DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Blees Military Academy, located on a 123 acre lot in the countryside just south of Macon, Missouri includes three buildings: Academic Hall and its adjacent heating facility (224' E-W X 88' N-S), the Gymnasium (100' E-M, 60' N-S) to the north and a modern garage to the west. Both major buildings are constructed in a variant of the Romanesque Revival style. Academic Hall is constructed of structural concrete and steel beams supported on iron columns and faced with buff brick and limestone over a concrete foundation. Pecause this building was designed to be fireproof, all interior features, window casings, doors and moldings, except for some wooden and cork floors which rest directly on concrete, are clad in molded copper. All walls and ceilings are finished with plaster. The Gymnasium is of frame construction faced with buff brick and limestone over a concrete foundation.

Decorative features of these buildings include crenellated gables and parapets, distinctly corbel tables and bartizans supported by corbeled culs-de-lampe. Academic Hall is capped with a hipped roof of red asbestos shingles and a large, gabled skylight, while the Gymnasium features a hipped roof faced with red tiles.

The interior elevation of Academic Hall reveals three floors and a basement. High cofferenceilings in the large open areas of the first floor are supported by Tuscan style iron columns and pilasters. A grand, wrought and cast iron staircase leads to the second floor aula or sun parlor. Galleried apartments at the second and third floor levels surround this grand open space, recessed behind a two story Tuscan colonnade. The large skylight above is suspended from 42' span riveted Howe type steel trusses supported by steel column 14' above the top of the I beams just above the main ceiling. This trusswork also support the gabled skylight above visible on the buildings' exterior. Academic Hall originally included 110 individual sleeping rooms of a small size (7'9" X 11'9"), 12 suites of facult apartments, 3 large laboratories, a photographic darkroom, a study hall, a hospital, a carpentry shop, a drafting room, a large dining room and a huge kitchen. Except for the kitchen and dining room, the uses of many of these rooms changed over the years.

The plan of the Gymnasium originally included an indoor running track, a shooting gallery, the gymnasium proper, and a swimming pool (now filled in or covered) as well as showers at other accessory rooms. The roofing here is supported by modified Warren roof trusses of iron and timber spanning 61'5". On the south side, a reinforced concrete tunnel runs from the Gymnasium to the basement of Academic Hall.

The only major alteration to Academic Hall has been the placing of glass and steel partitions at several points in the large open area around the grand stairway on the first floor to facilitate air conditioning. In the Gymnasium, large rooms were partitions into smaller ones after 1915.

Blees Military Academy is significant for three reasons. Architecturally, Academic Hall and the Gymnasium are a unique expression of the Romanesque Revival style in their rural locale. As originally constructed, the Academy was provided with 400 surrounding acres on which were located orchards, a working farm, extensive gardens and a dairy. The pastoral nature of the surrounding environment survives and acts to enhance, through contri the monumental architecture of the Academy buildings. In addition, Blees Academy is significant as a surviving memorial to Colonel Frederick Wilhelm Blees, a Prussian immigrant who became a philanthropist, a teacher and the acknowledged chief benefactor of the City of Macon. Blees, who was born in 1860 in Aix-la-Chapelle, France, then a part of the Prussian Empire, served in the Prussian Army, studied at the Universities of Heidelber and Murzburg, taught at many private schools and colleges in the eastern and southern United States after his arrival here in 1881, and settled in Macon, Missouri in 1889 as headmaster of St. James Academy, an Episcopalian military school for boys. In 1896 Colons Blees inherited the wealth of his father's coal and iron mining interests in Germany, and he used this to benefit the City of Macon. He was responsible for the construction of several of the town's commercial buildings and the town's first sewage system; he founded the local horseless carriage factory and the First National Bank of Macon; he financed the paving of the town's streets on a 50-50 basis with the city; and in 1898-1899 he financed the construction of the Blees Academy (Macon [Missouri] Chronicle-Herald, June 30, 1973, p. 1; General History of Macon County, Missouri, pp. 146-149). Finally, this property is additionally significant as the home of Still-Hildreth Osteopathic Sanatorium (1915-1968). Blees died in 1906, the Academy went bankrupt soon thereafter, and the buildings stood vacant until 1915. In that year Dr. Arthur G. Hildreth and Charles E. and Harry M. Still, sons of A.T. Still, the founder of the profession of osteopathy, established a sanatorium here devoted to the treatment and care of all types of nervous and mental disorders. The farm, dairy, gardens and orchards provided a diet of pure wholesome food, an important par of basic osteopathic treatment (Irma Miller, Macon [Missouri] Chronicle-Herald, June 8, 10 and Hildreth, pp. 247-268). It was at this time that the interior of the Gymnasium was altered to house and isolate the most disturbed patients. Still-Hildreth was acquired by the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Kirksville, Missouri in 1964 for use in psychiatric training. By 1968, however, finances forced its closing. The property, thou recently acquired by the City of Macon, has been vacant ever since. Recently, the Veteran's Administration conducted a feasibility study on the Academy in preparation for its possible reuse as a nursing home. The buildings were found unfit for such a use, but they were saved from demolition due to exceptional cost of such an action (Christner Partnership, Inc., pp. 156-161). Currently, the Committee for the Preservation of the Blees Military Academy of the Macon County Historical Society is trying to locate a buyer or find a use for the property.







BASEMENT PLAN BLEES MILITARY ACADEMY MACON, MISSOURI






Interior, second floor, detail of the wrought iron railing, view to northwest.
