Faculty Research/Study Abroad Program (for AY 13-14)

Goals

To provide faculty development opportunities for inter/transdisciplinary, transnational, transcultural (I/TTT) teaching, research, and global-urban community engagements that support UMB's mission for the academic affairs.

Objectives: (note: a successful proposal could satisfy only one of the objectives listed below.)

- 1. To facilitate faculty identifying research projects with an articulation of the triad interconnectedness among research inquiry, teaching, and community engagement with students in global-urban contexts
- 2. To provide inquiry-oriented study abroad opportunities to faculty with students (one or two) to investigate a self-identified inquiry related to an ethnic group's diasporas and its relationship to the issue of social justice and humanity (This particular objective is to support faculty study abroad, which will serve as a pilot to eventually develop an inquiry-oriented study abroad program/course for both undergraduate and graduate students.)



- 3. To provide study abroad opportunities to faculty interested in the development of transdisciplinary service learning-oriented study abroad programs/courses for both undergraduate and graduate students in global-urban communities
- 4. To provide inter/transdisciplinary, transnational, transcultural (I/TTT) research-oriented study abroad opportunities to faculty whose current research focuses may be related but <u>not limited to</u> one of the following areas (alphabetical order):
 - ✓ Aging issues of ethnic and racial groups
 - ✓ Community development
 - ✓ Counseling

<u>Program announcement:</u> Every year from March 15-August 1, the program will be announced to invite faculty who may be interested in participating in the "Proposal Development Workshop for Faculty Study Abroad Program" for the upcoming academic year. Capacity for the workshop participants: 5, maximum 10.

Workshop (Monthly workshop held Sept.–Dec.): A total of four (4) workshops (2½ hrs for each workshop, totaling 10 hrs.) will help faculty members develop and articulate their own study abroad proposal reflecting upon the program's five (5) objectives. (A successful proposal could satisfy one of the objectives listed above.) The workshop will be coordinated and provided by OITA and invited guests as needed (e.g., previous UMB faculty study abroad fund recipients, current international visiting scholars, faculty who have had a Fulbright award, representatives from the U. S. Agency for International Development [USAID], representatives from International Research and Exchanges Board [IREX], CTCCS members, OITA advisory board members, etc.). It will be held in the OITA, Campus Center, 2nd fl, room 2010 (or room 2115).

- Workshop 1: Program Orientation; Project Articulation in Relation to the Program Objectives (Second Friday of September, Sep. 13th, 2013, 9:00 11:30 a.m.)
- Workshop 2: Building Project Rationale; Study Abroad Site Development; Strategies to Connect with Global-Urban Local Communities and its Agencies for the Project; Additional Grant-Seeking Activities

- Workshop 3: Making Connections among Study Abroad, Research Inquiry, Teaching, and Community Engagement WITH Students in Global-Urban Contexts; Individual Faculty Study Abroad Projects vs. Transdisciplinary Faculty Group Study Abroad Projects vs. Faculty's Study Abroad Project WITH Students (First Friday of November, Nov. 1th, 2013, 9:00 11:30 a.m.)
- Workshop 4: The Proposal; Budget for International Travel, Self-Report; Assessment; Relationship to Continuous Professional Development; Curriculum Implementation (First Friday of December, Dec. 6nd, 2013, 9:00 11:30 a.m.)

<u>Proposal Due</u>: December 31, 5:00 p.m. to the OITA main office. Faculty participants who have completed the total four (4) workshops will be eligible to submit the proposal.

<u>Proposal Review</u>: Coordinated by OITA, selected members from the Committee for Transnational, Cultural, and Community Studies and OITA Advisory Board will review the proposals during January and February and make the final recommendation to the Provost office and the Director of OITA. A successful proposal may be considered to be fully or partially funded depending on the resource availability, budget, and location of the research/study abroad. Those who submit proposals requiring further articulation will be encouraged to resubmit in the following year; in addition, OITA will provide continuous support and follow-up services to facilitate the success of such proposals.

<u>Study Abroad</u>: Depending on the nature of faculty study abroad project, the actual study abroad will occur anytime during March – August, mostly summer term (usually for 2-4 weeks term. If the faculty has an extra or other funding, it may be a longer term). During the study abroad period, the faculty member will be



expected to keep an on-line journal accessible to the campus community via OITA Facebook (go to OITA Website, [http://www.umb.edu/oita/], you will find OITA Facebook link under "Programs").

<u>Self-report</u>: By August 15, all of the faculty who completed the Faculty Study Abroad Program during the academic year should submit a reflective self-report describing how the experience fulfilled the objective(s) she or he originally set for the study abroad in light of the Program Objectives. The self-report must also include sections for "Continuous Professional Development Plan" and "Action Plan for Curriculum Implementation." If the participant's study abroad project includes student(s), each student also must produce a reflective self-report.

Expected Outcomes:

- 1. Faculty who complete the workshop and research/study abroad program will be able to co-lead the following year's UMB Faculty Study Abroad Program Workshop in collaboration with OITA.
- 2. Faculty who complete the workshop and research/study abroad program will be able to practice and demonstrate ways to infuse inter/transdisciplinary, transnational, transcultural (I/TTT) aspects into teaching, research, and global-urban community engagement to transform UMB's curriculum practices.
- Faculty who complete the workshop and research/study abroad program will be able to develop and offer a short-term study abroad course based on the experience for the students in his or her academic program.

- 3. A faculty member who has submitted a research/study abroad proposal requiring further articulation will be encouraged to resubmit the proposal in the following year. OITA will provide continuous individual support to facilitate the success of the proposal.
