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4-H Going Strong All Summer Long

4-H is recognized as being part of Rutgers Cooperative Extension; because the public associates Rutgers University with a 9 month academic calendar with summers free, often the question will be asked "Is 4-H 'off' in the summer, too?" On the contrary, 4-H is a year round life skill development program that provides a wide variety of 'hands on' learning opportunities for youth grades K-13.

Rather than being a "slowing down" period for 4-H, the summer is actually a very busy season. The summer is the season for the Monmouth County 4-H fair, an event which involves 4-H'ers in many project areas and activities; June and July are spent in busy preparation of displays, exhibits, shifts and schedules. Summer also brings 4-H special event programming such as outdoor recreation camp and arts camp at Camp Nomoco, Turkey Swamp Park. Also in the summer are L.G. Cook Summer Camp weeks in Sussex County, filled with fun educational programming such as boating, archery, theatre arts, teambuilding and much more. The summer is also busy with Monmouth County 4-H outreach activities conducted by 4-H staff and volunteers in community and school programs.

Volunteer training and program development continue to be a priority in the summer, as throughout the year. 4-H clubs maintain their community service projects in the summer, recognizing that there is no "summer break" to meeting community needs.

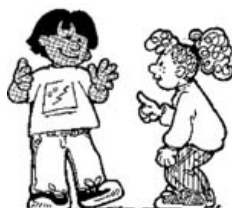

Our last meeting we talked about our club booth. Our March blast off was a great success. The weather was perfect and everyone was able to launch.

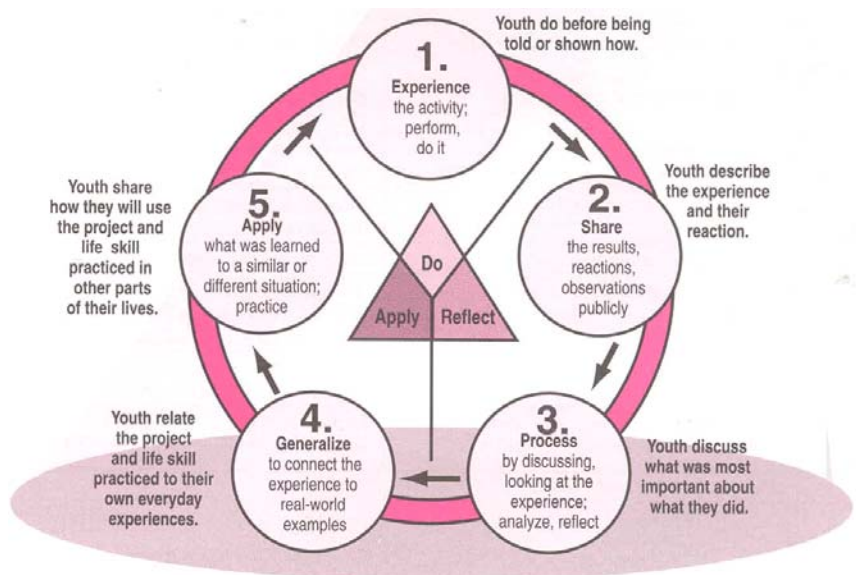
Our April launch date was moved to April 15th due to the holiday.

