he key for a successful tour is to choose the best hotel locations. In our view hotels should be located in historic districts where city life is so rich. SOFITEL HOTEL in XIAN

Explore: Venerable Bell and Drum towers • stone forest of stele tablets • imposing Xian city wall with parkland bordering the moat • shopping in lively market on Luomashi Street

RITZ CARLTON in SHANGHAI

Explore: Huangpu River and Shanghai lovers' lane • colonial Bund and its old cosmopolitanism • audacious Pudong skyscrapers • city life at People's Park • world-class shopping in Shanghai's "glitter world" • special performances at Portman Theater • nightcap in Asia's most fashionable nightclubs and bars



– OPTIONAL PRE-TOUR EXTENSION – CHENGDE SUMMER PALACE October 13 – 17, 2009

Come to China three days early and experience the grandeur of the Qing Dynasty Summer Resort at Chengde, a few hours drive from Beijing. The garden complex includes imperial halls, southern-style lake gardens, a hunt-

ing preserve, an area of Mongolian yurts, and a

wooded hillside with numerous pavilions. Beyond the palace were built eight Buddhist temples, each one architecturally unique, of which five remain, amazing architectural creations in their own right. Then, join

your tour group on its arrival in Beijing.

– OPTIONAL POST-TOUR EXTENSION – GUILIN October 27 – 31, 2009

Extend your travels with this five-day exploration of the sublime scenery in Guilin, Longsheng and the famous Li River. Known for rice terraces cut into precipitous hills since the Yuan Dy-



mations of Guilin, vertical mountains thrust up from the seabed some 300 million years ago. Cruise down the Li River, winding past the ancient villages of Mural Hill, Folded Brocade Hill,

nasty, Longsheng's beauty is awe-inspiring. Take in the famous spectacular karst limestone forCrescent Moon Hill, and many more. Return to the U.S.A. from Shanghai.

This five-day extension focuses on Anhui Province and its idyllic landscape of rice paddies, Ming and Qing Dynasty villages, and old town centers. Discover traditional Anhui life, regional architecture and museums, and the crown jewels of the region, the



Huang Mountains. The beauty of granite precipices towering above the morning valley fog have provided inspiration to Chinese artists for centuries. On foot and by cable car, explore the mountains' gorgeous views. Return to the U.S.A. from Shanghai.

So much is new in China that it's hard to keep up. Our itinerary features all of the traditional centers of culture that everyone wants to see, but we also introduce new cultural venues, events, and activities that most Americans miss. These include:



IN BEIJING

China has one of the hottest contemporary art scenes in the world, and the center of attention is the **798 DASHANZI ART AND CULTURE DISTRICT**. We will have the opportunity to visit new and established artists in their ateliers, view their art, and discover their aesthetic mission. New styles seem to appear every few months, and both Western and Chinese art critics are eager to know what it all means. Join in the excitement as Chinese artists seek to express their country's economic exuberance and contradictions. (Included in tour.)

Visit the spectacular NATIONAL CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS, the "Big Egg," in Beijing, designed by French architect Paul Andreu. The newly opened arts center includes three theaters under a single titanium-andglass dome. The aesthetics here aim at a grandeur seldom seen in the world, and are nevertheless realized with exquisite taste. Attend a performance if available. (Evening performance cost not included.)





One of China's extraordinary museums that only the cognoscenti visit is the **GUANFU CLASSIC ART MUSEUM** in north Beijing. This private museum features antique furniture, classic doors and windows, traditional ceramics and porcelains, and much more. This is one of the few places in the world where one can absorb the elegance and tranquility so prized by Chinese tradition. (Optional excursion, cost included.)

IN SHANGHAI

Nothing compares with the CHINESE ACROBATS for stunning physical skills, colorful pageantry, and marvelous tricks. One reason that the Chinese succeed so well in Olympic gymnastics comes from the legacy of their acrobatic tradition. Conclude your China tour on a high note with an exciting acrobatic performance in Shanghai. (Optional excursion, performance cost not included.)

- ITINERARY -

October 16-17 • San Francisco or New York – Beijing

Depart San Francisco or New York on a nonstop flight to Beijing. Cross the international dateline and arrive in China the next day. Transfer to the Grand Hotel, located in the heart of Beijing. This evening is a good time to adjust to Beijing life with a stroll to nearby Tiananmen Square or Wangfujing street. (meals aloft) This evening, savor the imperial city's most famous delicacy, Peking duck, at the renowned Da Dong Restaurant. (B,L,D)

Breakfast (B), Lunch (L) and Dinner (D) are included in the day's program.

