Worksheet for Funeral Planning

Planning a memorial can be an incredibly difficult task. When you are grieving, sorting out the details of your loved one's life can be hard to do properly. Use this worksheet, working with other family members, to collect your thoughts and plan a successful celebration of your loved one's life.

This worksheet is intended to assist you in planning for the deceased's memorial, be it a service, gathering, or private burial. This form can assist you in collecting your thoughts as a group, or you may pass this form out to family and friends for them to complete individually.

About the Deceased

A memorial or service should be just that, a way to commemorate and celebrate the importance of a loved one's life and accomplishments. The following will assist you in thinking through the details of this important event.

Who They Were

Talk about who the deceased was with his or her loved ones, and what he or she meant to them. All of these fond memories can be of benefit as you plan announcements, epitaphs, speeches, and other elements of the service.

Assembling Memories

Memories about the deceased and their interests are another great starting point for choosing a focus for his or her memorial. Planning a service, creating a gravestone marker, and choosing topics to include during a wake or reception are all enriched by carefully gathering these memories.

Write a brief paragraph describing the importance of the deceased in your life. Include any favorite or cherished memory that you may have of the deceased person:

Do you have favorite pictures of the deceased? If so, could they be reproduced for the memorial?

List some music they liked (songs, albums, genres, etc.):

Did they have a favorite saying, poem or piece of wisdom that they shared with you? If so, what was it?

List any favorite meals, flowers, food, or scents of the deceased:

Did they have a favorite place to visit or go?

Did the deceased have any favorite charities, causes, or beliefs to which they would want donations made in their name?

Friends and Family

While your loved one no doubt had many friends and relatives, sometimes it is necessary to choose attendees depending on the size of the gathering or event. If it is, look carefully at the important people in your loved ones life to ensure that the people they would want to be there for them are at this final celebration of their life. Who were the people who were the closest or most important to the deceased?

What were the most important groups or organizations that your loved one was active in (examples: church, school, civic, or government groups, etc)?

Do you know of anyone who was close to the deceased who would be willing to help host or assist with the organizing of the memorial?
