What would be a fair contribution for New Zealand?

2. What do you think the nature of New Zealand's emissions and economy means for the level of target that we set?

As so proudly promoted by the current government, agriculture is a pillar of our economy. The reliance of agriculture on a stable environment, fairly intuitively, highlights the need for significant action to be taken towards dramatically reducing ghg emissions. Changes in our environment, specifically in precipitation amounts, will have an increasing impact on out agriculture sector. We should be using agriculture as a reason TO make meaningful targets, not a reason to look for the easy way.

How will our contribution affect New Zealanders?

3. What level of cost is appropriate for New Zealand to reduce it greenhouse gas emissions? For example, what do you think would be a reasonable impact on annual household consumption?

This question is clearly leading towards making people answer for minimal financial impact. Unfortunately, the reality is that households will have to start fronting cost of unmitiagted climate change impacts whether they like it or not. As the impacts of climate change continue to increase in strenght and frequency, the costs will simply always end up a household expense – for example; increases to insurance premiums. The evidence is mounting that delaying action now will only increase the costs of mitigation and adaptation in the near-future.

4. Of the opportunities for New Zealand to reduce its emissions (as outlined on page 15 of the discussion document), which do you think are the most likely to occur, or be most important for New Zealand?

I don't think any are likely to happen through any short or mid-term government initative. However, reducing ghg emissions and increasing carbon sinks will be a good start to improve chances of limiting global temperatures to 2degrees.

Summary

5. How should New Zealand take into account the future uncertanties of technologies and costs when setting its target?

It would be totally irresponsible to wait for future technologies to try an mitigate anthropogenic climate change impacts. We can not be certain they will be developed in time, or if at all. As for costs, we are becoming increasingly aware that delaying any mitigation efforts will only increase them for future generations. The attitude of not doing any mitigation efforts is increasingly becoming the more expensive option – we only have to look to reports of the NZ Treasury to see examples of this.

Other comments

6. Is there any further information you wish the Government to consider? Please explain.

We must get over this attitude of only 'doing our fair share'. It has radically hurt our reputation on the international stage – which is especially ironic when promoting our 'clean, green

image'. New Zealand has a unique set of resources and geological formations that will can give us a comparative advantage in carbon reduction efforts. We must start to utilise these advantages or risk being left behind internationally. The rhetoric of strictly economy-first governance is becoming outdated by the day as further postponement of climate change action will only disadvantage NZ's economy in the future. Even China, CHINA!, is doing more towards attempting to reduce its ghg emissions and air pollution than NZ. Making efforts to reduce NZ's impact on the climate will not only provide co-benefits to the economy, but will also help support cultural, social and ethical concerns. We **MUST** do more as country to combat climate change. Simply, there is no other option that will continue to give us a future that in some way resembles a world we live in today.
