

Register in the Parish In order that we may better serve you, please register in the parish. This way you are known to us when requesting the services of the church. Registration forms are available in the gathering space of the church or in the gift shon

Sacrament of Baptism Baptisms for infants and children up to 7 years of age are celebrated on Sundays during Mass or on the 1st & 3rd Sundays at 1:45pm. Parents should attend the baptism class on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Church and register in the parish.

Sacrament of Matrimony At least one party must be a registered, participating member of the parish for at least 4 months. A 6 month minimum time period is needed to complete the marriage preparation requirements. The first step is for both parties to attend the marriage preparation class on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in Room 1 of the Church. If either party was married before, he or she is to make an appointment to speak with a priest prior to attending the class.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick Call the parish office at any time if you need to receive the anointing of the sick. In case of hospitalization, let the hospital staff know that you would like to have one of the Catholic priest chaplains see you.

Holy Communion to the Sick If you are at home, please call Tom & Patty (285-5573) and an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will visit you. In case of hospitalization, inform the admissions department that you are a Catholic and would like to receive Communion.

Mass Intentions Mass requests are scheduled through the parish office during office hours. If a specific date is desired, please schedule as far in advance as possible.

Funerals In the event of a death of a loved one, please contact the Funeral Ministry at 403-8416 BEFORE making arrangements with any of the professional services. Pre-planning is available.

Pastor's Note

Dear Parishioners,

I cannot let this weekend go by without acknowledging all the terrific volunteers, planners, participants, and creators of our Boo Bash Festival this year. We can say without a

doubt, that all who participated have contributed to the good of the parish in an immeasurable way. This was a wonderful community builder and our parish is the better for it. The Committee members worked long and tirelessly to plan the Festival and make it a reality. I also



want to thank those who sold and purchased the raffle tickets and those who helped to sponsor the event. Although the name of the top prize winner is not available yet, we will print all winners in next week's bulletin.

Next month, we will be celebrating the commemoration of all the faithful departed, All Souls Day. This feast day is rooted in the ancient Christian Tradition of the 2nd century, but did not become a universal tradition until the 13th century. For Christians, November is the month in which to celebrate All Souls. Our special tradition at SEAS is to include all those whose names have been submitted on the All Souls Envelopes in a novena of masses. We also continue to pray that they might be embraced in the presence of God. Many of you have written the names of loved ones who have gone before us on these envelopes. Writing the names of the deceased comes from an ancient tradition called necrology ("List of the Dead.") The list was kept in monasteries and was the way in which the dead were remembered.

From the beginning, the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead.

This November, think about what you can do for the poor that are served by our outreach program (almsgiving). Perhaps you can pick up pair of socks or



Treasure from our Tradition

Although the hours of daylight are rapidly dwindling, many people would say that these October days bring the year's most splendid weather.

Americans are riders and joggers, not strollers, and so the pleasures of the season are often lost on us. This is not the case with many Jewish people, who observe an ancient rule in walking to synagogue on the Sabbath. On city streets and suburban sidewalks in many cities, we may notice around sunset the nicely



dressed families walking and chatting on Friday afternoon. After a short prayer at dusk, the families stroll home again for a relaxing and festive meal. They return to synagogue in the morning, and then spend an afternoon in family leisure until three stars appear in the night sky and Sabbath ends.

Catholics, on the other hand, pile into the car and drive even a short distance to Mass; some even divide the family to participate at different hours. For Jews, the leisurely walk marks a dividing line between hectic life commitments and a day of abundant joy and enrichment. Before we became an automobile culture, Catholics embraced a similar pace, and in most places walked to church. These lovely days of fall invite us to tap into an old and life-giving tradition. If you live within a mile of your church, walk next week. If you must drive, park at a good distance and walk the rest of the way. Talk about your life, greet strangers, notice the crunch of leaves under your shoes. You may be surprised at how different Sunday Mass feels when it is framed by leisure!

Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

If we want to know what Jesus' parable is about in today's gospel, it seems that we don't need to work too hard because Saint Luke tells us right at the beginning: "Jesus told his disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart." This parable has often been used to bring comfort to us about our prayer life. But could there be a more challenging message for those who take stewardship seriously? Widows were the poorest and most vulnerable of people in Jesus' time. Oppressive legal and economic structures were the norm. Could it be that we are also encouraged to pray persistently for the poor, the weak and the vulnerable as we hear their cry for justice? And that we must not lose heart that we can effect change in their lives?