October 19 • Beijing

An optional early-morning walk to Changpuhe Park offers an opportunity to observe local residents practicing taiji and qigong. This

October 18 • Beijing

After breakfast, we begin our China exploration with a welcome orientation by our tour director. Old and new China beckon outside our hotel and nearby is the imperial architectural axis that runs from Qianmen Gate, to the grand halls of the Forbidden City, to Jingshan Hill. This line demarcates the center of the Chinese universe–which is to say, all things cultural, social, political, and spiritual find their source here. For the next few

days we will experience the immense power of the city that radiates from a layout designed years ago in the Ming Dynasty.

We first go to the picturesque Houhai district, where well-preserved courtyard homes and narrow hutong alleys border tree-lined lakes. Tour the district by "pedicab" for a closer and more engaging experience of traditional Chinese life. We enjoy lunch at the homes of local families.

Afterwards, explore the Temple of Heaven, one of the finest creations of the Ming Dynasty. This stunning architecture realizes the great Chinese desire to incarnate heaven in material form, and represents the most advanced principles of mechanics and geometry of the time.



newly constructed park features numerous traditional buildings and pavilions facing onto a variety of Chinese gardens, one of the most successful landscape creations in the country.

Our touring begins today as we enter the gate of the Forbidden City, the abiding symbol of imperial China. Truly one of the great achievements of civilization, its construction employed hundreds of thousands of workers between 1406 and 1420. Marvel at its expansive architecture, magnificent imperial gar-

dens, and many museums of Chinese antiquities and treasures.

After lunch at Ken de Rouge, visit the beautiful grounds of the Summer Palace. The Palace was built in 1888 for the Empress Dowager Ci Xi, using funds originally intended for the Qing Imperial Navy. Saunter through the exquisite royal gardens and cruise on lovely Kunming Lake. Also walk the Painted Gallery, the longest garden walkway in China, famous for its lake views.

This evening is at leisure with dinner on one's own. After dinner, you choose may to venture out on your own and attend a performance at the new National Grand Theater, lovingly dubbed the "Big Egg." Designed by French architect Paul Andreau, the building

took ten years to construct. This complex is built with 25,000 titanium plates and 15,000 glass panels and houses three state-of-the-art theaters. Not unexpectedly, it is the most expensive theater facility ever built in the world. (B,L)

October 20 • Beijing

Today, we visit the Olympic Village to marvel at the new stadiums made famous by the 2008 Beijing Olympics. Herzog & de Meuron designed the

National Stadium the "Bird's Nest;" and the firm PTW designed the National Swimming Center-the "Water Cube."



Next, we

head north from Beijing for the Great Wall of China. Encounter this extraordinary rampart at Mutianyu, a rugged section of the wall that offers easy access by foot or cable car. As is usually the case, the Great Wall presents a visual experience that dramatically exceeds visitors' expectations. Construction of a few miles of the wall on such jagged peaks seems near miraculous, but the rampart stretches for 3,700 miles and passes through 16 provinces.

On our return, visit the 798 Dashanzi Art and Culture District. This renovated factory area is known as the "Soho" of Beijing. More than 80 gallery spaces, as well as artist studios, fashion boutiques, and design ateliers make the Chinese contemporary art scene

riors still stand on the original site where they were discovered by farmers in 1974. The "royal hope" can be intuited in this vast army for

it was intended to defend the emperor in the afterlife.

Then, check in the Sofitel Hotel in downtown Xian.

We'll have an opportunity to stroll Muslim Street and get a sense of the Islamic past that traces its heritage to the flourishing Silk Road culture of the Tang Dynasty.

Explore the Grand Mosque, first established in the Tang Dynasty. Laid out in quadrants, the mosque uses Chinese architectural design for Islamic purposes. Interestingly, we can see here the powerful tendency of Chinese culture to assimilate all outside forces into its civilization, and the equally grand power of Islam to retain its own identity.

Our day concludes with a dumpling ban-

quet at Defachang Dumpling restaurant, where we'll feast on over twenty kinds of Chinese dumplings, a Xian specialty.(B, L,D)

October 22 • Xian -Chongqing

Before transferring to the airport, we make a special stop at the Han Emperor's Tomb, Yangling Museum, to view the Han archaeological finds recently unearthed. Though not on

as grand a scale as Qinshihuang, the Han emperor sought the same power beyond the tomb.

Then, we make the short flight to

one of the most exciting in the world. **Exhibitions** feature an international range of established and emerging artists, providing a concentrated glimpse of the "new art" of China.

Then we stop by the new CCTV **Building** designed by Dutch architect Rem Koolhass. Two

inverted L-shaped towers connect at the top to form an amazing architectural statement.