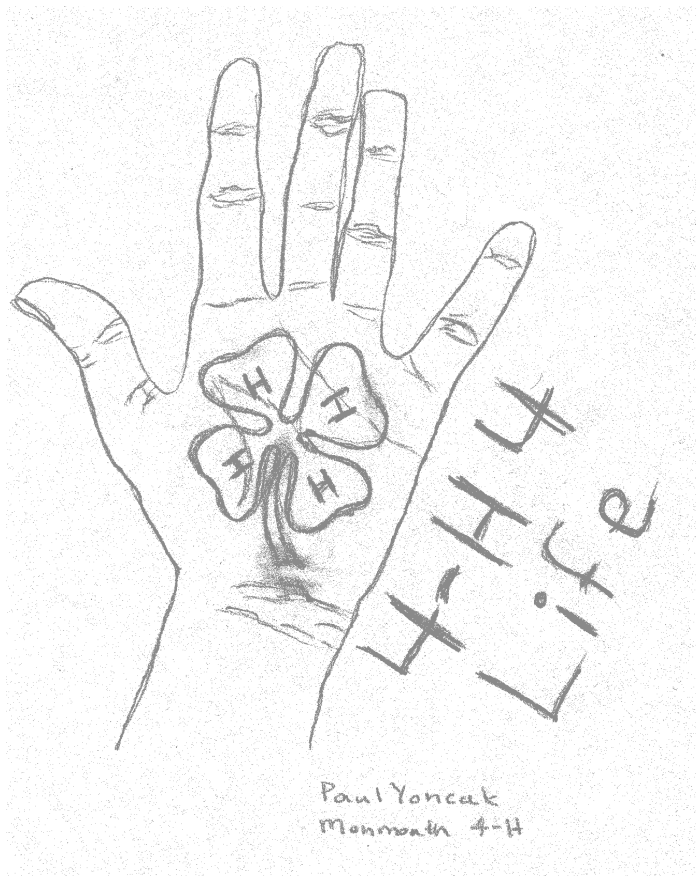

Responding to the Tragedy at Virginia Tech

Many times as an educator or parent it is difficult knowing what to say and how to react to tragedy.

Educators for Social Responsibility (ESR) helps educators create safe, caring, respectful, and productive learning environments. ESR also helps educators work with young people to develop the social skills, emotional competencies, and qualities of character they need to succeed in school and become contributing members of their communities.

Making sense of tragedy is difficult for adults, and even more so for children. The shootings at Virginia Tech yesterday remind us of how it feels to be out of control of the events that unfold around us. At this point 33 lives were taken, with many more wounded by the gunfire, and countless others shattered by this senseless violence. While we might never know what was in the heart or on the mind of the gunman in this case, it is up to adults to help children to express their fears and to regain a sense of safety.

Our hearts go out to the victims of the VA Tech shootings, their families, friends, colleagues and the entire community of Blacksburg, VA.

On the weekend of March 9th Teen Council members throughout the state of New Jersey were invited to spend a weekend in Egg Harbor Township. We stayed at the Clarion Hotel from March 9th through the 11th. This year was special to everybody in many ways because it was SJTC's 50th Anniversary of this annual event. The slogan this year was "BACK TO THE FUTURE with 4-H". That first night was very memorable because we were getting our room cards and for some, finding our friends from last year. Everybody received a bag including a hat, cards, a folder with all information needed for the weekend and some other goodies.

We had to unpack fairly quickly to make the Friday evening program held by Ocean County. They had a big ice breaker with all the counties divided up in groups to get to know each other. At 11:00 PM we were finished with our games and had a 30 minute meeting with our own county. We all signed up to be a helper for one of the activities which were going to be to hand out folders or something like giving out a gift at the end of the session. We were always given free time if we were done with our activities planned for the night. On Friday, we had free time from 11:00 to 12:00 pm.

Saturday was started in the Crystal Ballroom for breakfast and morning announcements. This was the day of our workshop sessions. From 9:00 till 10:00 am was our first workshop. My choice was EXPLORE YOUR WORLD THROUGH GPS/GSI. This was held by Debi Cole from Atlantic County, a 4-H Agent. This workshop was fun and taught us how to work with other kids in a scavenger hunt trying to find colored plastic bags. Each team was given a different color; at first, the game was hard figuring out how to work it, but by the end our team was getting the hang of it.

After our first workshop, we were given a 4 minute break to get some refreshments before attending our next workshop. Most of us were anxious to go to workshop B since we had so much fun in our first workshop. This workshop

went from 10:15 till 11:25am. My second choice was SPEAK OUT FOR MILITARY KIDS. There were two kids and a 4-H Agent leading this program, Rachel Everett from Morris County 4-H, and James Donoghue and Logan Sennstorm from Burlington County. They had put together a 20 minute movie on kids whose parents are in the military and how they have to deal with it. It made me realize how lucky I was that my dad or mom wasn't in the military. We heard about the insults made to kids from other people about their dad or mom being in the military. Some kids in that very room were in this situation. They told us how hard it was getting made fun of and kids saying harsh comments to them like "I hope your dad dies," or "I hope your mom dies." I just couldn't believe what they were saying. This program really helped me realize how lucky I really am and how important it is to be kind to others and have respect.

