Acuities: Hearing is Believing!

CCVIP Early Intervention Pearl

Listening to a patient read distance and near acuities provides valuable insight into their ability to read everyday material such as the morning newspaper. Are they "sailing through" the eye chart with no pauses or breaks, or are they "bogging down" at a certain level of detail?

When a patient who is dealing with a visual impairment starts slowing and/or missing letters on the chart, they may be reaching their threshold acuity. For a fully sighted patient, this threshold may be 20/15, but for a visually impaired patient, this threshold may be 20/50 or 20/60.

Reading print requires the following threshold visual acuities:

- Fine Print (medicine bottles, label directions, phone numbers, etc.) requires 20/30 - 20/40
- Small Print (newspaper & magazine text) requires 20/50 -20/60

• Large Print (Books, Reader's Digest, Guidepost, Bible) requires 20/70 - 20/100

If the patient is best-corrected to 20/60, understand that they will not be able to read newsprint with good speed or accuracy. Confirm this by using a standard newspaper or magazine and listen to the patient read. If reading is slow and labored, then provide "early intervention" options (i.e. increased lighting, stronger hand or stand magnifiers) to help improve the reading ability. Without this early intervention, the patient will slowly lose interest in reading due to eye fatigue, slower reading speed and overall frustration. They may also become more dependent on others to provide reading assistance.

Take-Home Message: When a patient is not correctable to 20/20, listen to them read your eye charts, newspaper or other reading material to determine their threshold. Once you know their threshold, you may begin offering options and provide the continued care they need.

Doctors can now enroll staff as AOA associate members

All non-ODs working for AOA member ODs may now become AOA associate members thanks to a motion approved by the AOA House of Delegates at Optometry's Meeting® in San Diego in June, 2013.

This change ensures access to all traditional Paraoptometric Section member benefits and services at no membership cost to the paraoptometric, and no added membership cost to the AOA-member optometrist. It also opens the door to expanded education and training for approximately 75,000 optometric staff members across the country. Among the many benefits are:


An Invitation from National Board of Examiners in Optometry (NBEO)

You have probably all received an invitation to become "Board Certified" by NBEO.

The Colorado State Optometry Board's policy on when a Doctor of Optometry may advertise or refer to themselves as "Board Certified" states: "the certifying organization must be approved by both the federal government's Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) AND the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA)." While the American Board of Optometry (ABO) meets both these requirements, NBEO currently meets neither. An OD may call themselves "Board Certified" if the certifying entity meets the criteria set by the State Board of Optometry. Be sure to check on this critical detail when making your decision to become and utilize "Board Certified."

Dr. Seidel, 74, passed away on January 12, 2014. He is survived by his wife Judy; children Mark (Carrie) and Jill; grandchildren Gage, Garrett, Braxton, Brylie, Dakota; and brother Joseph. 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How to Use OE TRACKER

As a licensed optometrist, you have been assigned a unique identifier number called an *OE TRACKER* number to help you track the continuing education credits you have completed for license renewal purposes. The Colorado State Board of Optometry also uses *OE TRACKER* for auditing and license renewal purposes, so you will want to make sure you keep your account updated. Here is a step-by-step process on how to find your *OE TRACKER* number and how to use *OE TRACKER*.

- 1. To find out what your OE TRACKER number is:
 - a. Call ARBO at 1-866-869-6852 or 704-970-2710.
 - b. Email ARBO at arbo@arbo.org with your name, license number and birthdate.
 - c. Go to arbo.org and click on the "OE TRACKER Number Lookup" tab under "OE TRACKER."
- 2. Once you know your *OE TRACKER* number, set up a username and password to access your account by:
 - a. Calling ARBO and asking them to set them up.
- 3. Log into your OE TRACKER account to:
 - a. View and update your personal account information including mailing address, phone number, e-mail address and birthdate.
 - b. Check to make sure the license numbers in all the states you are licensed in are correct.
 - c. Search for COPE-Accredited Courses and Events.
 - d. View your Continuing Education Course Transcript to see what CE hours have been posted into your account.
 - i. Check your CE hours to make sure that all are listed in your account.
 - 1. Everyone can see the course date and number of CE hours earned.
 - 2. For a complete transcript and the ability to print CE certificates, simply pay the \$20 *OE TRACKER* annual subscription fee online.
 - ii. If you see that there are CE credits missing from your account, you can fax (704-970-2720) or e-mail (arbo@arbo.org) your CE attendance certificates and the hours will be added into your account.
- 4. Make sure you have an *OE TRACKER* card with your number and barcode. This card may be used to track your attendance at upcoming CE events. You can request an *OE TRACKER* card by:
 - a. Calling ARBO and asking for one to be sent to you.
 - b. Sending an email to arbo@arbo.org with your name, *OE TRACKER* number and mailing address.
 - c. Going to arbo.org and clicking on the "Request an *OE TRACKER* Card" tab under "*OE TRACKER*."

How to apply

In the past, HEHP grants were linked to federally-defined Healthy People 2020 objectives. However, in 2014 these grants will tackle undiagnosed children's vision disorders. They will focus directly on the AOA's proposed children's vision objective:

"Increase the proportion of children aged 18 years and under who have received an eye exam by an optometrist over the next 12 months."

To apply:

- Keep the objective above in mind for your proposed project.
- Submit a grant application online by Feb. 28, 2014.
- Your application must be accompanied by a letter of support from your state association's executive director.

Each grant is worth up to \$5,000. However, if your project reaches multiple states, it may be considered for a larger grant.

Over the past 10 years, HEHP sponsors have contributed \$1,290,500 for more than 350

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