The Steward's Harvest

October is traditionally the harvest month for those of us who live in the Northern Hemisphere. This year, farmers across the great American plains have seen crops stunted by drought and intemperate heat. Yet, October brings again the bright yellows and oranges of

falling leaves and vine-ripened pumpkins and the invigorating crispness of autumn air.

In October, we cannot fail to note the dying of things. The grasses grow dormant; the flowers fade and then yield to frost, the once verdant leaves fall and decay. This year of drought, many U.S. farmers have plowed under dried up corn husks that have yielded no fruit. October brings with it the knowledge that the cycles are ever with us, and that we, too, are part of this cycle of birth, death, and rebirth.

For many, it's a challenging lesson. We sometimes turn away from all that this season tells us about our own mortality. But the Christian steward knows that stewardship is steeped in the season of harvest.

It's not surprising that the Hebrew Scriptures are filled with harvest imagery. There is a time for everything, the writer of Ecclesiastes tell us, and a season for every activity under heaven . . . a time to plant and a time to uproot. From our ancestor's world, embedded in agrarian culture, we've moved to a fastpaced environment where we sometimes ignore the cycles of life, or fail to learn from their implications.

Jesus, the offspring of a carpenter and the friend of fishermen, was also deeply attuned to the rhythm of the fields. He observed the seed that fell on rocky soil and the seed that fell on fertile land. He told us the hard truth that unless a grain of wheat dies, it remains but a single grain.

It's good, no matter how old we are, to yield to the lessons of this passing season. How do we approach the harvest? Have we prepared our soil well? What will be harvested from our lives? Where are our first fruits going? Are we comfortable acknowledging that the summers of our lives lead inevitably to their autumns, that all of this is God's plan, that faith tells us another spring is promised somewhere in our future? October tells us what the heart knows: the harvest and the steward are inexorably linked.

Hearing the Word of God

When the Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself is speaking to his people and Christ, present in his own word, is proclaiming the Gospel. (GIRM, n.29) These words from the General Instruction of the Roman Missal set before us a profound truth that we need to ponder and make our own.

The words of Sacred Scripture are unlike any other texts we will ever hear, for they not only give us information, they are the vehicle God uses to reveal himself to us, the means by which we come to know the depth of God's love for us and the responsibilities entailed by being



Christ's followers, members of his Body. What is more, this Word of God proclaimed in the liturgy possesses a special sacramental power to bring about in us what it proclaims. The Word of God proclaimed at Mass is 'efficacious' that is, it not only tells us of God and God's will for us, it also helps us to put that will of God into practice in our own lives.

How, then, do we respond to this wonderful gift of God's Word? We respond in word and song, in posture and gesture, in silent meditation and, most important of all, by listening attentively to that Word as it is proclaimed. Following each reading we express our gratitude for this gift with the words 'Thanks be to God' or, in the case of the Gospel, 'Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ,' and it is appropriate that a brief period of silence be observed to allow for personal reflection. Following the first

reading we sing the Responsorial Psalm, a meditation on God's word through the inspired words of one of the psalms from the psalter, the Bible's prayer book.

The Gospel is the highpoint of the Liturgy of the Word. The readings from the Old Testament tell us of God's promises and his preparation of his people for the coming of his Son; the epistles and other pre-Gospel New Testament readings offer the reflections of St. Paul and other contemporaries of the Lord on the life and message of Christ; in the Acts of the Apostles we have a history of the early Church. We believe that all Scripture, the Old and New Testaments, is inspired by the Holy Spirit, but the Church has always given special honor to the Gospel because in the Gospel we have not simply the preparation for and prefiguring of Christ, nor reflections on his message, but the words and deeds of Christ himself.

The proclamation of the Gospel is surrounded with marks of respect and honor: the Gospel is read by an ordained minister, the deacon, or, when no deacon is present, by a priest; the Book of the Gospels is carried aloft with honor in the entrance procession and placed on the altar until the Gospel reading to show the unity of Scripture and Eucharist, of the table of the Word and the table of the Christ's body and blood; just before the Gospel is read the Gospel book is carried in procession to the ambo to the accompaniment of an acclamation sung by the people; it may be incensed before the reading and is kissed at its conclusion; finally, all stand as the Gospel is proclaimed. Through this posture and through the honor paid to the book containing the Gospel, the Church pays homage to Christ who is present in his Word and who proclaims his Gospel.

