-Indian English






Verb

Verb is word or phrase indicating:

- what somebody or something does,
- what state somebody or something is in,
- what is becoming of something or somebody.


Base Form

-S Form



I **study** everyday.
I **sing** everyday.

I **studied** yesterday.

I **sang** yesterday.

I have **studied** Chapter One before.

I have **sung** DoReMi before.

I am **studying** right now.

I am **singing** right now.

Ann **studies** regularly.

Ann **sings** regularly.

Past Tense/Past Participle Verbs: Regular and Irregular Verbs

★ When the past tense and past participle end in -ed or -d, the verb is regular.

★ When the past tense and past participle do not end in —ed or -d, the verb is irregular.

Regular verbs

Base Form

Past Tense

Past Participle

Past tense and past participle are end with -ed or -d.

clean use cleaned used

cleaned used

Irregular verbs

Base Form

Past Tense

Past Participle

1. Base form, past tense and past participle are the same.

read put read put read put

2. Past tense is the same as the past participle, but different from base form.

leave lay

left laid left laid

3. Base form, past tense and past participle are different.

do go did went done gone

Irregular Verbs

- 1. The sun (shined, shone).
- 2. The student (raised, rose) his hand in class.
- 3. Hot air (raises, rises).
- 4. She (set, sat) in a chair because she was tired.
- 5. I (set, sat) your dictionary on the table a few minutes ago.

Irregular Verbs

Transitive (followed by an object)	Intransitive (not followed by an object)
Lay, Laid, Laid I am laying the book on the desk.	Lie, Lay, Lain He is lying on his bed.
Raise, Raised, Raised The farmer raises vegetables.	Rise, Rose, Risen The sun rises in the east.
Set, Set, Set I will set the book on the desk.	Sit, Sat, Sat I sit in the front row.
Shine, Shined, Shined I shined my shoes.	Shine, Shone, Shone The sun shone through the window.

Irregular Verbs

- 1. The sun (shined, shone).
- 2. The student (raised) rose) his hand in class.
- 3. Hot air (raises rises).
- 4. She (set, sat) in a chair because she was tired.
- 5. I (set) sat) your dictionary on the table a few minutes ago.

Present Tense Verbs

Third person singular subjects

He/She/It Everyone Ann

knows has

does doesn't

is

We You They

know

have

do don't am

on't are

Examples:

As for the retirement income program, it have finally been established.

Does

Ann know the correct procedure for setting up the experiment?

Alan prepares program specification and logic diagrams. (Correct)

Common Mistake in Verbs Usage

★ Do not omit –ed endings on verbs

```
advised asked developed
fixed supposed to
concerned frightened used to
```

Examples:

fixed

1. Over the weekend, Ed fix his brother's skateboard and tuned up his mother's 1955 Thunderbird.

asked

2. Robin has ask me to go to Oregon with her.

Common Mistake In Verbs Usage

★ Do not omit needed verbs

Examples:

would

Do you know someone who be good for the job?

an

James is experienced analog circuit design engineer.

Spelling of -ing and -ed Forms

	Base Form	Present Participle	Past Tense	
Verbs that end in –e.	hope date	hop ing dat ing	hope d date d	
Verbs that end in a vowel and a consonant.	One-syl stop rain	llable verbs stopping raining	Stopped	vowel → 2 consonants vowels → 1 consonant
	listen	llable verbs listening controlling	listoriou	st syllable stressed → 1 consonant nd syllable stressed → 2 consonants
Verbs that end in -y	enj <mark>oy</mark> try	enjoy ing try ing		-y is preceded by a consonant: ED form: change -y to -i, add -ed.
Verbs that end in -ie	die tie	dying tying		NG form: change –ie to –y, dd –ing.
Verbs that end in two consonants		start <mark>ing</mark> d demanding	start <mark>ed</mark> g demand <mark>ed</mark>
