

Fall Community Garage Sale Sept 25th – 27th

This event is a community-wide collection of individual garage sales held twice a year – spring and fall. Any resident wanting to participate **must** obtain a City of Fort Worth garage sale permit 3 days in advance. There is **no charge**. General information about garage sale permits can be found on the city's website.

You can call 817-392-2222 and give them your address or you can apply online. When online, scroll down and under the *Development* title, click on *Apply for Permit*, accept the terms for using the online application, then click on *Continue Application* to display the *Garage Sale Permit* application.

PID 6 takes care of advertisements - so there is no cost to you. Typically, an ad will appear in the Fort Worth *Star-Telegram* one week prior to the event, and another on the day of the event. The home page on this site will have an advance announcement.

By planning your garage sale to coincide with the PID 6 dates, you can take advantage of the no-cost advertising and benefit from the potentially higher volume of buyers. The City of Fort Worth has an ordinance that prohibits PID 6 from publicizing events onsite so we are unable to have portable signs to advertise this event in the PID 6 area.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH After School Snacks

Mango Jigglers

Ingredients

• 1½ cups 100 percent tropical mango juice blend, divided (you can also use mango juice or orange juice)



1 to 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Directions

1. In a blender, blend together 1 cup of juice and the frozen fruit until smooth. Pour into a small saucepan and bring to a boil. Stir occasionally to break up any frothy bubbles.

2. Meanwhile, place the remaining 1/2 cup juice in a large bowl. Sprinkle the gelatin over the juice and let stand 1 minute. Add the hot juice mixture and stir, or gently whisk, until the gelatin completely dissolves, about 5 minutes. Stir in the sugar.

3. Pour the mixture into an 8 x 8-inch pan or dish. Refrigerate until firm, about 3 hours. Cut into 24, 2 x 1 1/3-inch rectangles (use an offset spatula to remove them from the pan).

After School Gorp (Trail Mix)


Ingredients

- 4 cups crispy cereal, such as Rice Chex
- 1 cup salted peanuts or other nuts, or pretzel bits
- 1 cup raisins, Craisins or other dried fruit
- ¹/₂ cup M & Ms, Goobers or chocolate chips

Directions

 Put all ingredients in a zip-lock bag and shake!
 To manage portions, place in individual snack bags, with 1/2-cup gorp in each bag.





Finding out where you come from, who your ancestors have been or what they did starts from a very personal location; yourself. Researching your family tree is not as hard as you imagine. It simply requires some time along with energy. In order to dig up the history of your dynasty accurate to build a family tree, you need to discover a little bit about your descendants.

Finding out the past concerning your lineage at this awfully fundamental level is rather painless. You will require to chat to as many of your elder family members as you can. Find the complete names of your grandparents, your great grand parents, your great, great grand parents and so on. There will come a point when someone does not recall the maiden name of their grandparents.

Also vital with this information is maiden names along with the names of their kids. You aim to construct a family tree as distant back as you can. The names of their children can be vital because you will on occasion stumble on documents from something similar to a census and this will include the names of several kids living within their households. By learning the names of your ancestor's children, you will be capable to confirm if the person you are seeking up is the precise individual within your family.

Aim to also get as many dates or places where they might have lived as you can. Along with information that is spread by word of mouth, look for written documents or old pictures. Credentials like birth or mortality certificates can be exceptionally valuable in researching your dynasty history. Pictures are also useful in a less obvious way. Occasionally pictures will enclose a date on the flipside of them or else a municipality or place.

There could also be clues within the pictures themselves. If you locate a picture of your ancestor on a expedition to look at the Statue of Liberty with a date on the back that claims 1935, you then possess a point of orientation to go back to when trying to guess out what year they entered the United States. Once you have made your best at researching your ancestors history through word of mouth, you will after that have to move on to extra resources of information.

Thanks to the world-wide-web there are a group of different ways to search for your ancestors history. Various people sign up for internet sites. Several are gratis but, the easier ones to operate cost a tiny payment. With these websites you get admission to a quantity of supplementary valuable documents that are extremely hard to obtain otherwise. Family tree web pages present censuses from past years, death, birth in addition to matrimony certificates, plus additional public records like military records or even felony records.

There are also quite a few free web-sites you are able to make use of to get hold of your family history. But given that they are gratis, these internet pages can get kind of tricky. If you genuinely want to dig up precise information and build up an extensive family tree, it is best to go with a site that will charge a tiny amount now but, the outcome you receive will go on through the lifetimes of your children's children. High Weeds, Grass, and Other Material

It shall be unlawful for any person owning or occupying any real property within the corporate limits of the city to permit weeds, brush, or any other combustible material to grow to a height greater than 12" upon any such real property within 150' of any property line, and to a point 15' outside such property line that is adjacent to a street, alley, and rightof-way. All vegetation, not regularly cultivated and which exceeds 12" in height shall be presumed to be a fire hazard and constitute a nuisance.

Trash, Debris, and Objectionable Matter

It shall be the lawful duty of any person owning or occupying real property within the corporate limits of the city to keep such property free from rubbish, and other objectionable, unsightly, or unsanitary matter. It shall further be the lawful duty of any person owning any building, establishment, or real property to keep such improvements or property free from filth, carrion, or other impure or unwholesome matter.

