Small Animal Sessions

Friday, June 6, 2008 - morning lectures - Small Animal Dermatology - Craig Griffin

Otitis - the basics and what is needed for success - Otitis exerna with emphasis on the basics of the anatomy and physiology as they relate to problem ear cases. How to determine the most effective approach and multiple treatment tips will be discussed.

Approach to dogs with Pruritis - Emphasis on how to reach a diagnosis of allergy. The role of infections, cytology and trial therapies will be presented.

Management of allergic dermatitis - Discussion on the approach to pruritic dogs emphasizing the role of diet trials along with long term treatment for atopic dermatitis - Craig Griffin

Ocular emergency cases - Acute glaucoma, blunt trauma, perforating trauma & acute blindness - aspects of history and signalment in the diagnosis and approach to treatment - Margie Gilmour

Feline ophthalmology cases - Work through case presentations specific to cats to include history, clinical findings, diagnostic tests and treatment - Margie Gilmour

WET LAB - Friday afternoon - Small Animal Video-Otoscopy

3:00-5:00 pm - Jennifer Peters (maximum 12 participants) - Techniques for otoscopy, recognition of normal and abnormal structures of canine external ear canal, use of video otoscope; utilize video of otoscopic exams illustrating various disease conditions, normal anatomy; hands-on use of otoscope learning how to manipulate videoscope and get diagnostic images of external ear canal on anesthesized canine patient.

Food Animal Sessions

Friday, June 6, 2008 - morning lectures - Small Ruminant Sessions

Small ruminant (sheep, goats, llamas and alpacas) - Techniques to control parasites including the Famacha techniques for small ruminants - Tom Thedford

South American camelid - topics concerning health problems and general management of both llamas and alpacas - Tom Thedford

Common health conditions seen in goats - Discussion of the common diseases and conditions seen in goats. Some of these diseases have no vaccines or the vaccines have severe limitations. Veterinarians have to be aware of the limitations and formulate a plan to control these conditions - Lionel Dawson

Friday, June 7, 2008 - afternoon lectures

Interactive discussion of current topics in beef cattle medicine - In small group settings, practitioners will work through cases involving current topics in beef cattle medicine. Following each case discussion, a short presentation will be given covering the topic to highlight key points of each case.
