#### CHECKING ON THE STATUS OF APPLICATIONS

Applicants are responsible for monitoring the submission and completion of all application requirements. Applicants are responsible for monitoring the submission and completion of all application requirements. After the applicant receives his/her user ID and password, the applicant will be able to check the application status online through LSAC.

Admission decisions will be communicated to the applicant in writing. This policy is for the protection and confidentiality entrusted to our Admissions Office by each applicant.

Applicants for regular admission should submit their application as soon as possible after October 1, 2010. Applications are not evaluated until all required documents have been received. To be considered for admission to George Mason Law, applicants must provide the following five items on or before April 1, 2011:

#### 1. Application and Application Fee

Applicants must provide a completed application form, accompanied by a \$35 non-refundable application fee in the form of a check or money order payable to George Mason University. Payment by check or money order must be paid with U.S. funds drawn on an American bank. Checks drawn on foreign banks, even if in U.S. dollars, are not acceptable. Applicants may transmit their application electronically through LSAC, or they may print a completed application and mail it to the law school.

The standard first-year application deadline is **April 1, 2011. For** guaranteed consideration, all application materials (items 1 through 5) should be received by George Mason Law on or before April 1. Admissions decisions are made on a rolling basis.

#### 2. LSAT/LSAC Credential Assembly Service (CAS) Report

Applicants must register with the LSAC Credential Assembly Service so that George Mason Law will receive a current Law School Report furnished by the Law School Admission Council (LSAC). Most colleges, universities, and law schools make LSAT/Credential Assembly Service information and registration booklets available for pickup. Applicants also may contact LSAC directly at 215-968-1001 or through www.lsac.org.

## The George Mason University School of Law LSDAS Recipient Code is 5827.

The Law School Report must reflect (a) all work done at undergraduate institutions, signifying that a baccalaureate degree has been or will be awarded before the start of the academic year for which admission is being sought and (b) the results of at least one Law School Admission Test (LSAT) taken within the period June 2006 through February 2011.

The applicant has sole responsibility for meeting all of LSAC's requirements. Failure to register properly, maintain registration throughout the admissions process, or provide transcripts and other related materials to LSAC can delay or prevent release of a report to a law school. George Mason Law is not responsible for incomplete or missing reports and will not contact applicants about incomplete or missing reports.

#### 3. Personal Statement

The application requires submission of a personal statement **not to exceed 500 words, double-spaced**. The thoughts and words of the personal statement must be uniquely those of the applicant. With the exception of basic proofreading, no other(s) may assist in the creation of the personal statement.

#### 4. Resume

The applicant must submit a resume. There is no page limit.

#### 5. Two Letters of Recommendation

Applicants must submit two letters of recommendation. George Mason Law strongly prefers that applicants use the LSAC Letter of Recommendation Service, following LSAC procedures. Any applicant who does not use the LSAC Letter of Recommendation Service must (a) have their recommendations sent directly to George Mason Law and (b) use George Mason Law's recommendation form, which can be found at:

Recommendations submitted directly to George Mason Law must be in a sealed envelope and bear the author's signature across the sealed envelope flap.

# Application for In-state Tuition (required only for applicants who believe they qualify for in-state tuition rates)

Applicants who believe they qualify for in-state tuition rates must complete and include the Application for Virginia In-State Tuition Rates with the application. See Section 23-7.4, *Code of Virginia*, and registrar.gmu.edu/domicile regarding eligibility.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTES ON RACE/ETHNICITY**

The U.S. Department of Education is requiring educational institutions to begin reporting data utilizing a two-part race and ethnicity question in response to increased diversity within the United States.

1. Ethnicity is based on the following categorization:

Hispanic or Latino: A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race. The term "Spanish origin" can be used in addition to "Hispanic or Latino."

#### 2. Race is based on the following five categorizations:

American Indian or Alaska Native: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America), and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment.

Asian: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Black or African American: A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa. Terms such as "Haitian" or "Negro" can be used in addition to "Black or African American."

Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

White: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

This data will be used only for informational purposes and will not be used to discriminate against or penalize any applicant, or to determine immigration status.

#### DIRECTIONS TO ARLINGTON CAMPUS

1. George Mason Law requires that international transcripts be submitted through the LSAC Credential Assembly Service. If an applicant has completed any postsecondary work outside the U.S. (including its territories) or Canada, the applicant must use the Credential Assembly Service for the evaluation of international transcripts. This service is included in the Credential Assembly Service registration fee. An international credential evaluation will be completed by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (AACRAO), which will be incorporated into your Credential Assembly Service report.

To use the Credential Assembly Service, log in to your online account and follow the instructions for registering for the service. Be sure to print out a Transcript Request Form for each institution and send it promptly to them. More time is usually required to receive international transcripts. Questions about the Credential Assembly Service can be directed to LSAC at 215-968-1001, or LSACINFO@LSAC.org.

**Note to all applicants:** The one exception to required use of the Credential Assembly Service is completion of international work through a study abroad, consortium, or exchange program sponsored by a U.S. or Canadian institution, where the work is clearly indicated as such on the home campus transcript.

2. If seeking F-1 immigration status, the international applicant must submit an International Student Certificate of Financial Responsibility (www.law.gmu.edu/admission/financial\_responsibility.pdf). Immigration document I-20 required for international students studying full time in the United States will not be issued until the student has completed the form (front and back) and returned it along with a copy of the identification page of the passport and supporting documents to:

It is strongly recommended that international applicants submit an application no later than **March 1, 2011,** in order to ensure the timely processing of immigration documentation.

#### **ACCEPTED APPLICANTS**

Applicants who have been accepted into George Mason Law will receive a letter setting forth the conditions that must be met to reserve a seat in the entering class. Such conditions include making a non-refundable seat deposit in the total sum of \$1,000 by established deadlines, providing an Intent Form and Honor Code Certification, and ensuring that, before matriculation, the George Mason Law receives official transcripts from each institution at which course work was taken.

#### By Car:

**FROM WASHINGTON, D.C.**—Cross over the Roosevelt Bridge; follow signs to the George Washington Parkway North. Once on the parkway, exit at *Spout Run (left exit)*. Cross over Route 29 (Lee Highway). Spout Run is now Kirkwood Road. Cross over Washington Boulevard. The Arlington Campus is on the right, at 3301 Fairfax Drive.


**FROM I-66 HEADING EAST**—Exit I-66 at *Glebe Road/Fairfax Drive* (exit 71). The exit ramp becomes Fairfax Drive. After traveling one mile on Fairfax Drive, you will see the FDIC building on the left. The Arlington Campus is next door.

FROM I-66 HEADING WEST—Exit I-66 at Glebe Road/Fairfax Drive (exit 71). Turn left onto Glebe Road and left again onto Washington Boulevard. Stay on Washington Boulevard until you pass the Giant Supermarket, then turn right onto Kirkwood Road. The Arlington Campus is on the right, at 3301 Fairfax Drive.

**FROM 1-395**—Exit I-395 at *Glebe Road North*. Continue on Glebe Road, passing Ballston Common Mall on the right. Cross over Wilson Boulevard, then turn right onto Fairfax Drive. After traveling one mile, you will see the FDIC building on the left. The Arlington Campus is next door.

#### By Metro:

Take the **Orange Line** to the Virginia Square/GMU station. Take the escalator to the street level. Fairfax Drive will be at your back as you exit the escalator. Turn to face Fairfax Drive. Across the street and to the right, you will see the FDIC building. The Arlington Campus is next door.