Trees, Shrubs, and Plants

Foliage of hedges, trees, and shrubs in public of right-of-ways shall be maintained by the property owner adjacent to the right-of-way, such that the minimum overhang above a sidewalk shall be 7'. The minimum overhang above a street, alley, or a public driveway shall be 14'.

Trees, shrubs, and plants shall not obstruct the access to or from any door or window of any structure which is used, or is required by city codes and ordinances to be used for ingress or egress.

Trees, shrubs, or plants that are dead and which are hazardous to persons or property shall be removed.

Fences

All fences shall be maintained reasonably plumed and structurally sound. Each structural and decorative member of a fence shall be free of deterioration and be compatible in size, material, and appearance with the remainder of the fence.

A fence that has deteriorated to a condition that is likely to fall shall be repaired or replaced. Fences shall not be externally braced in lieu of replacing or repairing posts, columns, or other structural members.

Any fence repair, alteration or modification must comply with the City of Fort Worth Code of Ordinances.

Parking

Parking shall be allowed only on a paved concrete surface. Do not block sidewalks.

Junked/Inoperative Vehicle

Any vehicle that is inoperative, and does not have either a current license plate or a valid motor vehicle safety inspection, or that is, dismantled, partially dismantled, or discarded, or that remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than 45 days, is deemed to be a junked or inoperative vehicle.

Back to School

Going back to school is an exciting time for children as they look forward to entering the next grade level, seeing their friends and meeting new people. Yet it can also be a time of unforeseen dangers. By teaching children basic back to school rules and tips regarding their safety, they enter this exciting time with the knowledge and skills they need to stay safe while enjoying this special time and throughout the school year.

Walking to School - Tips for Parents

- If you feel your child does not have adequate pedestrian skills to walk to school, either walk with them until you are confident in their ability or make alternate arrangements for getting them to and from school.
- If a child is young or entering a new school, walk the child to school until you are comfortable with them walking by themselves.
- Practice the route with your child if they are young or new to the school.

Back to School Safety Tips

Make sure the route your child takes is safe and has a crossing guard at intersections.

Walking to School - Tips for Children

- Never take a short cut through a wooded area. Stay on the route you practiced with your parents.
- Walk to school with a friend or a group of friends.
- Wearing light or brightly colored clothing increases your visibility to drivers.

Riding a Bike to School

- Always wear an approved helmet when riding a bicycle.
- Wearing clothing that is bright and colorful makes it easier for drivers to see you.
- Learn hand signals and use them.
- Ride a bike on the right hand wide of the road traveling in the same direction as the traffic.
- Always stop for stop signs and follow the rules of traffic lights.
- Learn and follow the rules of the road.
- Do not listen to your iPod mp3 player or other music device. Always pay attention to the traffic.

Back Pack Safety

Backpacks have become a staple of back to school accessories. Yet these useful bags are potentially

harmful if not used correctly causing possible shoulder or neck injuries, back pain and muscle and joint strains. The following tips on backpack safety help reduce the chance of injury:


- When a backpack is fully loaded, it should not weigh more than 15 to 20 percent of the child's body weight.
- Never carry a backpack over one shoulder using only one strap. Always wear a backpack using both shoulder straps.
- If a backpack has a waist strap, use it.
- Choose a backpack with wide straps. The best choice is a backpack with a padded back and padded straps
- Use all of the compartments in the backpack to distribute the weight of the contents more evenly.

More Back to School Safety Tips

The following are a few general back to school safety tips:

- Talk to your children and reinforce the rules of stranger danger.
- Make sure not to pack foods for lunch or snacks that spoil quickly.
- Talk to your child about bullies and bullying. Explain to them what to do if a situation arises.

We are always on the lookout for volunteers!! Here is a list of places where you can volunteer your time and serve your community.

<u>Social Committee</u> (Activities & Events) - This committee organizes, promotes and produces a few events throughout the year (Easter Eggstravaganza, July 4th Celebration/ Parade, Turkey Trot, and others).

<u>Communications Committee</u> - Gather information and/or write articles for the monthly newsletter as well as communicating through social media and the Park Glen website.

<u>Hospitality Committee</u> - Greet and welcome each new homeowner to our neighborhood, delivering a welcome gift.

<u>Service Committee</u> - The vision is to build a network of volunteer neighbors who will assist other neighbors as the need arises. For example, an elderly couple who is unable to get their yard cleaned up one week and need some help, we would like to be able to call some folks to help get that yard done for them.

<u>Development Committee</u> - This committee monitors plans and projects and works with local government to exert influence over improvements, infrastructure, and development of our area.

<u>Code Blue: Citizens on Patrol</u> - Volunteers act as additional sets of ears and eyes for the police. Requires brief training at the police academy.

<u>Crime Watch Block Captains</u> - Coordinate and mobilize your neighbors to look out for crime and keep watch for each other. Requires training from the Fort Worth Police.

<u>Architectural Control Committee</u> - This committee will meet biweekly to review requests from homeowners for home improvements in accordance with the requirements of the deed restrictions. This group helps protect our investments in our property.

<u>Village Advisors</u> - These are folks who are willing to be a point of contact for homeowners in their particular neighborhood to help solve any issues or concerns that may come up. Park Glen has 13 different villages and our goal is to get a Village Advisor for each village.


