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Need help choosing a major? Visit the SCF Career Resource Center

Are you uncertain about your major? Statistics have shown that students with specific academic and career goals are more likely to stay focused and complete their degree. The Career Resource Center offers a four part system to help students stay focused on completing their degree.

Step 1: Career Assessments

Typefocus—Find careers that suit your personality.

Discover—Find careers that suit your values, interests, and abilities.

Step 2: Explore

Research the careers to enable you to make informed and educated choices about your major.

Step 3: Plan

Meet with a career advisor to discuss choosing the right major for intended career.

Step 4: Execute

Gain assistance finding transfer colleges or preparing for the job search.

- Submit a completed Outstanding Graduate Award application & all accompanying materials by the deadline: Friday, March 4th 2011.

The Outstanding graduate award recipient will be announced and finalists will be recognized at Spring Commencement on May 7, 2011. The Outstanding Graduate will be awarded a **monetary award of \$1,500** provided by The State College of Florida Foundation, Inc. The Outstanding Graduate Award is made possible by loyal and committed benefactors through The SCF Foundation, Inc. Applications will be available February 7th through March 4th.

Tips for Success at SCF

The Tips for Success workshop will expand upon seven strategies for success discussed in new student orientation. The student will come away with building blocks and resources for successful transition into college. The strategies will be covered in greater detail with specific tips on implementing the strategies. The workshop will also cover pitfalls to these strategies that can occur during the collegiate experience. The overall outcome will be to present the enrichment of the collegiate experience when proper strategies are implemented and resources are used and managed.

Transfer 101

Advisors will introduce the Capp degree audit and demonstrate access through SCFconnect as well as provide step by step instructions on how to interpret the audit's information for individual student use.

Creating an Educational Plan

Have you ever asked an advisor the following questions? What classes do I need for next semester? How many classes do I have left to finish my degree? Come to this workshop and we will teach you how to map out a plan of every class you need to finish your associate's degree. Do not miss this opportunity, since taking extra classes can cost you time and money!



How do I begin preparing for my Bachelor's Degree?



Start planning early:

- 1) Select a major for your Bachelor's degree within your first two semesters at SCF.
- 2) Set up an appointment with an SCF advisor to discuss your academic goals and develop a tentative plan.
- 3) Research specifics that might be required to enter your major at the University.
 - a) Visit www.facts.org to view common major pre-requisites
 - b) Visit your "prospective" university's web site and look under "academics." You should be able to find specifics related to your major. Pay special attention to required prerequisites, GPA requirements, test scores, and foreign language requirements.
- 4) Within one year of your planned SCF graduation, start the transferring process using the checklist below as a guide:
 - a) Apply to the university this can usually be done on the university's web site if you click on admissions
 - b) Pay any application fees
 - c) Order official transcripts from SCF this can be done online at http://www.scf.edu/StudentServices/EducationalRecords/default.asp
 - d) Look into immunization requirements
 - e) Research and complete any additional transfer steps that the university may require
- 5) In your second to last semester at SCF, run a CAPP degree audit through SCFConnect.
- 6) Apply for graduation at the Educational Records office by the posted deadline.