I was given something to read to everybody which was actually fun standing up in front of 200 people. The morning went by fast, and then we had to go through the saddest part of the weekend which was saying good bye to old friends and the new friends we met. We all had a blast over the weekend and this event was not only a learning experience for all, it was definitely a memorable one. I now know why it has been going on for fifty years. The kids who didn't go really missed out on all the fun.

Student looks forward to a summer in Japan 15-year-old needs to raise \$4K for exchange program

ALLENTOWN - A lifelong dream will come true this summer for 15-year-old John Voorhees. John can't really remember a time when he hasn't wanted to go to Japan, and he's finally found a way to get there. Because the trip will cost \$4,000, there are a few things he must do before he can participate in a foreign exchange program sponsored by the National 4-H Council.

To raise money for his trip to Japan, John is holding a cookie and pizza dough fundraiser through April 16. He is also planning a flower sale later on in the year and is accepting donations as well. "I'm very proud of him," his mother, Jane Sharp, said. "He's really worked hard at taking classes, filling out the application and writing letters trying to get donations. It's not me saying he has to do this. He's done all of it by himself, and it shows a lot of dedication."

To prepare for the trip, John, a sophomore at Allentown High School, took night classes at Mercer County Community College in West Windsor, where he learned the Japanese language. Although he admits that his language skills are "still sketchy," he said he is familiar with the three written languages and one spoken language that are used in Japan. Despite the 4,000 characters used in the kanji written language alone, John is not daunted by learning more. The Japanese language and culture have fascinated him since he created a school project about Japan while in elementary school. With assistance from 4-H, John will get to fully experience living the Japanese lifestyle for seven weeks when he joins other 4-H youth in Virginia on June 14 to embark on a Japanese Labo program run by the nonprofit Foundation for Worldwide International Student Exchange (WISE). He is the only 4-H member from New Jersey who is traveling to Japan.

According to 4-H agent Ellen Williams, John is demonstrating by his participation in this program that he is seeking to expand his knowledge and skills, thus living out the 4-H motto: "To make the best better."

The 4-H is a community of young people across America who are learning leadership, citizenship and life skills. There are many different types of 4-H clubs, and John is a member of the Monmouth County 4-H Teen Council. The council is a group of high school students who get together to help others and have fun. Community service and mentoring younger 4-H groups are two key elements of the club's roles. "As his leader, I can say without hesitation that John is an outstanding member of

Teen Council," said Virginia Krzyzanowski, Monmouth County 4-H Program associate and Teen Council leader.

John's trip to Japan through the 4-H will begin with a three-week Nihongo program in Tokyo, during which he will continue studying the Japanese language in addition to learning about Japanese mannerisms and culture. He will be staying with a host family and will travel to the Labo school in Shinjuku. Throughout the Nihongo program, John will take classes every weekday from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. He will use his afternoons for trips to a Japanese bath, store, or tea ceremony. When the Nihongo program ends, John will move in with a different host family in Japan, where there will be a child his own age. He will experience the Japanese host family's lifestyle and live like a Japanese teenager for a month.

John's after-school activities may include visiting shrines and temples, going shopping, playing sports, going to the beach, visiting relatives in the countryside and helping around the house. He also expects to spend four days at a Japanese summer camp in another part of the country. John plans to take a photo book with him to Japan to show those he meets what his life is like in the United States. When he returns, he will put together a similar book about Japan to show people here. Of his expectations of the trip, John said, "I hope to visit many regions and better understand the Japanese way of life. "I would also like to try more of the Japanese cuisine," he added. "I already love sushi. But more than all of those other things, I want to learn as much about the culture as possible and share this information with others. This trip will help me to accomplish this goal." John, who plans to major in business in college, aspires to someday become a video-game programmer or an inventor.



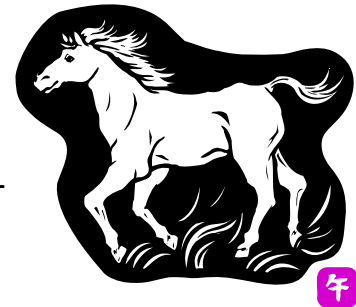

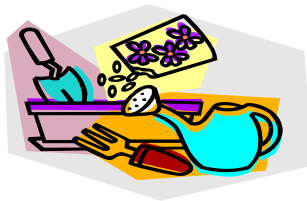
