Topics to be covered include: the cultural and historical heritage of Islam, Judaism and Christianity in this region, the impact of European colonialism, the great-power rivalries of the 19th century, the fall of the Ottoman Empire, the creation of Zionism, the impact of World War I, the tension between Arab nationalism and pan-Arabism, the effects of World War II, the founding of the State of Israel and the Arab-Israeli wars, the implications of the Cold War for regional development and security, religio-ethnic conflicts within and between Islamic states, the problem of elitism and mass political participation, dilemmas of economic development and competition, the rise of religious fundamentalism, and the use of terror as a political weapon.

The focus of this study group will be American history from the end of Reconstruction to recent times, including the social, economic and political developments that accompanied the transformation of a nation that was essentially rural to one that was highly industrialized. Of particular concern will be issues that arose out of the new relationship between worker and employer, concentration of economic power, need to protect the environment, government's role in the economy, and responsibilities on the international scene. The student will read a basic text, taking chapter-by-chapter notes, with the notes to be submitted at the conclusion of the study. The student will select, in consultation with the mentor, 4 topics on which to prepare 7- to 8-page papers.

This intensive, interdisciplinary study group addresses the nature and development of creativity in individual and social contexts. There will be a minimum of four required face-to-face meetings, an online component and presentations. We will encounter an array of discussions surrounding the topic of creativity, from early attempts at quantification of creativity as "divergent thinking" to theories about "flow" and analysis of the role of discipline in art. The student will also look at practical and theoretical aspects of creative thinking, writing, making, performing, movement, teaching and more. Students will work independently, online, and in meetings with the mentor. Students will engage in individualized, intensive self-directed learning activities including, a daily artist's notebook, two academic papers (a creative self-assessment and a paper on one of Gardner's "minds"), related creative works, a Challenge to complete work outside of their genre, extensive formal research, and collaborative projects. All of this work will be conducted surrounding shared readings and, ultimately, students will complete an individualized final project based on a self-generated bibliography with consultation by the mentor.
