How do we find the right point on the continuum between access to the general curriculum and individual needs for Deaf and hard of hearing students who struggle making academic progress? How can we make appropriate modifications to the curriculum using assessment information and transition planning? What if we are required to use curriculum products intended for the general population such as CSCOPE or packaged core reading programs? How do we know if supplemental or alternative materials we choose are in alignment with these resources?
