Internet (basic)

You must stay with your homestay for at least two months. If you decide to move, we recommend you do so between terms. If you need a receipt for your homestay fees, ask your family for one.

CHANGING YOUR HOMESTAY FAMILY

If you have problems with your homestay and would like to leave, please contact your Housing Coordinator to talk about the issues and what options are available.



You must pay \$100 fee to make changes to your Homestay placement.



You must notify your homestay on the first day of the month that you will be leaving in 30 days. Your last month's fee will cover your last 30 days. If you do not give 30 days notice from the first day of the month, your last month's fee will not be refunded to you.



If you are experiencing a health or safety issue in your homestay, you will be moved immediately at no cost.

EXPECTATIONS

Talk to your host family about your needs and their expectations when you arrive.

Internet Access

Meals

Internet services in Canada can be expensive for your homestay family, so be respectful of the amount of time you spend on it.



Be prepared to share the cost of Internet overage fees if Internet usage exceeds your host's limit.

Your homestay may disconnect their Internet if it is continually overused. It should be used in moderation. It is not intended for entertainment purposes such as downloading movies and music or playing video games.



NC has computer labs with free wireless Internet that are available for student use. The labs are open everyday.



Most Canadian families have cats or dogs as pets that stay in the home. Pets are treated as part of the family and are clean, friendly companions.

If you do not like pets in your home, please talk to your Housing Coordinator about solutions.

Smoking



Host families do not allow smoking in their homes. They may allow you to smoke outside, but ask first. You MUST follow their wishes.

If you do not follow their wishes, you may be asked to leave your homestay and will not receive your last month's fee in return.



Canadian families do not smoke inside their homes because they have an insurance rate based on no smoking indoors, or they may have family living in the home with health problems that are made worse by smoking.

7AM – 9AM

Breakfast: toasted bread or cereal.

11AM – 1PM

Lunch: usually sandwiches with meat or cheese fillings or left over food from dinner the evening before.

5PM – 7PM

Dinner: an evening meal prepared by and shared with your homestay family. This time should be used to talk with your host family about your day. If you will not be home for dinner, let your homestay family know.

You may have to prepare breakfast and lunch for yourself, but your homestay will show you how.



If you are still hungry after meals, talk to your host family about other foods you like or need to eat. Ask your host family where you can buy these foods.

Teach your host family about your culture by cooking them a traditional meal in their home.

Home Phone

Your homestay will allow you to make local calls on their home phone, but you will have to use a calling card for long distance calls. Check with your host family before making or receiving calls late in the evening.





Your cell phone may work with a Canadian SIM card. If so, you can buy one. If your phone does not work, you will have to buy a new phone.

Do not buy a calling card without first establishing a phone plan. Most plans are paid monthly.





These companies are recommended by our international students for having flexible plans and no long contracts.

Personal Care

In Canadian culture, it is important to use deodorant, brush your teeth and shower every day.



In the bathroom...

- · Showers should not take longer than 10 minutes
- Toilet paper gets flushed down the toilet, but sanitary napkins are wrapped and thrown in the garbage

Household Work

While you stay in homestay, you are part of their family. Both males and females are expected to share chores around the home. This could include washing dishes, vacuuming or helping to prepare a meal.



Washing clothes...

- Get your homestay family to show you how to use their washing machine and dryer
- Only wash your clothes when you have a full load of laundry and after 7pm or on weekends when it costs less energy



In the home...

• Turn off lights and electronics when you are not using them, as electricity in Canada is expensive during peak hours.





Come prepared for Canadian winters. You will need a heavy coat, scarf, gloves, hat and winter boots.

Money

Homestay fees:

- First and last month's fees should be paid when you arrive
- All other fees should be paid on the first day of the month

Banking:

- Many banks have student accounts with low fees
- If you need help ask your host family or an IDSA to help you

Every day:

 Your host family will pay for your meals while you stay with them

Special Occasions

- You may have to pay for special food that your host family would not regularly eat
- If you go on a special trip with your hosts, you should be prepared to pay for yourself If your hosts pay for anything for you, show your appreciation




Do not carry a lot of cash. Debit/bank cards are much safer and widely accepted.

Transportation



UPass (Universal Bus Pass): A bus pass sticker that is placed on your student card is included in your tuition fees. You can get your sticker from NCSAC (Niagara College Student Administrative Council). If you lose your sticker, you must pay for a new one. Details about the UPass sticker and bus schedules to NC can be found at ncsac.ca.







Cycling: If you are under the age of 18, it is against the law to ride a bicycle without wearing a helmet. If you are over the age of 18, you are encouraged to wear a bicycle helmet but are not required to by law.