What then must we do to properly receive the Word of God proclaimed at Mass? The General Instruction tells us that all must listen with reverence to the readings from God's word (GIRM, no. 29) and it provides that those who read the Scriptures must be truly suited to perform this function and should receive careful preparation, so that the faithful by listening to the readings from the sacred texts may develop in their hearts a warm and living love for Sacred Scripture. (GIRM, no. 101)

The key word in all of this is listening. We are called to listen attentively as the reader, deacon or priest proclaims God's Word. Unless one is unable to hear, one should not be reading along with a text from a missal or missalette. Rather, taking our cue from the General Instruction itself, we should listen as we would if Christ himself were standing at the ambo, for in fact it is God who speaks when the Scriptures are proclaimed. Carefully following along with the printed word can cause us to miss the gentle voice of the Holy Spirit, the message that the Spirit may have for us in one of the passages because we are anxious to 'keep up,' to move along with the reader.


Perhaps the best way to understand the readings at Mass and our response to them is offered by Pope John Paul II in his Instruction *Dies Domini*. He encourages those who take part in the Eucharist, priest, ministers and faithful ... to prepare

the Sunday liturgy, reflecting beforehand upon the Word of God which will be proclaimed and adds that if we do not, it is difficult for the liturgical proclamation of the Word of God alone to produce the fruit we might expect. (n. 40) In this way we till the soil, preparing our souls to receive the seeds to be planted by the Word of God so that seed may bear fruit.

The Word of God, then calls for our listening and our response in silent reflection, as well as in word and song. Most important of all, the Word of God, which is living and active, calls each of us individually and all of us together for a response that moves beyond the liturgy itself and affects our daily lives, leading us to engage fully in the task of making Christ known to the world by all that we do and say. 2010, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops








New Socks & Underwear Drive

The "Working Poor" is the new phrase used to describe normal every day people who are working hard but still unable to provide for their families. With our current economy, families are in need of items that they used to take for granted such as food and clothing. A few weekends ago, you provided much needed food through our "Stuff the Truck" drive for these families, today we are asking for another necessity...new socks and underwear.

I am told by many teachers, health care professionals and friends that this year there is an increased need for socks and underwear. As the weather gets colder, the children will be standing on the cold concrete waiting for the bus with no socks. Some of the children only own a pair or two of underwear and at best, they are tread bear. I don't know about you, but that breaks my heart. The adults are in need as well. We provide socks and underwear to men, women and children. Our homeless and low-income population has grown since last year and buying socks and underwear for themselves is not a priority. These items are considered a "luxury item".

Every year, we conduct a sock and underwear drive to support all these men, women and children. The items are then distributed, around Thanksgiving, to many programs through Catholic Charities, St. Therese Center, Matthew's Closet and our families here in our parish community. Last year you donated over 5,000 pieces of socks & underwear.

If you wish to participate in this very worthwhile cause, please purchase <u>NEW</u> socks or underwear in all sizes for men, women and children and drop them off in the gathering space beginning today through November 3rd. Stewardship

Perseverance

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives a clever example of why we are to persevere in praying, even if we think the prayer is not being heard. The crooked judge just wanted to get that widow off his back. She was lucky her adversary didn't pester the judge, too; he might

have gone the other way. So we can pray to God with even more confidence, because we know that God loves us and will answer our prayers.

St. Paul carries that theme of perseverance even further. He is not just talking about prayer here; he encourages Timothy to persevere in proclaiming God's word as well. That command we may find more challenging than prayer. He tells Timothy (and us!) to "convince, reprimand and encourage through all patience and teaching" (2 Timothy 4:2). How can we do that?

"Convince" reminds me that our faith should be reasonable. Not that we can prove all that we believe in a scientific way, but our faith should be realistic; after all, God made the world, so God should know how it works. Jesus' command to love one another, for instance, can be taught much more convincingly by giving

examples of love. A mother who hugs her child when he is hurt, forgives him when he is sorry, and encourages him when he feels lost is teaching that command in a way that will be remembered much longer than just telling him to love people. So we can convince others of


our faith by showing them examples of love, forgiveness, and encouragement.

Paul also talks about reprimanding each other. That may be what he was thinking when he says that proclaiming the word can sometimes be inconvenient. Most people find it difficult to reprimand someone they are in charge

of, much less one who is equal in status. That's where patience comes in. A reprimand can be made patiently and gently, as a sign of concern rather than authority.

Paul lastly mentions teaching. He probably was referring to teaching the Hebrew scriptures and how they were fulfilled in Christ. Parents can do their part by teaching the stories from the Bible, helping children to see God in creation, teaching them to pray, and being good examples of God's love for them. If you send your children to religion classes or the parish school, do what you can to support the teachers so that what the children learn at school is
