OHV personnel takes readings of the sound levels at several locations throughout the park and surrounding areas. In addition, the facility was initially designed with raised berms intended to control sound levels at the Park. The City has received no sound related complaints relative to the OHV Park in the prior year. The remoteness of the facility from sensitive sound receptors and its proximity to active agricultural activities with similar ATV equipment uses minimizes the potential impact from sound generation.