Tonight, we enjoy a special banquet at the Shanglinyuan Restaurant in lovely Beihai

Imperial Garden. (B,L,D)

October 21 • Xian

This morning, fly to the ancient Tang Dynasty capital of Xian, formerly known as Changan. The old capital was located not far from present Xian and was the seat of imperial power for over one thousand years, beginning with the first unification of China in the Qin Dynasty.

We go immediately to see the extraordinary



Chongqing. Upon arrival, go directly to General Stilwell's Museum which commemorates the American military leader's efforts in China during WWII.

Following dinner we board the Victoria cruise ship. (B, L, D)

October 23-24 • Yangzi River Cruise

Travel downstream through the spectacular Three Gorges (Qutang, Wu, and Xiling), enjoying the dramatic scenery and beautiful vistas as they appear. Along the way, disembark the ship to enjoy activities offshore. Tour the ghost village of Fengdu and see the breathtaking Lesser Gorge Daninghe. An amazing experience is coming face-to-face with the spectacular Three Gorges Dam at Sandouping. The largest construction site in the world is also China's latest effort to tame the Yangzi River. Our ship will navigate here the new system of locks now in use.

The unending panorama of river scenery makes this one of the great voyages of Asia. It also gives a sense of how the Yangzi River deeply informs the Chinese mind, as does the Mississippi River for Americans. Enjoy numerous cultural presentations and entertainment activities throughout the journey. (Both days: B,L,D)

October 25 • Yichang – Shanghai

In Yichang, disembark after lunch. Then, fly to Shanghai and transfer to the Ritz Carlton

has surpassed Hong Kong as the leading Chinese city. Our time here will be spent absorbing this special energy, a worldly cosmopolitanism for the up-and-coming Chinese empire.

The evening is free for exploration and dinner is on one's own. You may choose to visit Xintiandi—a stylish restaurant and shopping district designed by MIT architect Ben Wood. Filled with restaurants, clubs, and fashion boutiques, Xintiandi exudes artistic sophistication and is widely imitated throughout China today for chic redevelopment projects. Enjoy lunch on one's own here. (B,L)

October 26 • Shanghai

This morning, we divert ourselves among the wonderful collections of the Shanghai Museum, including its world-class displays of Chinese bronzes, jade, pottery, ceramics, furniture, paintings, and calligraphy.

After lunch, go to Yuyuan Gardens, which is designed in six unique parts, making the garden seem much larger than it really is. We find one of the best Ming rockeries here, and wending the zigzag bridge to Huxingting Teahouse is a delight.

In the evening, we bring our journey to a memorable close with a farewell banquet at Dingxiang Garden Restaurant, famous for Shanghai cuisine. (B,D)

What strikes everyone about Shanghai is its vitality. Nothing restrains Shanghai in its immense ambition to achieve world-class status; and in only a few short years it

TRAVEL IN CHINA

China's tourism industry has improved dramatically over the last decade. However, air and land transportation and other facilities may not always meet international standards. In addition, your hosts want to show you as much of their country as possible, so the schedule will be demanding with moderate physical activity. Travel in China requires good physical condition and health (special needs must be arranged for in advance and may result in additional costs), a spirit of adventure, a flexible attitude, and a sense of humor. The itinerary is subject to change and modification. Every effort will be made to carry out the program as planned, but alterations may still occur. Participants should be aware that no refunds will be made as a result of unforeseen changes, modifications, or delays.

MEALS

China offers a wide variety of dining experiences and this program will take advantage of a broad range of Chinese food including Shanghai, Hunan, Sichuan, Canton, and Imperial regional cuisines. Special diets are not possible, except to the extent one picks and chooses from the many dishes served.

CONDITIONS

Reservations: Bookings are subject to the terms and conditions mentioned in these sections. A contract has been entered into as soon as your booking is received and accepted. To confirm the reservation, a deposit of \$700 per person is required.

Group Air: Group air is for a minimum of 10 passengers flying out and back together. With less than 10 passengers, the price will be adjusted based on what the current airfare is and will be purchased on an individual ticketing basis. <u>Please note that for</u> any additional and individual air bookings, all sales are final with no exchanges or refunds.

Cancellations: <u>Tour cancellations must be made in writing to</u> <u>China Advocates, Inc., as soon as possible</u>. Cancellation penalties based on the date of receipt of written notice are as follows: 91 or more days prior to departure, a cancellation fee of \$400 per person is retained; 90-46 days prior to departure, \$1,500 per person; 45-31 days prior to departure, \$2,500 per person; 30-0 days prior to departure, no refund is made.