Driving: If you are going to drive in Ontario, you need to get an Ontario Driving License. For more information, visit:

Guests

You must ask your homestay family before inviting any guests into their home, even just for a few hours. If you have family or friends who wish to visit you, they should stay in a hotel. If your homestay has the space to accommodate them, they need to pay \$30 per day per person.

Your boyfriend or girlfriend will typically not be allowed to stay overnight. Friends should also be not be expecting to receive meals at your homestay on a regular basis. Keep the lines of communication open with your hosts to know their guidelines.



Conflict & Resolution

Hosts in Canada are diverse and multicultural and not always a "traditional family" as defined by your culture. Homestay families may be single parents, young professionals, retired, grandparents, or married for example.

It is not uncommon to have conflict, which typically stems from misunderstanding. Talk through the problem to clear up the misunderstanding.

Examples of conflicts and their resolutions.



Homestay families are not expected to drive students

Be aware of one another's schedules

Check the bus schedules before staying out late

If you need a ride, ask your host family politely and provide ample notice

STUDENT DISLIKES THE FOOD

Be honest with each other

Go grocery shopping together

Show your host family what you like (recipes etc.)

Discuss foods and find options of similar price

Cook together and learn from one another

STUDENT BREAKS AN ITEM


If it's under \$50 and the family doesn't ask for a replacement, consider giving them a small gift to show your appreciation.

Up to \$100, expect to replace it at your own cost

If it's between \$100-\$500, ask if the family will share the cost

If it's over \$500, please notify the Housing Coordinator for mediation and a fair resolution

SAFEGUARDS



Hosts and students should never borrow money from one another

If discussing religious or political views be respectful of all opinions Uncomfortable situations for students or hosts should be reported immediately



If you cannot resolve an issue, or need help to speak with your host or student, talk to the Housing Coordinator at the International Office in person, by email or by phone.



Health Insurance

All Niagara College students are covered by health insurance through StudentGuard (www.guard.me) At the beginning of each term, students will be issued a new health number that will be emailed to their NC student email.

Students can go to any doctor/clinic, however, they may be asked to pay for the services. Receipts for prescriptions/clinic visit claims can be submitted online at www.guard.me

For major medical emergencies such as broken bones or serious accidents, dial 911 or go to the hospital to receive immediate medical care.

Helping International Students

For homestay families, new communication styles and cultures can be a challenge to get used to. It is very important to keep your sense of humour and persevere through any problems that might arise.



Things you can do to help each other:

- Students can often understand written English better than spoken English. Take the time to write things down to avoid confusion
- Draw pictures or use visual examples
- Ask the student if they understand and get them to repeat what they hear to clarify
- Don't assume that when someone smiles or laughs that they understand you
- Be careful with your tone of voice. It can say a great deal. Avoid sarcasm
- Be careful with anecdotes that cannot literally be interpreted or are culturally understood

Ideas for helping ESL students practice English:

- Read the newspaper together
- Encourage your student to keep a list of words or phrases they hear during the day to talk about in the evening
- Have students place orders over the phone for food, tickets etc. Avoid doing the talking for them. Instead, play a supportive and encouraging role.
- Label items in the home to help them learn the names
- Take them shopping to learn the names of items in the store
- Offer to help your student with their homework, but don't do it for them.

Landing Pad




NEED SOMEWHERE To Land? Check!

Looking for a way to reduce the stress of finding a place to live? Use the Landing Pad!

Room and 2 meals per day for 1 month after your arrival, while you...

- Have friends/family support you in adapting to Canada
- Look for living space and roommates
- Discover Niagara College and the local community
- Learn about Ontario law and life



Requirements

- Pay \$700 on arrival for 1 month stay
- Prepare your own breakfast from provided food; share dinner with your Landing Pad host.
- Provide your own lunch while you are at the College or looking for housing.
- Landing Pad is available to students 18 years of age or older
- No refunds... it's a lot less than an extended hotel stay or a bad rental experience!



On-Campus Living

If you prefer to experience college life on campus, consider living in residence. The Niagara College residence is a modern, clean and comfortable building that can house up to 230 students. Each apartment is fully furnished with a kitchen table, chairs, refrigerator, microwave and private bathroom. You will have your own furnished bedroom and share cooking and bathroom facilities in a private two room apartment. If you are interested in staying in the residence, apply early, as space is limited.

Off-Campus Housing



Many great accommodations are within a very short walk of the campus. Which brings us back to the advantage of learning in Niagara: affordable, safe, quality housing within 30 minutes of the college - all part of our Niagara charm.

Landlords and tenants of most rental units are covered by the rules in the Landlord Tenant Act of Ontario. A rental unit can be an apartment, a house, or a room in a rooming or boarding house.

The Act does not apply if the tenant must share a kitchen or bathroom with the landlord.
