a status of ineligibility. This may simply mean that more information or documents are needed to better help FEMA process your application.

Eligibility statuses can change when new information is provided. Survivors may need to:

•Provide records that showed the damaged property was the primary residence at the time of the disaster.

•Give their insurance or other documentation to FEMA.

•Provide proof of ownership or residence.

•Return the Small Business Administration disaster loan application.

• Sign all essential documents. (continued on page...7)

BoE Replacement Expected Before Christmas

Board of Education is expected to appoint a city resident to replace Kurt Rebovich, Jr. as a school board member when the panel convenes at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 20 at the Perth Amboy High School Auditorium.

Rebovich was forced to resign because he accepted a job with the New Jersey School Boards Association, a taxpayer funded organization that created an ethical conflict with his service on the Board of Education.

According to the resolution approved at a special meeting on Monday, Board Secretary Derek Jess received correspondence from Rebovich resigning on Nov. 16, but he failed to notified the other school board members until Nov. 27, causing a delay in the appointment of a replacement.

Sources in the school district say Jess intentionally delayed the process because the current majority of mem-

PERTH AMBOY — The bers wants to fire Superintendent Janine Caffrey and he hoped to hold out for newlyelected William Ortiz to take office in January.

> The board directed Jess to publish advertisements in newspapers, two ElDiario/La Prensa and the Home News Tribune, requesting qualified candidates to file letters of interest along with their credentials.

> Rebovich has been among the minority of board members who support Caffrey, an ideology motivated steward who has sought to fire tenured teachers, change policies that insulate school staff from political influences and turn over more public money to private business interests.

School privatization is a highly controversial component of the Republican Party's agenda that has been embraced by some neo-liberal Democrats. Critics says every child deserves a quality education and Perth Amboy is the benefi-

ciary of \$180 million a year in state funding due to the Supreme Court's endorsement of that approach in the series of decisions handed down since the original Abbott v. Burke ruling in 1985.

At least one observer who believes Jess violated his duty by failing to inform members about the vacancy said the Board Secretary should be fired along with Caffrey.

"The administration of Republican Gov. Chris Christie intervened three times to overturn board votes to fire Caffrey and Derek Jess acted against the public interest by failing to notify elected members of this vacancy on a timely basis," said James J. Devine, a Democratic strategist who has advised numerous candidates in the city. "Action is required to remove the taint of politics from Perth Amboy classrooms."

Homeless Man In Famous Photo Grew Up In South Plainfield

SOUTH PLAINFIELD -You've probably seen his photo on Facebook. A tourist snapped the picture of a New York City police officer giving a pair of boots to a shoeless, homeless man in Times Square last month, and that image has been shared among hundreds of thousands of people through the internet.

The homeless man in the photo has been identified as Jeffrey Hillman, 54, a former South Plainfield resident who joined the Army after he graduated from high school. After leaving the Army, he reportedly worked in kitchens in New Jersey before he became homeless. According to the New York Daily News, Hillman has had an apartment in the Bronx paid for with a combination of federal Section 8 rent vouchers, Social Security disability and veterans benefits.



Ten Year-End Tax Moves To Consider

by Thomas Ploskonka, C.P.A. Hear those holiday bells? Soon they'll be ringing in the new year. But before the clock strikes 2013, you have opportunities to reduce your 2012 federal income tax bill. Here's a grabbag of suggestions.

1. **Plan for the AMT.** The annual exemption may change, but the usual triggers – items that can create alternative minimum tax liability such as certain large deductions – are the same.

2. Education incentives. Pre-paying qualifying expenses for the first semester of 2013 can get you a larger credit or deduction this year.

3. **Family gifts.** Take advantage of the expiring \$5.12 million lifetime gift exclusion by sharing the wealth – and the tax burden – with lower-bracket family members. 4. **Deferred plans.** Maximize contributions to retirement plans such as your 401(k) or IRA, and fund other tax-favored accounts, such as health savings accounts.

5. Charitable contributions. Gifts to qualified charities made on your credit card by December 31 qualify for a deduction this year, even though you'll receive the credit card statement in January.

6. Itemized vs. standard deduction. Shift expenses such as property taxes between years to "bunch" deductions and get the most tax benefit.

7. **Disaster relief.** Check for a potential refund, and consider amending your 2011 return to claim your loss if you live in a federally declared disaster area. 8. **Investment cost basis.**

Understand your cost basis choices before capturing capital gains or losses, especially when selling mutual funds.

9. **Temporary depreciation deductions.** Assets purchased for your business or rental property before year-end may qualify for accelerated depreciation methods that are scheduled to expire on December 31.

10. Kiddie tax. Instead of transferring assets to your children to save for future education expenses, consider contributing to a 529 plan, which can limit exposure to "kiddie" tax on unearned income.
